DOING WELL ? OR JUST GETTING BY?

Do you feel that your ACYOA Chapter is doing well, or just getting by from month to month and year to year?

Does it appear that you, and perhaps a few concerned other, are doing all the work? Doesn't it seem that what you're doing has all been done before, and that re-inventing the wheel is a yearly ritual?

Well, don't feel bad, you're not alone.

A recent SURVEY of organizations and volunteer groups has revealed that no matter the number of members or participants, only a select few rise to the top (the cream?) and tackle the real work of organizing events and activities or leading the group in a specific direction.

The only times this was not true was in cases of certain annual events or when a strategy was employed for the specific reason of involving more people in the tasks and related tasks of the event or program. In the latter case, the goal was not the event or program (whose outcome was a bonus) but rather the higher number of involved people taking on important roles and "getting the job done - together".

PALOS HEIGHTS SETS RECORD

The ACYOA Chapter in Palos Heights has had an unprecedented year. Here's what they've accomplished:

1. Planned, prepared and executed one of the smoothest, efficient and enjoyable National Sports Weekends for the ACYOA.
2. Named "CHAPTER OF THE YEAR" and presented with the ACYOA Chapter "A" Award. (Unheard of for a group that had the Nat. Spts. Wknd. to work on, besides ACYOA obligations and parish involvements.)
3. Had one of their members, Susan Boyajian, selected as the recipient of the Sam Nersesian Award, symbolic of outstanding Christian character. (Susan was also elected to ACYOA Central Council.)
4. Enjoyed the company of over 450 young adult Armenians during the Weekend.

The small Parish of Ss. Joachim and Anna can certainly be proud of their young adults, and the ACYOA in general can join in celebrating such an accomplishment. They also attracted 11 new members for a total of 37. (That's more than some parishes with 2 and 3 times the population.)

Now the big question comes up....can they avoid the dreaded post-Sports Weekend blues? It seems that every Chapter that has hosted Sports Weekend has had trouble recovering to one degree or another the year after. Can Palos Heights win the "GRAND SLAM" and continue with another good year? Stay tuned and stay in touch....there are many good things to come....especially from you.

(DOING WELL? con't)

Getting people involved and motivated to do things is not an easy task in any group. This is especially true with the particular age group of ACYOA Seniors. They are in a stage of flux and transition that requires time and maturity to work out. They are in college, pursuing career choices, pursuing life-time relations, or simple getting their "act" together.

But for those who have the interest and the time to really participate in ACYOA, and perhaps take on a meaningful role (other than bringing the basketballs to practice), we must talk about attitude or spirit.

As a leader or active member, what is your attitude toward the group, toward the parish, or toward the goals of the group? Do you have the right spirit? Are you concerned about the others in the group, or simply concerned with results ("We'll do what we have to do to get the job done.") Perhaps we should remember that "ACYOA" is for the young adults of the Church, and not to merely to raise funds, serve or clean up after banquets, or perform other needed chores.

Attending to the needs of the group is the only REAL way ACYOA will grow and make noticeable progress. When people are receiving something they truly need, they will have a better attitude and develop a motivated spirit. IF the ACYOA in your parish is not fulfilling the needs of the young adults there, the chapter will be a social club of sorts with no solid foundation, no goals, no progress and most of all, no spirit. It takes the concern of the members, the concern of the adults of the Parish (Pastor, Parish Council, important others....) to consider the needs of the young adults and address those needs, to the best of their abilities.

For ACYOA, having just a select few run the show is not enough - even if surveys show this is the "norm". Participating in ACYOA is more than just showing up for an activity and going to the Nat. Spts. Wkd. It's a positive attitude and motivated spirit - a desire to be with other young Armenians of the parish and deciding together meaningful projects and goals that they can work on TOGETHER. Our common faith and heritage means more than just "getting by"; rather it can provide us with the motivation and spirit to accomplish many, many good things, and proudly say, "We made a difference in our community."

Positive Proposals Highlight ACYOA General Assembly '84

The 1984 ACYOA General Assembly convened at the Holiday Inn Hotel in Alsip, IL on Aug. 29, 30 & 31, hosted by the Palos Heights ACYOA. Presiding over the Assembly proceedings was the Primate, His Eminence, Archbishop Torkom Manoogian.

Attending her first Assembly, and elected as Assembly Chairman, was the Chapter Chairman from Evanston, Melina Spinuzza. Other Assembly officers included: Scott Najarian (Worcester) V. Chairman, Stephen Sarkisian and Michael Yapchaian (Watertown) Parliamentarians, and Robert Shamgochian (Worcester) the Sergeant-at-Arms. The Secretaries for the Assembly were preselected by the Central Council, and included: Virginia Semerdjian, Arda Nazerian and Sona Diorio.

Proposals that were accepted by the Assembly:

1. That the ACYOA Central Council pursue and cooperate with the various commemorative events to be sponsored by the Diocese during 1985, marking the 70th Anniversary of the Victims of the Armenian Genocide of 1915.
2. That the ACYOA make a donation to the Diocesan commemorative effort for the 70th Anniversary of the Genocide.
3. That in remembrance of the Armenian Martyrs, and in cooperation with the Diocesan commemorative effort, the ACYOA will refrain from sponsoring any type of social events (dances, parties, etc.) during the month of April 1985, and during the week of April 24th each year thereafter.
4. That the Central Council promote and provide materials to all parishes for a Winter Retreat to be held in January, using the topic "Loneliness", and a Spring Retreat in May, using the topic "Hassles".
5. That the Central Council promote and provide materials to all parishes for weekly Lenten Dialogues.

The Assembly also passed a "resolution on terrorism" by adopting the 1982 Resolution on Terrorism of the Diocese. (See full text of the Resolution in this issue.)

This year, 5 clergymen, 45 delegates and the members of the ACYOA Central Council participated in the Assembly. Coordinating the arrangements locally was Susan Boyajian. The Central Council prepared the necessary paper work and agenda, and shall act on accepted proposals and ideas generated by the Assembly, following approval of the Primate and Diocesan Council.

R E S O L U T I O N

The following Resolution adopted by the 80th Annual Assembly of the Diocese of the Armenian Church of America, meeting in New Britain, Connecticut on May 6,7,8, 1982, was reaffirmed and adopted by the 38th Annual Assembly of the Armenian Church Youth Organization of America, meeting in Alsip, Illinois on August 29,30,31, 1984.

WHEREAS, in many parts of the world acts of violence have taken place against persons and property; and

WHEREAS, there has been loss of life and property by this violence; and

WHEREAS, the Armenian Church and her leaders were the primary victims of the first genocide of the Twentieth Century; and

WHEREAS, Armenians and the Armenian Church still remember and will remember for all time the infamous acts of the 1894-1922 Turkish Governments and their treatment of Armenians and their Church which have become the precursor of future genocide and massacre, and to this day there has not been an acknowledgement of these acts by the perpetrators; and

WHEREAS, violence and hatred can only breed further violence and hatred; terrorism diminishes respect for the sanctity of life; the innocent suffer; and emotions distort reason; such a path is immoral and self-destructive;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Armenian people, the Armenian Church of America, its Primate, clergy and laypersons have in the past and do today condemn violence, whether the violence involves the Turkish people, their representatives or any other human beings; and

THAT THE ARMENIAN CHURCH OF AMERICA extends to all families affected by terroristic acts an expression of sadness and sincere condolences, and prays that further occurrences shall not happen, and whatever expressions are to be conveyed shall be done in a peaceful and non-violent manner.

What-a-Weekend in Palos Heights

You wanted it, you got it!!

A well planned, well promoted, well attended, and very well executed 1984 National Sports Weekend of the ACYOA. Congratulations to the Palos Heights ACYOA Chapter of Saints Joachim and Anna Armenian Church.

"Weekend Fever" was rampant in the Holiday Inn, attracting over 450 people for an array of social, religious-educational, athletic, and great-times events. What? You missed it? How could you? Didn't you receive the very creative promotional flyers and mailings? What? You thought they were "run-of-the-mill" and not worth reading? Boy, did you miss out!

The Weekend began on Fri. Aug. 31st with a deluge of registrations and package plan purchases. In the evening, a most plentiful buffet of Armenian foods set the tone and filled everyone's appetite. The food was a generous donation by the Parish Women's Guild. A dance followed the food...and featured a dynamite "breakdancer" performance from a semi-professional group of about 15 very enthusiastic members. Naturally, the get-acquainted parties and the like lasted well into the night. Only the serious-minded athletes were missing.

Saturday, athletic competitions began in the over 35 offered events. "Well organized" and "well executed" were the comments of the hard-to-please Armenian athletes. The games ended on time (believe it or not) and the focus shifted from the athletic fields to an elegant banquet hall called the Lexington House. The Red-White-and-Blue decor was a fitting backdrop to the "Alum-Hye Dance" which followed the banquet.

His Eminence, Archbishop Torkom Manoogian, Primate of the Diocese, was on hand for the entire Weekend affair, attending athletic games and presiding over the official night time events. Sunday morning, the Primate led the parish, with its many out-of-town guests in Morning Services and presided at Divine Liturgy. Many ACYOA members participated in the Services, including serving at the Altar and in the Choir.

During the Weekend, a special program of seminars entitled, "INSIGHTS" was offered and well attended. The seminars dealt with various topics using Biblical references and a discussion format. The well received pro-

gram was a relief from the usual itinerary of constant parties, dances, athletics and shopping excursions. Look for these seminars in future years.

Sunday afternoon brought the final competitions of the Weekend. The men's basketball final pitted a strong Detroit team against a surprise entry from the Wisconsin ACYOA. Wisconsin held off a late Detroit surge and won the championship. Detroit was also in the other major team-sport final, again versus a surprise finalist - St. Catherines from Canada. Although Detroit won, it was St. Catherines who predicted that they would be in the final round at last year's Weekend (their first).

Sunday evening brought the customary Awards Banquet and Dance - which was probably the best food ever offered at a Weekend Banquet. Filet Mignon cooked to perfection!

The Ballroom was filled as everyone attended this evening's festivities. Awarded the Sam Nersesian Award for outstanding Christian Character was Susan Boyajian of the Palos Heights ACYOA. Susan was elected to the ACYOA Central Council during the Assembly which preceded the Weekend. The Chapter selected as the most outstanding and given the "A" Award of ACYOA was the Palos Heights Chapter - perhaps the first time ever that the Chapter hosting the Weekend won that year's "A" Award. Honorable Mention went to the Watertown Chapter, after having a most improved year with many activities and consistent service.

The major Awards were won by: Babayan Cup, over-all Weekend champs, won by Detroit; Kulhanjian Chapter Sportsmanship Award Trophy won by St. Catherines; Yaghoobian Individual Sportsmanship Award Trophy won by Stephen Sarkisian (Watertown), who won last year's Sam Nersesian Award. In all, over 100 trophies and medals were present to 1st, 2nd and 3rd place winners. His Eminence, the Primate, personally congratulated all the recipients and presented each with their medals.

The customary Farewell Picnic took place on Monday on the grounds of the Parish Church, a fine ending to a great Weekend.

ACYOA Central Council Elects Officers

Immediately following the General Assembly, the ACYOA Central Council met with His Eminence, Archbishop Torkom Manoogian, Primate, and Mr. James Magarian, Executive Secretary to the ACYOA, in a transitional meeting of out-going and in-coming Council members.

Fulfilling their two year terms in office were Melanie Barsamian (not present) and Vaughan Totovian. Elected to fill the two positions were Susan Boyajian of Palos Heights, and Shake Ajamian of Bayside.

The meeting dealt with the various responsibilities of the Council members and the selection of offices, program and regional assignments. The Primate informed the members on the importance of their role and that they must be committed to their work. Mr. Magarian reviewed in detail the responsibilities and distributed the "Operations and Procedures" guide of the Council.

Officers and Regional Assignments for the 1984-85 ACYOA year are:

Archbishop Addresses Assembly

The following is excerpted from the annual Address of the Primate, His Eminence Archbishop Torkom Manoogian, National President of the ACYOA:

"You all know the meaning of "burned out". That could happen to all individuals, institutions, families, managers, professionals, if they lose sight of beliefs, ideals, and spiritual strengths. You cannot let this happen, you must be serious about our faith, about our tradition, about our mission as Christians. By keeping in touch with God you will be able to manage your problems better, God shall be an infinite source in solving your problems. Let this Assembly be a turning point for all. That should not be very difficult to do, since it can be done by following a few simple guides:

REVIEWING YOUR PAST - Who are you? Where did you come from? What's your philosophy in life? What are your values in life and religion?

EDUCATING YOURSELF - Training may be a grind, but it brings with it power. Knowledgeable people are the ones who will impress the powerful.

LOOKING AT ALL THE OPTIONS AVAILABLE - What are your goals? What do you need to achieve them? There are far more possibilities than you think.

REORGANIZING - If you haven't yet succeeded try to reorganize yourself. You know who you were last year, the year before, but you are not the same today.

ELECTING THE BEST POSSIBILITY - Avoid mediocrity which can easily choke your enthusiasm. Choose to follow the best course.

DOING SOMETHING DARING - Take a risk. Make a commitment. Unless you dare to take a risk, you'll never get ahead. People who risk nothing, do nothing, have nothing, are nothing.

A father once said, "Son, you have to set a goal and never quit. Remember Katch Vartan?" The son said, "Yes." "Aram Khatchadourian?" "Yes," said the son. "William Saroyan?" asked the father. "Yes, father I do." The father said, "Yes, they didn't quit. Remember Harry Narikian?" The son pondered, and said, "No. Who was he?" "See, you don't remember him. He quit," his father told him.

Educational Program again a Highlight of ACYOA Assembly

The Annual ACYOA General Assembly again featured a special EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM presented during the meeting sessions.

This year, the Rev. Fr. Garabed Kochakian made an outstanding presentation on the sacrament of Holy Matrimony. Entitled, AN ARMENIAN MARRIAGE: Role Models, Sexuality, Tradition - ARE YOU READY? the presentation was well received by the Assembly delegates and others, as the program was open to the public.

Father Garabed did an outstanding job of researching the customs of Holy Matrimony of the Armenians from the village days hundreds of years ago, to our present day customs - and dilemmas.

Some of the questions addressed included:

1. Should I get married in the Church?
2. Should I get married in the Armenian Church?
3. What is it to be Lord?
4. What is it to be Obedient?
5. What do I expect from a relationship in marriage?
6. What can I give to a relationship in marriage?
7. Can I change "ME" to "US" ?

A lively discussion period followed, with several key questions asked. Time did not allow for in depth discussion, and the consensus was to present this program again for a more at length look at "An Armenian Marriage."
