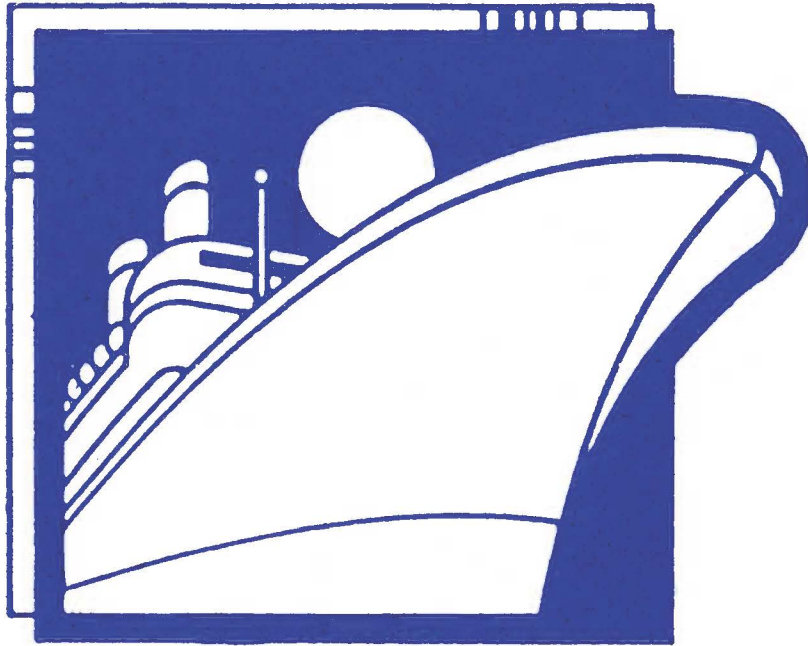

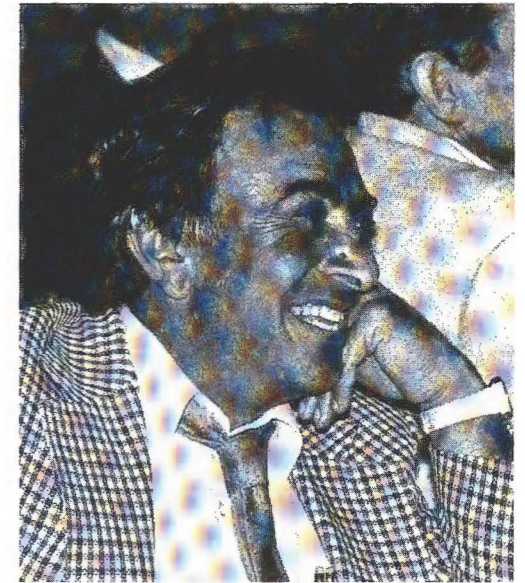

Vernon Hampar Assarian
1939-1992



This Commemorative Booklet is dedicated in memory of Vernon H. Assarian, an active member of the St. James Community whose hard work and dedication to the Church and his family should stand as a model for all young people to follow.

Vernon was born in 1939, and was an enthusiastic participant in sports and numerous club and community activities as a youth in Watertown. He obtained his Associate Degree in Mechanical Engineering from Wentworth Institute in 1959 and completed his formal education at Northeastern University where he earned his Bachelor of Engineering Technology Degree in 1975.

Vernon served in the Air Force National Guard which included a one-year tour of active duty in Phalsbourg, France during the Berlin crisis. After returning home, he resumed his employment at Draper Laboratories in Cambridge, Massachusetts for thirty-one years.

Vernon was a lifelong member of St. James. He served as chairman of the ACYOA Juniors and Seniors where he started the annual "Christmas Tree Sale"-now a 40 year tradition of the ACYOA in Watertown. Vernon also served as altar boy, Sunday School teacher, chairman of the Mr. and Mrs. Club, member of the Men's Club, Parish Councilman, and Bazaar Chairman. He was the recipient of the New England Regional ACYOA Alumni Award in 1980 and the Parishioner of the Year in 1992.

The Watertown ACYOA thanks Vernon for his dedication to the ACYOA and St. James and only wishes that there will be more people in this world like him. He will be sorely missed in his community, but his presence will remain in all of our hearts.

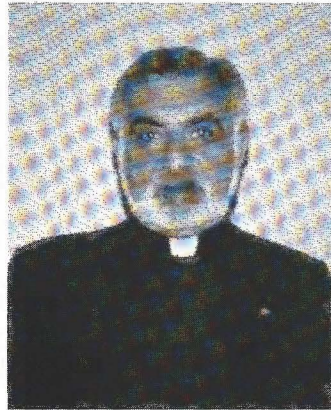

Annual gatherings such as the ACYOA General Assembly and National Sports Weekend, are always a time for reminiscence, a time to remember past gatherings, old friends, different generations. For me, one of the most memorable Labor Day Weekends took place at George Williams College on placid Lake Geneva, Wisconsin. It was 1968, not a very placid year. It was a time of volatile protest throughout the world. Young people took to the streets to protest against war, to protest against the status quo, against selfish exploitation, against worn-out political opportunism. Young people were literally changing the course of history.

Just one week before the 1968 Labor Day Weekend, and barely fifty miles from the site of the ACYOA Assembly, the national convention of a major political party was disrupted by massive demonstrations. It was inevitable that such a climate, that such events would find an echo among the youth of our church. The product of that ferment was the "Williams Bay Manifesto", presented at the General Assembly of the ACYOA on September 2, 1968. The Manifesto was not formally adopted by the Assembly, but it was personally endorsed by many delegates.

The "Williams Bay Manifesto" was rebutted, attacked and reviled by leaders of the Armenian community throughout the world as dangerous, puerile and superficial. Much of the criticism, perhaps, but not the vitriolic manner in which it was conveyed. Indeed, from the perspective of twenty-five years, the Manifesto appears much too confrontational and probably goaded its critics to make their angry responses. One fundamental criticism of the document, that its critics never made, is that not once does it mention love, the most basic value of Christian life.

The importance of the "Williams Bay Manifesto", however, is not in what it said, but that it was said. Here were young people asking their adult leaders to listen to them. Perhaps they were too strident, but they were heard, even as they were put down.

What was the whole point of the "Williams Bay Manifesto"? Simply that young people, then as now, want a church that is relevant to their needs. They want to be a part of growth. They are not satisfied with answers that make no sense and do not relate to their own experience. Young people always question, if they are on a quest, particularly if they are looking for ultimate meaning, seeking God. In the life of any community, it is the function of youth to ask questions. That community is dead, whose young people do not question. If we are able to see past the rhetoric, we can discover this quest in the Manifesto.

1993 is not 1968. Much has changed, and yet much remains the same. An independent Armenian state was an impossible dream then, but now the problems of freedom need to be resolved. "Poverty, hunger, disease, wars, racial tensions, social discontent and turmoil" are our social problems now and not just of "the world around us". The Armenian Church in the homeland of our fathers has now the opportunity to grow without fear of repression, and the Armenian Church in the diaspora has the opportunity of assist both spiritually and materially. We continue to fear assimilation, even though we now have more priests in our diocese who were raised in Armenia than in any other country.

The Manifesto has almost been forgotten, and yet it is a part of ACYOA history. However much it can be a product of its time and circumstance, however purple the prose, there is truth in it. According to St. Paul, the church is a living organism (Romans 12:4-8), I Corinthians 12:12-27). As such, the church must be able to reason, which is the ability to discern, to examine, to be self-critical, else it become uncritical, irrational or petrified. Youth plays the vital role of asking the questions. Those who answer must first listen with understanding and respond with love, without hypocrisy and always by example.

In the final analysis, the "Williams Bay Manifesto" in its own way is indicative of the strength of the Armenian Church. It was not a destructive statement, but the passionate cry of young Armenian Christians, who loved their Church and its ancient heritage. They felt comfortable enough within its bosom to criticize a parent, their mother church, whose future was of deep concern to them, because it was their future.

May the 1993 ACYOA General Assembly and National Sports Weekend give this generation an opportunity to question, to quest, to grow, to mature. May this weekend be for all of you who come to Boston as significant and as memorable as that 1968 Labor Day Weekend in Williams Bay was for me.

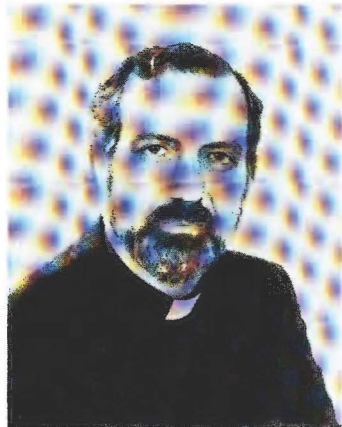

ALL FOR A GOOD CAUSE

Criticism is good if it serves a constructive purpose. Criticism can be very harmful, even destructive. Either way, it causes controversy. It is the hope of those who criticize for a constructive purpose that it prompts action for a good cause. God causes many controversies in the hearts and minds of humans, but all for a good purpose. He keeps us moving. Youth is a wonderful time in life, yet it is also a very agonizing period: there are dreams; and there are the "ongoing" realities of life to which one must constantly adjust- the highs and lows of life. It is good to dream but not to go through life like "a dreamer", that is, expectations should be reconciled and are tempered with realities without becoming subservient to them. Once a young man in his twenties asked that I be supportive to a proposal by the church's baseball team to the parish council for some uniforms, using the rationale that they, the youth, being the future of the church, should be supported. I told him that I would be more than willing but conveyed my thoughts concerning the word "youth" I told him I considered those between the age of 8-14 as youth and those older as adults, and as such, being in his twenties, he was more-or-less part of the "over-the-hill" gang as far as youth was concerned. Our young adults should learn to make their presence known from an early age by taking on responsibilities contributing towards the spiritual and physical up-keep of their respective parishes. In a quiet but effectual way, they will be making their voices heard. It is not an easy task in that it takes away from precious time for other things. But what is easy? If all this causes an uneasiness, the intent is for a good purpose - acquiring a right attitude, which in the long haul, is needed and is a great asset in the total span of life. Don't wait. Don't procrastinate. Act, but do so responsibly.

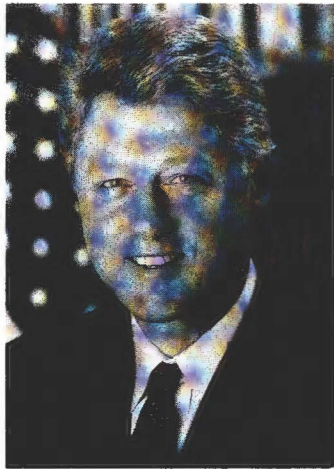

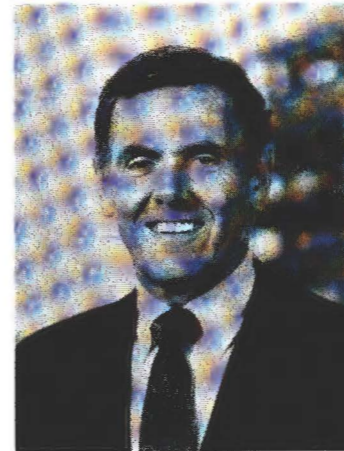
Greetings to everyone gathered for this year's General Assembly and National Sports Weekend of the Armenian Church Youth Organization of America.

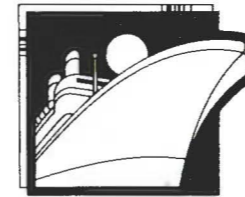

I would like to thank the ACYOA Central Council, the Watertown chapter and all ACYOA members for their hospitality both for this Sports Weekend and for years past. It is only during these great events that we can understand what is meant by the phrase <<the Armenian Church family>> as Armenian youth from across North America come together in the love of Christ.

You will be pleased to know that the ACYO north of the border has been very busy for the last few months:

- The 1993 ACYOC General Assembly and National Sports Weekend in Mississauga was extremely successful with over 90 participants from across Canada;

- The Armenia Medical Clinic Project is now fully under way. Construction of the foundations began last June in the Artik region of Northern Armenia and the project should be completed next summer when a group of ACYOC members will be traveling to Armenia for the official opening;

- The Canadian Youth Mission to Armenia, a project of the Canadian Diocese, had a strong contingent of ACYOC members during its first annual trip in July and August. Twenty-eight young Armenian-Canadians volunteered their summer time to help renovate homes, a medical clinic and a kindergarten as well as distribute winter clothes, medicine and prayer books in the Ararat region of Armenia;

- The ACYOC is expanding to the different smaller and new mission parishes throughout the Diocese, including Hamilton, Windsor, Brossard, Laval and Halifax. We need to embrace Armenian youth in smaller communities to stall and hopefully stop the trend towards assimilation.

In closing, I would like to invite you all to the next ACYOC National Sports Weekend which will be held June 30th - July 3rd in Toronto, Ontario. Come and spend your Independence Day weekend with us! Hope to see you there in large numbers.

“Williams Bay Manifesto”

*Presented at the ACYOA General Assembly
September 2, 1968 - Williams Bay, Wisconsin*

The world is in an age of revolution, a time of changing and becoming. The Church, if it is to be relevant to the world, must speak of God's will in terms of today. Christianity is not a religion for the timid, for it takes courage and strength of conviction to resist that which is comfortable, convenient and traditional in favor of God's will, which may at times be difficult. Christ continually calls His followers to renewal, reform, and revolution.

As the youth of the Armenian Church, we are disturbed by our Church's refusal to be a part of the twentieth century, to face the urgent and real problems of today, and to seek Christian solutions to them. Poverty, hunger, disease, wars, racial tensions, social discontent and turmoil sear the world around us, and yet our Church concerns itself mainly with erecting costly buildings and monuments and amassing material goods, rationalizing that it is necessary to self-preservation. We want our Church to see beyond its own interests, to share others' sufferings and problems.

At present, in the mind of many Armenians, the Armenian Church's primary function is to act as the defender of nationalism, to protect Armenians from assimilation. This is indicated by their fear to reform, for they worry that with change would come a certain loss of identity. On the contrary, we feel that specific reforms would bring increased dedication and enthusiasm, a renewal and rebirth of our Church.

Apathy and spiritual indifference pervade our Church life. Few Church members have that sincere relationship with God which is the basis of Christian living. We, as the youth, are not simply condemning the adults of our Church; we can see the same problems among ourselves. The ACYOA is suffering from an internal malaise; membership has fallen off, only socials and dances are well attended, spiritual growth has come to a complete standstill.

The time has come when we, the youth of the Armenian Church, can no longer in conscience allow ourselves to be used as instruments for the preservation of a Church which is living in the archaic past. We feel we must make known our discontent with the present antiquated and meaningless structures and institutions and our desire to ameliorate the stagnated condition of the Church which is ours. We are told so often that the Church belongs to us; therefore, we have not only the right, but the duty to see that our Church relates to the present day, and thus, becomes meaningful to its members. We are committed to action... the watchword is revolution. Our revolutionary commitment and action addresses itself to a radical concern of making Christ live and grow in our Church and members. We are now resolved to speak out and act in accordance with the dictates of our conscience in all areas of life within and without our Church, wherever Christ is being crucified anew.
