The biggest and best of the country's Bicentennial Celebration will be happening right here! New York City, the country's first capital, will be the focal point of Bicentennial Week, July 3 to 8. And what a week it will be! To honor America's seafaring heritage there will be OPERATION SAIL, a colorful assemblage of 225 sailing ships with up to 17 tall-masted vessels stretching over 200' each in length. This unique fleet of barquentines, brigantines, yawls and schooners will sail up the Hudson River on July 4th in the biggest sea parade in history, then dock for public viewing. There'll be the INTERNATIONAL NAVAL REVIEW, a parade of modern Navy vessels from all over the world, with more than 50 ships from thirty participating countries. Then there's JULY 4th in OLD NEW YORK, a special 200th birthday present to the country! It will begin with a sunrise service in Battery Park, and continue throughout July 4th in historic lower Manhattan with free ethnic festivals, concerts, theater exhibits. AND MORE! There will be performances and parades for children. Historic walking tours. Re-enactments of colonial events. Dramatic readings. The Newport Jazz Festival. American Symphony Orchestra. Pageants. Fireworks. Join America's most exciting city for the most sensational birthday party in the world — Salute '76 in New York!



## Look what's going on in the Big Apple!\*

### Parades

July 3rd, 8 a.m. — 12 noon

The ships of the International Naval Review will steam into New York Harbor in a 22-mile-long column, moving from the Verrazano Narrows up the Hudson River to the George Washington Bridge. This 50-ship fleet will represent more than thirty foreign navies as well as our own U.S. Navy. The U.S. aircraft carrier "Forrestal" will be the host ship for the International Naval Review. The naval vessels will anchor in the Hudson River and the Upper Bay.

July 3rd, 1 p.m. — 5 p.m.

A Pre-Operational Sail parade with more than 100 international ships will sail down Manhattan's East River to anchorages off Brooklyn's Gravesend Bay.

Eve of July 4th, 7 p.m. — 10 p.m.

A parade of thousands of young people featuring 14 floats that depict the history of the United States will move up the Avenue of Americas, culminating in a fireworks display in Central Park.

July 4th, 11 a.m. — 5 p.m.

Operation Sail, a grand parade of 225 international sailing ships, will sail from the Verrazano Bridge at the harbor's entrance, past the Statue of Liberty, up the Hudson River to Spuyten Duyvil, two miles north of the George Washington Bridge. Leading the parade will be the U.S. Coast Guard bark "Eagle," the host ship, along with 16 tall-masted ships from around the world, including the "Libertad" of Argentina, the "Juan Sebastian de Elcano" of Spain, the "Danmark" of Denmark, the "Amerigo Vespucci" of Italy, the "Nippon Maru" of Japan and the "Christian Radich" of Norway. The parade will be reviewed by a flotilla of modern naval vessels stretching 20 miles along the Hudson, and by millions of spectators from the shorelines.

July 4th in Old New York, 4:30 — 6:00 p.m.

A giant parade and carnival, complete with marching bands, floats, musicians, performers and other celebrants will move from City Hall to Battery Park.

July 6th, 12 noon — 1 p.m.

Operation Sail/International Naval Review Land Parade with units from all of the countries represented in these great maritime events will march from Battery Park to City Hall where Mayor Beame will formally welcome the captains and crews of the ships.

### Festivals

July 3rd, 10 a.m. — 5 p.m.

The "New York Bicentennial Heritage Festival" at Rockefeller Center, sponsored by The Lincoln Savings Bank, with over 20 ethnic groups offering song and dance performances will highlight their contributions to New York City's ethnic tapestry.

July 3rd, 12 noon — 2 p.m.

The Ferry Point Park Festival in The Bronx (Brush & Schley Aves.) will feature performances, concerts, military bands, street theatre, sea chanties and dance companies.

July 4th, 8 a.m. — 9:30 p.m.

"July 4th in Old New York," the City's official celebration for the Bicentennial. On this historic day, Old New York (from City Hall to the Battery, river to river) will become a panoramic background for living history, ethnic festivals, American music, parades, children's plazas, crafts, re-enactments, theatre, readings, and concerts. Lower Manhattan streets will be transformed into New Amsterdam and Young New York; Wall Street will be draped in special designer banners. There will be tours, special exhibitions, concerts, and fireworks sponsored by Macy's. On the Nation's 200th Birthday, New York will have a celebration that will be as unique as its people.

July 3rd

Commemorative celebrations will take place in Brooklyn at Martyr's Monument in Fort Greene Park.

July 5th, 11:30 a.m. — 4:30 p.m.

Continuous music by the Newport Jazz Festival on Broadway from 50th to 54th Streets will celebrate SWING STREET, the most famous landmark in the history of jazz.

July 5th

Community and ethnic festivals will be held at docking sites in Brooklyn and Staten Island as residents welcome cadets from the sailing and naval vessels.

### Music

July 4th, 4:30 p.m.

Count Basie will lead the Newport Jazz Festival in a free concert at the World Trade Center.

July 4th, 7:30 p.m.

Morton Gould and the American Symphony Orchestra will present "An Evening of Americana" in Battery Park which will culminate in a spectacular fireworks display shot from barges around the Statue of Liberty.

July 4th, 7:30 p.m. — 8:30 p.m.

Leonard Bernstein will conduct the New York Philharmonic Concert in Central Park.

July 4th, 7:30 p.m.

U.S. Coast Guard Band will perform at Inwood Park.

July 4th, 7:30 p.m.

U.S. Navy Band will perform at the World Trade Center Plaza.

July 3rd — 8th

There will be more than 25 concerts presented by the U.S. Coast Guard Band, the U.S. Navy Band, Queens Symphonic Band and High School Marching Bands at locations in The Bronx, Brooklyn, Queens, Staten Island and Manhattan.

### Exhibits

"Revolution in New York" — A continuous 21-screen multimedia show depicting revolutionary activity in New York from 1750 to 1789 will be on exhibit at the Museum of the City of New York.

"200 Years of American Sculpture" — A comprehensive survey of American sculpture spanning two centuries will occupy all of the galleries at the Whitney Museum of American Art.

"The American Idea: Discovery and Settlement, Revolution and Independence" — An exhibition of rare documents, including one of the first printed copies of the Declaration of Independence, will be on display at the New York Public Library's central building on Fifth Avenue and 42nd Street.

"New York to 1765," "New York in the American Revolution," "John Pintard and His Society," and "Manhattan Now" — four Bicentennial exhibits will be featured at the New York Historical Society.

"American Decorative Arts" — 25 period rooms dating from 1675-1885, will be highlighted at the Brooklyn Museum.

### Tours

July 5th — 7th

Sailing ships and naval vessels will be open for public visiting at berths all around the City. Music of the many nations participating in Operation Sail and the International Naval Review will be heard on board the ships.

Ongoing

Heritage Trail in lower Manhattan will be a self-guided tour of 16 historic sites. Colorful markers and trailblazers will point the way to such sites as Federal Hall, Fraunces Tavern, Castle Clinton and South Street Seaport.
