PASTORAL REPORT

Dear Parishioners,

The year 1966 marked a new era in our metropolitan parish. By the fall of the year our most cherished dream was realized with the completion, dedication and occupancy of our new church. It is also noteworthy that in 1966 we experienced the successful pastoral operation of our parish.

As we embark upon the New Year, a new chapter unfolds in the life of our community with the new church and our modern facilities. We look into the future with the sincere hope of serving our church to the greater glory of God.

We herewith submit for review a brief account of some of our pastoral activities and accomplishments during 1966:

WORSHIP

Divine Liturgy was held every Sunday. In addition to church services, it should be noted that during all of the Sundays of the year, without exception, appropriate sermons were given in both Armenian and English. Divine Liturgy and other church ceremonies were also conducted on special occasions.

ARMENIAN CHRISTMAS (Thu., January 6)

Badarak was offered with the participation of members of the Cultural Society of Armenians from Istanbul singing the Gomidasian version of the Badarak under the direction of Deacon Harry Ekzian.

FEAST OF ST. VARTAN (Thu., February 17). Badarak was celebrated.

HOLY COMMUNION SERVICE FOR CHILDREN OF THE CHURCH AND ARMENIAN SCHOOLS (Sat. morning, January 8)

This special Badarak was performed on the occasion of Armenian Christmas.

THEOPHANY EVE, "JURAKALOUYTZ" (Sat., January 8).
Badarak was celebrated.

BLESSING OF WATER, "CHURORHNEK" (Sun., January 9)
This ceremony was performed in commemoration of Christ's Baptism on Armenian Christmas.

SUNRISE SERVICES were performed during Lenten Sundays.

LENTEN VIGIL SERVICES (PEACE AND REST HOURS) were held every Wednesday during Lent.

HOLY WEEK OBSERVANCES were conducted with

MAUNDY THURSDAY (Thu. noon, April 7)

Badarak was celebrated in commemoration of the Last Supper and Institution of Holy Communion.

TRE-ORE SERVICE, CRUCIFIXION OF CHRIST, in English (Good Fri. noon, April 8)

BURIAL OF CHRIST, "TAGHOOM" (Good Fri. evening, April 8)

HOLY COMMUNION SERVICE FOR CHILDREN OF THE CHURCH AND ARMENIAN SCHOOLS (Sat. morning, April 9)

This special Badarak was performed on the occasion of Easter.

EASTER EVE, "JURAKALOUYTZ" (Sat. evening, April 9).
Badarak was celebrated.

GRAPE BLESSING CEREMONY on the Feast of the Assumption of the Holy Mother of God (Sun., August 14)

FESTIVE ANTASDAN (Processional of Blessing of Four Corners of the World), on the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross (Sun., September 11)

ANTASDAN was performed on major Holy Days during the morning hour preceding the solemn High Mass.

PONTIFICAL PRAYER, "HAYRABEDAGAN MAGHTANK," services were offered on various occasions according to our church calendar, including the Name Day of the Catholicos (Thu., February 17); the 11th anniversary of the consecration of His Holiness, the Catholicos (Sun., October 9); and on the Feast Day of Holy Etchmiadzin (Sun., June 12).

HOKEHANKIST (Requiem Mass) was conducted almost every Sunday as requested by parishioners and also on special occasions as directed by the Diocese.

SACRAMENTS AND RITES

The following services have been duly recorded in our Parish Registry for 1966:

BAPTISMS AND CONFIRMATIONS, 70. In addition to this number, 7 adults baptisms and 5 confirmations were separately administered as a result of conversion cases of non-Armenian Christian faiths to the Armenian Apostolic faith in connection with their marriage to an Armenian.

WEDDINGS, 24. Several BETROTHALS were also performed. FUNERALS, 74.

VISITATIONS

This is a very important service for cementing good relationship between the church and its members. Pastoral visitations were rendered conscientiously to the best of our ability and time with warmth and understanding. During the year, numerous contacts were made including at least 300 sick calls in hospitals and homes; consolation visits to be eaved families; and Christian fellowship visits on different occasions, numbering approximately 400. Pastoral counseling and conferences were extended whenever requested.

MEETINGS

The Pastora attended and presided over the meetings of the Parish Council, Apostolic Society and almost all of those of the membership and executive body meetings scheduled by the church organizations, giving their advice and guidance. Meetings included those of standing and special committees. All church functions were attended. Considering the great number of meetings and functions of our metropolitan church and community, the Pastors had to attend an average of at least one meeting each day of the year.

CHURCH PUBLICATIONS

The Jahagir (The Torch Bearer), official paper of our paris' was published monthly during 1966 and was sent to a church mailing list of approximately 1,800. Every effort is made to present topics of interest to our membership as well as current and timely news pertaining to our parish. In addition to the Annual Reports Booklet for 1965, special issues of bulletins were published on the occasion of the bestowal of ecclesiastical honors upon our Pastors (March); Dedication of our New Church and the First Official Visi of the New Primate to our City (November); Tercentenary Observance of the First Printing of the Armenian Bible (December) and the 45th Anniversary of the Ladies' Auxiliary (December) Sunday bulletins were prepared for each Sunday of the year and other announcements and fliers on numerous occasions.

CULTURAL ACTIVITIES

The church maintained its regular cultural activities with the Pastors as the prime movers in these affairs. Also, the formation of a new AGBU Midwest District Committee in Detroit, with Mr. Mihran Kupelian as its Executive Secretary, greatly increased in quantity and quality the cultural programs in our building with the participation of distinquished guest lecturers. The Pastors encouraged these activities with their attendance and participation in varied programs which were held during the past year.

DIOCESAN ASSEMBLY AND CLERGY CONFERENCE

The Pastors accompanied the other Diocesan delegates of the church participating in the Diocesan Assembly at St. Thomas Armenian Church, Tenafly, New Jersey (April 29 - May 1) and contributed to the deliberations. The 1966 Assembly was an election meeting, and the new Primate elected was Bishop Torkom Manoogian. The Pastors also attended the Clergy Conference which preceded the Diocesan Assembly at the same site.

20TH ANNUAL ACYOA ASSEMBLY

The 20th Annual Assembly of the ACYOA convened in Providence, Rhode Island, on Friday, September 2 through Monday, September 5. Preceding the Youth Assembly, a Clergymen's Conference was held under the presidency of the new Primate, Bishop Torkom, in Saints Sahag and Mesrob Church in Providence. Fr. Diran attended the proceedings.

DIOCESAN COUNCIL

The Very Rev. Yeghishe V. Gizirian, a member of the Diocesan Council, attended the monthly meetings of the Council in New York during the year.

METROPOLITAN DETROIT COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

Our Church is a member of the Metropolitan Detroit Council of Churches which is comprised of 800 churches representing 23 denominations. The Pastors tried to fulfill their obligations to this august religious body, serving on the Board of Directors and attending various departmental meetings whenever possible.

INTER-CHURCH AND CIVIC RELATIONS

The Pastors endeavored to maintain good relations with our community-at-large, including churches and civic groups. Whenever contacted by any church or organizations to offer invocations and/or present lectures, requests were fulfilled by our own personal interest. The following are noteworthy:

- An Invocation was offered at the groundbreaking ceremony of the Michigan Credit Union League in Southfield on Saturday, March 5.
- An Invocation was offered for the National Association of Letter Carriers' 45th Biennial Convention held at Cobo Hall on Sunday, August 14.
- A Prayer of Peace for the United Nations was offered at the United Nations Day observance of its 21st Anniversary at the Southfield City Hall, sponsored by the Southfield Optimist Club, on Monday, October 24.
- An Invocation was given at the Boy Scout Court of Honor ceremony held at the Longfellow School in Royal Oak in connection with the Eagle Scout award presented to Leon Sarkisian, a student of our Church School, on Tuesday, November 15. A Prayer of Thanksgiving was offered at the Union Thanks-
- A Prayer of Thanksgiving was offered at the Union Thanksgiving Eve Service of the Southfield Ministerial Association held at the Community Congregational Church in Lathrup Village on Wednesday, November 2.

DEDICATION AND CONSECRATION OF NEW CHURCH

Our new church was dedicated and consecrated on November 19-20 with great festivity by Bishop Torkom Manoogian, our new Primate, with the assistance of the Pastors and guest clergy.

The impressive order for the Dedication of the Sixteen Pillars, Main Door and Ambon in the name of the Holy Apostles, Four Evangelists, and St. Gregory the Enlightener took place on Sunday, November 20. The sixteen godfathers of the pillars, main door and ambon participating in the ceremony were: Deacon Ara Haig, George Keurajian, Edward C. Sarkisian, Arshavir Yeghissian, Hmayag Semerjian, Deacon John K. Semizian, Haig Jizmejian, Jack Kavlakian, George D. Bayleran, Vahram Boyajian, Paul Mazloumian, Sooren Gozmanian, Haigas Yagoobian, Harry A. Kezelian, Khoren Thomassian, Dr. Dennis Papazian, George Mashlakjian (main door) and Deacon Mihran Hoplamazian (ambon in the chancel).

It is the earnest hope and desire of our community that when His Holiness, Lord Lord Vasken I, Catholicos of All Armenians, visits the United States again to consecrate our Mother Cathedral in New York in 1968, he will come to Detroit to consecrate the main altar of our church. Patriarchal consecration will be a natural culmination since it was with the hands of our Holy Father that the entire site of the new church was blessed in June 1960.

GUEST CLERGY

Throughout the year our church played host to distinguished clergymen who were in town in connection with some mission or cultural activity. TIRAN ARCHBISHOP NERSOYAN, former Primate of our Diocese, visited our parish and relatives November 23-30, and delivered the first sermon in our new house of worship on Sunday, November 27, following the Dedication of the Church on November 20. Surpazan Hayr also delivered an address to our Church School children on Monday, November 28.

We extend our boundless gratitude and appreciation to all of our church organizations and their respective standing committees and to our parishioners for their ardent dedication and indispensable efforts on behalf of our church. Gizirian in the Armenian Cultural Building to conduct a formal transfer of duties following the ratification and blessings of the newly-constituted Parish Council by Archbishop Sion Manoogian, Primate of the Diocese. Regular and Special Meetings During 1966

A total of 29 regular meetings were held during the year, 2 of which were held with the Diocesan Delegates. Three Quarterly Meetings were held with all of the executive bodies of our church-affiliated organizations as well as special meetings with various auxiliaries of the church, Church Schools and the Armenian-American Veterans of Detroit to discuss problems arising within these groups and to clarify the policy and decisions of the Council.

Church Membership and Pledge System

Our mailing list numbers approximately 1,800 and our pledge-paying membership, 930. It is regretable that approximately 200 delinquent pledgees have not fulfilled their promise to the church. It is estimated that 25,000 Armenians live in the metropolitan area; more than one-half of this number expects to be ministered to by our parish.

As a result of the proposal presented by the Parish Council to the Annual Parish Assembly held on February 24, 1966 and approved and passed by this Assembly to increase membership dues, church sacraments, including baptisms, weddings and funerals, are performed without a fee to all church pledge-paying members-ingood-standing.

House Committee

This Committee, under the chairmanship of Mr. Vahe Papelian, has closely supervised the use and activities of our Cultural Building. It is constantly striving to improve the building facilities, services, maintenance, etc. The excellent condition of our building is a source of satisfaction to our entire community and is the result of the concerted efforts of the House Committee and our capable maintenance staff. Under the supervision of Mr. Frank Bartholomew.

Armenian Community Memorial at Woodlawn Cemetery

The Armenian Community Memorial at Woodlawn Cemetery, realized in 1961, was a rewarding success. As a result, the project was expanded in 1964 and an additional 1,000 plots were added to the original property. The Church encourages her people to participate in the 1967 campaign to successfully terminate the second half of this great undertaking.

Mr. Sooren Gozmanian, chairman of this project, advises that to date the sale of lots has been at such a rate that the church would not have to make any payments to the Woodlawn organization for its commitment. However, if there is not a marked increase in the sale of cemetery lots, the church will be required to begin making payments to the Woodlawn association. It is hoped that every parishioner will reexamine his position and if he has not as yet made a purchase, he will do so early in 1967 to take advantage of our present low prices.

Parish Council Pledge to Building Fund

A pledge of \$50,000 was made to the Armenian Apostolic Society in 1964 by the Parish Council, the sum of which was to be paid in three years. The third and last installment of \$15,000 was paid in 1966, completing our pledge. At the dedication Banquet of our Church on November 20, a new pledge of \$20,000, payable in two years, was made to the Society by the Council.

Church Picnic

The Annual Church Picnic took place on Sunday, August 14, at the Michigan State Fair Grounds under the chairmanship of Mr. Sooren Gozmanian and co-chairman, Mr. Albert Sarkisian. The Picnic Chairman and Parish Council are grateful to all of our church organizations and energetic committees who volunteered their time and talents to make this affair the gratifying success that it was. The Council especially commends Mr. Gozmanian for the fine organization of the picnic and the efficient manner in which it was conducted.

New Year's Eve Celebration

The sixth Annual New Year's Eve Celebration, sponsored by the church in the Cultural Building, was a tremendous success. This affair continued in the tradition of giving our people an enjoyable evening in a beautiful atmosphere.

The Parish Council is grateful to the New Year's Eve Committee and particularly to Mr. John Semizian, chairman of this year's affair, for the excellent job they rendered in providing those in attendance an unforgettable evening. It was a gratifying social and financial success.

Scholarships

The Parish Council was instrumental in financially assisting students to attend the Summer Study Program of St. Nersess School in Evanston, Illinois, and in aiding programs of our Junior ACYOA Chapter during 1966.

Pastors Honored

In a special ceremony during church services held on Sunday, March 20, the Pastors of our church were honored with religious distinctions by Archbishop Sion Manoogian, Primate of our Diocese. The Very Rev. Yeghishe Vartabed Gizirian was elevated to the rank of Dzayrakouyn Vartabed, and the right to wear a pectoral cross was conferred upon The Rev. Fr. Diran Papazian by means of a special pontifical encyclical from His Holiness, Lord Lord Vasken I, Catholicos of All Armenians.

The Detroit chapters of the Armenian Church Youth Organization of America tendered a banquet and program that evening on the occasion of the celebration of ACYOA Day in honor of our Pastors, under the auspices of the Parish Council. His Eminence, Archbishop Sion Manoogian, presided over the affair.

Dedication and Consecration of New Church

It was a source of deep gratification to envisage the fruition of our dream -- the Dedication and Consecration of the New Church -- on November 19-20. This accomplishment is the realization of the fond dream of a decade.

With thanksgiving the Parish Council acknowledges the Christian efforts of the Armenian Apostolic Society, church organizations, and all those individuals who in some way, large or small, contributed to making the weekend ceremonies of November 19-20 a memorable and historical event in the life of our parish and community.

Apostolic Society and Dedication of New Church

The Armenian Apostolic Society, Inc., peculiar to our own parish, serves as the building committee responsible for the erection of our cultural and church buildings.

Following the completion of the new Armenian Cultural Building in Southfield in 1961, the Society launched its next great phase of concruction of the church proper adjacent to the Building.

Under the dynamic leadership of Messrs. Alex Manoogian and Edward Mardigian, the Apostolic Society and its dedicated lay members gave great impetus to the construction of the new church. It was on November 19-20 that the Dedication and Consecration of our New Church was performed, marking the culmination of the second important project of the Society. The ceremonies were conducted by the newly-elected Primate of our Diocese, Bishop Torkom Manoogian, assisted by our Pastors, Rev. Fr. Arnak Kasparian and Rev. Fr. Khosrov Asadourian.

Cultural Month Celebration

By his patriarchal Srpadar Gontag issued in March, His Holiness, Vasken I, Supreme Patriarch of All Armenians, declared this year the Tercentenary of the First Printing of the Bible in Ar-

menian and directed that it be duly observed in October on the occasion of the Month of Armenian Culture. The Religious festivities of this celebration were observed on October 9 and the observance of this anniversary was rescheduled from October to December 2. Invited by the church to speak on this occasion was the noted lecturer from New York, Deacon Hagop Nersoyan, Ph. D., and member of the Council of Religious Education of the Diocese of America, who delivered an inspiring address on "The Bible and the Armenians."

Cathedral Fund

The construction of our Mother Cathedral in New York is expected to be completed in 1968. Each parish within our Diocese has been given a quota to aid in its financing. A sum of \$50,000 has been requested of our Detroit parish by the Diocese, \$15,000 of which was sent on account by the Parish Council this year. A campaign will be conducted in our church in 1967 by the Diocese to successfully raise the remainder of our quota. All parishioners are requested to participate in this long-awaited and most important undertaking.

Parish Schools

St. John's Armenian Church School

The 1965-66 academic year brought to close another productive year in the religious training of our children of the Church School. The Parish Council takes this opportunity to extend its sincere appreciation to the Board and staff members of the School and in particular to Mr. Robert Sivazlian, Chairman of the Administrative Board and dedicated staff member of many years, for his leadership and time, and to Miss Rose Samarian, Vice Chairman of the Administrative Board and a well-qualified teacher and counselor in the Southfield Public school system with many years of dedicated service to our School, for her time and immeasurable assistance.

The School began its 1966-67 academic year with a full program and new zeal. Several changes were made in its administrative staff. Deacon Nersess Jebejian was appointed Superintendent for the new school year, and Deacon Levon N. Zenian, Superintendent Emeritus, was invited to serve as Advisor to the Superintendent and as Director of Teaching Training Programs of the Church School.

Miss Violet Vagramian, a graduate of The University of Miami and the Komitas State Conservatory of Music in Erevan, was appointed as Music Director and Organist of the Church School. The Parish Council regretfully accepted her resignation in December following her return to Florida.

It gives us much pleasure to know that a well-qualified Administrative Board and devoted staff of 69 members are working harmoniously for a student body of 731, the largest in our Diocese. This number can be increased with little effort; however, the problem

of space remains serious, and the Church School needs a carefully-studied expansion program.

Appreciation is extended by the Parish Council to Mr. Robert Sivazlian who, again this year, conducted free fencing lessons in the Cultural Building for our Church School children and adults. Classes are held weekly on Tuesday evenings during the school year.

Calouste Gulbenkian Armenian School

It was with regret that the Parish Council accepted the resignation of Mr. Armen Ovhanesian, Principal of the School for two years, at the end of the 1965-66 academic year. The Parish Council takes this opportunity to express its sincere appreciation to Mr. Ovhanesian who initiated the after school Armenian language classes conducted at Monnier Elementary School in Detroit and the diversified Saturday programs at the Cultural Building.

The School began its 1966-67 academic year with several changes in its administrative staff. Mr. Antranig Keledjian, assistant to the principal, was invited to assume the post of Principal for the 1966-67 school session. A new Board of Education to oversee and assist the Armenian School was appointed by the Parish Council, replacing the "Tubrotzaser Meeootiun" (Armenian School Association) which was formed in 1965. It was the feeling of the Council that this organizational change would be more effective and beneficial to the school program. Mr. Nurhan Akarakcian was elected to serve as Chairman of this Board.

In addition to Sunday classes, a diversified Saturday program was begun in February offering classes in Armenian language, songs, folk dancing and history. The Young People's Orchestra, composed of a string ensemble, was also initiated under the sponsorship of the Armenian School this year and is enjoying much success under the direction of Mrs. Peruz Kavafian.

Sincere appreciation is extended by the Parish Council to the Board of Education and its devoted and faithful School staff of 20 members.

Calouste Gulbenkian Kindergarten

The Calouste Gulbenkian Kindergarten has continued its phenomenal growth under the devoted stewardship of Mrs. Nellie Boyajian, Administrative Supervisor, and Mrs. Arshaloys Nersesian, Supervisor of the Armenian language program, who were invited to head the Kindergarten staff for the 1966-67 academic year. The Mangabardez is preparing pre-school children for the Church and Armenian Schools, making the transitional period for these children a pleasant and useful experience. A dedicated staff of 35 members is caring for 140 children aging from three to five years old.

Armenian Co-operative Nursery School

The Nursery School, a self-sustaining project, is in its third

year of operation. It is one of the five schools (out of 75) which has been licensed in the Greater Detroit area, and is accredited by the state. The School and staff have received favorable comment from various local, state and social agencies for its fine equipment, facilities and program.

The Nursery began its 1966-67 school program with a change in its staff. In June the Parish Council accepted, with regret, the resignation of the Head Teacher, Mrs. Mary Murphy, a well-qualified teacher and school director for two years. Mrs. Catherine Borbi, an experienced and qualified instructor, was hired to replace Mrs. Murphy as the school's new director. Serving as the capable and energetic staff assistant for a second year is Mrs. Mary Egigian.

The School reopened on October 3, and nineteen pre-school children attend classes on Mondays, Wednesdays and Thursdays.

The Parish Council commends the Board and staff members for the fine program and steady growth of the School.

Komitas Choir

The Parish Council gratefully acknowledges the services of our Komitas Choir. The choir enriches our Badarak on Sundays and on feast days throughout the year. Many hours of rehearsals and traveling inconvenience are just a part of the sacrifices made by members of this devoted auxiliary to maintain their quality. The entire choir and Deacons of our church merit our wholehearted appreciation and commendation.

Several changes were made in the choir during 1966. In June the Parish Council accepted, with regret, the resignation of our loyal and faithful church organist of six years, Miss Charlene Kuzirian. Miss Louise Sarkisian, a music major at The University of Michigan in Ann Arbor and former Church School valedictorian, was appointed to replace Miss Kuzirian on July 1.

Following the Dedication of the New Church, Deacon Harry H. Ekizian retired in his fortieth year of service as Choirmaster of the Komitas Choir. A Testimonial Dinner in appreciation of his outstanding devotion and faithful service to his church will be tendered by the Parish Council in honor of Deacon Ekizian in 1967.

Through the coordinated and joint efforts of Deacon Ekizian, the Pastors and Parish Council, the services of Dr. Harry Begian, Associate Professor of Music at Wayne State University, were secured as Choir Director. Dr. Begian assumed his new position at the end of November.

Armenian Church Youth Organization of America

After a long search for a qualified person to fill the post of a Youth Director for our parish to better serve the needs of our people, the Parish Council was happy to obtain the services of Deacon Nersess Jebejian on August 15. The Senior and Junior ACYOA Chapters of our church have been active during the past year and with the added aid of their new Youth Director, have launched a worthwhile program including religious, cultural, community service and

social activities and projects. The Parish Council commends the members of this organization for their devotion to and enthusiasm for the church and expresses it gratitude to all those responsible for the advancement of this important phase of our parish life.

Church School P.T.A.

The P.T.A. has continued its energetic support of Church School activities and has helped to keep parent and pupil interest in the school's program at a high level.

The 1966 P.T.A. Summer Camp for children was held on July 24-31 at Clear Lake Camp in Oxford Michigan. Due to the unexpected illness of Deacon Hovhannes Kasparian, Hayr Soorp Yeghishe served as spiritual director. Serving as the capable Camp Director for the third consecutive year was Mr. Harry Derderian. Mr. John Ohanian efficiently handled his job as chairman-in-charge of this project.

The summer camp is a most promising and rewarding project which is hoped to expand into a two-week program and offer even more varied activities for our children in 1967. The Parish Council takes this opportunity to thank the P.T.A. Committee, camp staff and counselors who have unselfishly given their time and talents to this wonderful activity and to commend the P.T.A. for carrying out their many worthwhile programs, including Christmas and Easter Communion breakfast packages, for the children of our Church School.

- <u>Ushers' Corps</u>

The Ushers' Corps, a project of the Men's Society, is an integral part of our church life. The Parish Council thanks the Corps and especially Mr. Harry Mardirosian, captain with many years service, for the efficient handling of our worshippers during the Badarak on Sunday mornings. The Parish Council also takes this opportunity to welcome the new captain of the Ushers' Corps, Mr. Berj Kurkechian, and to commend the members of this group for the particularly fine manner in which they performed their duties during the Dedication of our New Church the weekend of November 19.

Library Guild

Organized in 1965, the Library Guild (formerly known as "Library Promotion Committee") with the assistance of the Pastors and Parish Council made great strides this year towards establishing and maintaining a permanent Church Library for our parish. The bookshelves were completed early in the year by Mr. Harry Unjian, wood specialist and parishioner, as commissioned by the Pastors and Parish Council. The Council expresses its deep appreciation to Mr. Unjian who undertook the job at a nominal charge.

The Guild, composed of a well-organized group of faithful and professional laity, advises that the dedication ceremony and formal opening of the library will take place early in 1967.

Retired Senior Members of St. John's Armenian Church

This organization, formerly known as "Senior Citizens," is in its second year of existence and has filled a long-needed source of recreational activities for our retired parishioners. We encourage and welcome retired members of our church to join their colleagues weekly in the activities of this group in the Cultural Building.

International Institute Committee

Each nationality in America is recognized as a contributing factor to the greatness of this country. We are often called upon to present segments of our culture to the general public. Under the sponsorship of the Ladies' Auxiliary, a group of women particularly interested in the authenticity and high caliber of these presentations have formed an International Institute Committee. Their activities include furnishing an appropriate display biennially during Christmastide at the Detroit Historical Museum, furnishing the display windows assigned to the Armenians at the International Institute. and participating in other functions throughout the year at the Institute and in the city-at-large. The Committee prepares the material according to designated themes. The Parish Council acknowledges with deep appreciation the efforts of this group in their worthwhile labors and especially to Mrs. Takouhy Papazian, coordinator of the Committee, who has devoted countless number of hours and endless talent for this project in the name of the church.

Narine Dance Group

The Narine Dance Group, a newly-formed Armenian dance ensemble sponsored by the Women's Guild, was organized early in 1966 by Mrs. Clara Dzovigian, director. This unique group is composed of eight young women who perform at church and civic functions and serve as the official representatives of our church in this capacity. The Parish Council acknowledges the rewarding efforts of Mrs. Dzovigian who voluntarily formed this group, endeavoring to develop the ensemble into an authentic Armenian dance group.

INTERNATIONAL FESTIVAL AT NORTHLAND CENTER

In co-operation with the United Nations Association of Detroit, Northland Center held an International Festival for the first time on the occasion of the 21st anniversary of the United Nations on October 20-22. Sixteen foreign countries, including the International Institute Committee of our church under the joint efforts of members of the Ladies' Auxiliary, Women's Guild and others, participated in the three-day festival with exhibits, demonstrations of needlework, bake sale and an international fashion show. Representing our church in the entertainment program was the Narine Dance Group who performed on Saturday evening, October 22. The Parish Council extends its thanks to all who participated in this festival in the name of

the church and especially to Mrs. Takouhy Papazian who coordinated this tremendous and laborious program for the Parish Council.

Project R.E.A.D.

In co-operation with the Detroit Board of Education and Mr. Paul Kulhanjian, Assistant Principal in the Detroit Public School System, St. John's began an instructional program in basic elementary education for Armenian Adults in the Cultural Building on October 24. Project Remedial Education for Adults is a result of federal funds made available to the state and its school system by the Economic Opportunity Act to expand its adult education programs.

Classes are offered on Monday and Wednesday evenings in the Cultural Building from 7-9 p.m., completely free of cost. The Board of Education provides all books and other necessary materials. Mr. Kulhanjian is the instructor, and we encourage our adults to take advantage of this unique opportunity and beneficial service. Parishioners are invited to join these weekly classes.

Memorial Shrine Honoring Armenian Martyrs of 1915

The Commemoration of the 50th Anniversary of the Armenian Genocide was held in our church on April 25, 1965. The Commemoration Committee, under the chairmanship of Mr. Hagop S. Derderian, announced that an appropriate monument would be erected on our church grounds as a permanent memorial and tribute to the Martyrs of 1915. As of December 31, 1966, Mr. Howard Atesian, Committee Treasurer, advises that a total sum of \$4,855.75 has been collected in pledges towards this noble project, including bank interest.

A vigorous campaign to raise the additional and necessary funds to complete this project will be conducted following the completion of the landscapping of our church grounds.

1967 Diocesan Assembly in Detroit.

Our Diocesan delegation was successful in its bid for the site of the 65th Annual Diocesan Assembly and Clergymen's Conference during the Assembly proceedings in Tenafly, New Jersey on April 29-30. The 1967 Assembly will convene in our church on May 3-7. Deacon Ara Haig was appointed by the Parish Council to serve as general chairman of the Assembly. We look forward to hosting the sister churches of our Diocese with great pleasure.

Armenian-American Veterans Memorial Building

This fine building continues to be an asset to our entire community. It has been put to good use not only by the Armenian-American Veterans of Detroit, but also by our church and civic groups. The Veterans are to be commended for the fine manner in which they have used and maintained this beautiful building, indeed

a befitting memorial for our honored war dead. The Parish Council gratefully acknowledges the generosity of this organization in continuing to donate the use of their building for the Church School and Kindergarten classes on Sundays and is hopeful that our ACYOA organizations will benefit from the Veterans' facilities in the forthcoming year.

Wayne State University Armenian Studies

Our church is continuing its support for this worthwhile program of Armenian studies at Wayne State University. We are hopeful of the continued expansion of this program.

Jahagir (The Torch Bearer)

The <u>Jahagir</u>, official parish paper published monthly, continues to be a source of communication and information to our Armenian community-at-large, as well as out of state and abroad. The Parish Council takes this opportunity to express its appreciation to the members of the editorial staff and our church auxiliary reporters for their volunteer time and talents in producing this fine publication.

Nominating Committee

The Annual Preliminary Parish Assembly was held in the church following services on Sunday, December 11. Elected to serve on this Committee were: Dr. Dennis Papazian, chairman, and Messrs. Vahram Boyajian and George Mashlakjian. The responsibility of this Committee will be to present candidates to be elected for the Parish Council, Diocesan Delegates and Auditing Committee at our Annual Parish Assembly on Friday, February 17, 1967.

Gifts of Cars

It is an established part of the Christian tradition that each man supports his church and his parish according to his own means and ability. It is in this regard that the Parish Council expresses its deep appreciation to Mr. Mike Dorian, president of Mike Dorian Ford, who, for the third time, provided the church with an automobile for use by Fr. Diran; to Mr. Ed Kasparian, president of Ed Kasparian's Northland Ford, who, for the second time, provided the church with an automobile for use by Fr. Yeghishe; and to Mr. John Stepahnian, president of King Auto Sales, who, for the first time, presented an automobile to the church for use by Deacon Nersess.
