

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

PASTORAL REPORT For the Year of 1969

Dear Parishioners,

With the grace of God the year of our Lord 1969 came to its end marking my 12th year in priesthood and in the service of this Church as its Pastor.

The year of 1969 was another year in our parish life in which the church functioned properly and fulfilled its multiple duties and exercised a role of leadership in the Armenian community of our Metropolitan Detroit.

Some pastoral changes occurred during the year of 1969. Our colleague, FR. YEGHISHE VARTABED GIZIRIAN, was assigned to a new parish in Wynnewood, Pennsylvania by The Primate, Archbishop Torkom Manoogian. He celebrated his last Badarak on Sunday, October 19, and with a farewell dinner tendered to his honor by the Parish Council on October 21, Fr. Yeghishe departed to his new parish after serving this great parish of ours for about four years in conjunction with me. He came to this parish in November 1965 by the arrangement of then Primate, Archbishop Sion Manoogian in response to the requests of the Parish Council to satisfy the ever growing needs of our Parish.

To replace Fr. Gizirian, and in compliance with the request of the Parish Council, the Diocesan Primate, Archbishop Torkom Manoogian arranged the services of FR. PAREN VARTABED AVEDIKIAN on a one year term. Paren Vartabed arrived in Detroit on Friday, November 21, to assume his new duties from Syracuse, N.Y., where at the University of Syracuse he was taking some courses. Fr. Paren celebrated his first official Divine Liturgy after assuming his post on Sunday, December 7. Earlier, on a special invitation extended by the Parish Council, Fr. Paren came to Detroit and celebrated Divine Liturgy and delivered the sermon on Sunday, October 5.

DEACON NERSESS JEBEJIAN, who served in our parish for the last three years in the capacity of St. John's Church School Superintendent and Youth Director, terminated his post during the summer and after his ordination into sacred priesthood in New York, N.Y., on Sunday, October 5, was assigned to St. John the Divine Armenian Church in Springfield, Massachusetts as his first parish.

Beside the above mentioned changes, ARCHBISHOP SION MANOOGIAN relinquished his assignment as Patriarchal Delegate to Egypt, Sudan and Ethiopia and after spending about six months in his Diocese returned to Detroit on Saturday, June 14 and took his residency in our community. He gave his first sermon in our church since his return on Sunday, July 6.

With this new situation in the parish the following arrangements were made. With mutual understanding of the Diocesan Primate and clergy involved and also with the consent of the Parish Council a workable administrative plan and division of labor was devised and arranged to discharge pastoral duties in an effective way. Accordingly, by the special arrangements of the Primate, Fr. Diran was made the Pastor in charge of the church and Fr. Paren as assistant pastor of the church. Archbishop Sion, Bishop in Residence, will be called upon to deliver sermons once a month as on five major Holy Days.

With the help of DEACON LEVON N. ZENIAN, who volunteered to preach occasionally, the burdens from the pastor's shoulders were lightened considerably as far as church services are concerned.

In this connection it is worth mentioning our own Komitas Choir who is the pride and joy of our church with its beautiful rendition of Badarak and other liturgical songs under the directorship of Deacon Ara Haig as choirmaster with the accompaniment of Miss Louise Sarkisian as organist. Special mention should be made of our loyal Altar Servers: Daniel Shahan and John Semizian as Senior Deacons; Mihran Hoplamazian and Hagop Asadurian as Sub-Deacons and Masa Carman as clerk.

As for the Church School Superintendency and Youth leadership, which was vacated by the resignation of Deacon Nersess, for this year an Advisory Board composed of the Supervisors of different departments under the acting chairmanship of DR. DENNIS PAPAZIAN is administering the Church School program in a collective way. The youth are being benefited by the voluntary work of MR. RICHARD VAHRATIAN.

Also in the context of our overall religious educational activities regretfully to be mentioned, the resignation of another faithful, hard working servant. Calouste Gulbenkian Kindergarten, which was organized some six year ago as a self-contained organization in our total church school system, was affected at the end of the last school year, by the resignation of MRS. NELLIE BOYAJIAN as supervisor due to her domestic pressing commitments. MRS. ARSHALOYS NERSESIAN is the new supervisor of the Kindergarten.

As far as the Armenian School is concerned it functions properly with its Saturday and Sunday classes. The dedicated work of NURHAN AKARAKCIAN as principal of the school is well appreciated.

We are also indebted to MR. ZAREH MELKONIAN who greatly enhanced Armenian Adult classes personally undertaking Armenian language teaching on Wednesday evenings in our Cultural Building.

Herewith, I submit to our Parish Assembly for a review a brief account of some phases of pastoral activities and accomplishments during the year.

WORSHIP AND CEREMONIES

Divine Liturgy was celebrated every Sunday which was officiated by the clergy alternately. Sermons were given in both Armenian and English every Sunday of the year. Divine Liturgy and various church ceremonies were also conducted on special occasions throughout the year and listed below.

CHRISTMAS HOLY COMMUNION BADARAK FOR CHURCH SCHOOL

(Saturday, January 4)

Special Badarak was performed in the early morning and Holy Communion was administered to the Church School pupils.

THEOPHANY EVE-"JURAKALOUYZ-SOORP DZUNUNTIAN" (Sunday, January 5) Badarak was offered on Sunday evening as Holy Theophany Eve Celebration.

ARMENIAN CHRISTMAS OR THE FEAST OF THEOPHANY (Monday, January 6) Divine Liturgy was celebrated with the participation of members of the Cultural Society of Armenians from Istanbul (C.S.A.I.) singing in four part harmony in the Gomidasian version of the Badarak.

BLESSING OF WATERS-"CHURORHNEK" (Sunday, January 12)

This ceremony was performed in commemoration of Christ's Baptism on the Octave of Holy Theophany.

FEAST OF ST. VARTANANTZ (Thursday, February 13)

Badarak was celebrated on Thursday morning on the day of the feast.

SUNRISE SERVICES-"AREVAKAL" (February 23-March 23)

These services were performed during five Sundays of Lent which followed closed Lenten Liturgy.

LENTEN VIGIL SERVICES-"HUSGOOM" (February 19-March 26)

"Peace Hour" and "Rest Hour" were conducted during the evenings of a six week Lenten period.

"TRUNPATZEK" CEREMONY (Sunday, March 30)

The special ceremony of "Opening of the Curtains of the Altar" was conducted on Palm Sunday evening according to our liturgical tradition.

HOLY WEEK was observed with the proper services and ceremonies on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday.

COMMEMORATION OF THE LAST SUPPER-"VERCHIN UNTRIK" (Thurs., April 3) **Badarak was celebrated in the morning in commemoration of the Last Supper on the Institution of Holy Communion.**

- FEET-WASHING CEREMONY-"VODNALUVA" (Thursday, April 3)
- This special ceremony was conducted on the evening of Maundy Thursday with participation of twelve boys from the Church School.
- **TENEBRAE.**"KHAVAROOM" (Thursday, April 3) This ceremony, in commemoration of Christ's Betrayal, was conducted on Maundy Thursday night following the Feet-Washing Ceremony.
- **TRE-ORE-'GARK KHACHELOOTIAN**" (Friday, April 12) "Tre-Ore" Services in commemoration of the Crucifixion of Christ were conducted on Good Friday noon, in English, with the participation of some of our youth. BURIAL OF CHRIST-"TAGHOOM" (Friday, April 4)
- The ceremonies of the Burial of Christ were conducted on Good Friday evening.
- EASTER HOLY COMMUNION BADARAK FOR CHURCH SCHOOL (Saturday, April 5) Special Badarak was performed in the early morning and Easter Holy Communion was administered to the Church School pupils.
- EASTER EVE-"JURAKALOUYTZ-SOORP HAROOTIAN" (Saturday, April 5)
- Badarak was offered on Saturday evening as Easter Eye Celebration.
- EASTER-"ZADIG" (Sunday, April 6)

Easter was celebrated with Solemn High Mass and sreat festivity.

BLESSING OF MADAGH-"MADAGHORHNEK" (Sunday, April 27) Following Badarak madagh was blessed in memory of the martyrs of the great massacre of April 24, 1915.

GRAPE BLESSING CEREMONY-"KHAGHOGHORHNEK" (Sunday, August 17) The traditional Grape Blessing ceremony was conducted following the celebration of Holy Badarak on the Feast of the Assumption of the Holy Mother of God.

ANTASDAN "BLESSING OF FOUR SIDES OF THE WORLD" This ceremony was invariably conducted on five major Feast Days during the morning church services preceding the Solemn High Mass (Christmas, Easter, Transfiguration, Assumption and Holy Cross),

FESTIVE ANTASDAN (Sunday, September 14)

This processional Antasdan was conducted on the Feast of Exaltation of the Holy Cross following Badarak.

PONTIFICIAL PRAYER SERVICE-"HAYRABEDAGAN MAGHTANK"

These services were conducted on various occasions according to our church calendar including the Name Day of the Catholicos, (Sunday, February 16); Feast of Holy Etchmiadzin (Sunday, June 8); The Anniversary of the Consecration of His Holiness, the Catholicos (Sunday, October 6).

CHRISTMAS EVE SERVICE (Wednesday, December 24)

A special candlelight ceremony was conducted on American Christmas Eve entirely in English for the benefit of our young people, sponsored by the ACYOA.

HOKEHANKIST, "REQUIEM SERVICE"

Hokehankist was performed almost every Sunday as requested by parishioners and also SPECIAL HOKEHANKIST was conducted on special occasions as directed by the Diocese or our Church Calendar.

SACRAMENTS AND RITES

The following services have been duly recorded in our Parish Registry during the year: BAPTISMS AND CONFIRMATIONS. The performance of the rite of Christening totaled 60. In addition six baptisms and Confirmations and five Confirmations only were separately administered to adults.

WEDDINGS. The performance of the Sacrament of Holy Matrimony totaled 30. In addition several BETHROTHALS were also performed for engaged couples.

FUNERALS. The Funeral service totaled 69 for the entire year of 1969.

PASTORAL VISITATIONS AND COUNSELING

This service is rendered by the clergy to the best of their ability. The pastoral visitations include sick calls in hospitals and at home; consolation visits to bereaved families; and Christian fellowship visits. Pastoral counseling conferences were also extended upon request and necessity; and spiritual guidance was extended to engaged couples as a preparation for their forthcoming marriage.

MEETINGS AND ASSEMBLIES

The pastors presided over the numerous meetings of the Parish Council and church auxiliary organizations, including some executive body meetings and standing committees throughout the year. They closely supervised their activities, offered prayers and gave their advise and guidance whenever needed.

The pastors also participated with welcoming addresses or otherwise in the following special meetings, conferences and assemblies which have taken place in our own Armenian Cultural Building.

East St. Louis, Illinois parish was visited by our clergy for a mission week conducted by our Diocese in cooperation with ACYOA Central Council (June 19-27).

The Miami, Florida parish was visited to celebrate Divine Liturgy and to conduct a Funeral Service of one of their parishioners (Oct. 5-6).

CHURCH PUBLICATIONS

JAHAGIR "TORCH BEARER", our parish paper was published on a monthly basis and occasionally with combined issues and was mailed to approximately 1,800 addresses. **Sunday Church Bulletins** were prepared and distributed to the church comers by the Ushers Corps every Sunday uninterruptedly. **Special Church Bulletins** were also prepared on the occasion of significant Armenian Feast Days. Annual Reports Booklet for 1968 was prepared with utmost care and distributed to our entire membership. Gomidas Centennial Program Booklet was published on the occasion of the Centennial Concert by our Komitas Choir in October. Also booklets containing Lenten Sunrise Ceremony were published for the use of our congregation during Lent.

CULTURAL ACTIVITIES AND SOCIAL PROGRAMS

Our community life became considerably richer with varied Cultural and Educational programs which were presented throughout the year. MAJOR ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF THE YEAR

During 1969 three major accomplishments in our community are noteworthy and we can view them with a sense of pride and satisfaction.

MEMORIAL PROJECT AT WOODLAWN. The Armenian Community Memorial project, which was instituted some twelve years ago was brought to its successful conclusion with the completion of its second phase. The Armenian community now owns two beautiful Memorial Shrines at Woodlawn Cemetery. The first shrine in the traditional design of the Dome of the Cathedral of Holy Etchmiadzin was dedicated in 1963 in Section 27 and the second one is the Martyrs Memorial Shrine featuring "Urn of Tears" in memory of the massacre of 1915 which was dedicated on November 9, 1969 in Section 28B. The Armenian community is indebted to the late MR. J.HOWARD WENDORPH who conceived this memorial project and gave us his invaluable assistance.

CAMP ARARAT. It was during 1969 that AGBU purchased for Midwestern children a beautiful place with tremendous camping facilities (both summer and Winter) in Northern Michigan near Grayling, a resort place. This was purchased as part of the AGBU National Campaign for preservation of Armenian heritage. The camp went right ahead into operation with great success. Many children enjoyed their four weeks stay there with planned activities from the middle of July to the middle of August. Church services were also conducted there for children by the clergy. Plans now are underway for more full and varied programs for the benefit of the youth groups of our community. The tremdndous facilities of the camp should be utilized to its fullest extent.

ARMENIAN DAY SCHOOL. This was another gigantic project ever to be taken on by AGBU on a national level. Two fund raising dinners were given in Detroit (June 6 and Oct. 3) toward the National Campaign of Armenian Day Schools in U.S.A. The sizeable amount of pledges collected in Detroit made the initial national goal of \$2 Million very easily accessible. Detroit being the headquarters of the National Campaign Committee for the Establishment of Armenian Day Schools, many consultative meetings were held in our Cultural Building which culminated with the establishment of the first Armenian Day School since the project went into effect, and this was in Detroit. The first class operated in October in our Cultural Building with Kindergarten children. The Educational Committee is preparing for next year an additional class for first grade children. We are very hopeful for the future of the school and we look forward with great anticipation of eventual construction of a beautiful Armenian Day School in Detroit with many happy Armenian pupils.

WITH OUR CHURCH ORGANIZATIONS.

Pastors, beside attending church auxiliary regular meetings (general, executive, standing and special committes) were also actively engaged in their various projects. They conducted installation ceremonies for the new officers and initiation ceremonies for new members. They visited with church groups. The Michigan Armenian Aged Home on Christmastide and Eastertide. ACYOA Mission Week (Mar. 24-28), ACYOA-Project Youth Lenten Fish Dinners were new and pleasant experiences for our parish. The pilgrimage of the Ladies' Auxiliary with 37 members to St. Vartan Cathedral was a historic occasion where they witnessed the consecration of a newly installed Altar (Sept. 7). Mr. & Mrs. Club, which was the outcome of a special dinner tendered to the newly-weds of our parish (June 5) wll soon be another useful addition to our existing auxiliary organizations; since then this group of energetic young couples is in its formative stage on the way of being a new church auxiliary organization. The ACYOA-Project Youth with consulting parents committee was another new movement which realized many instances of worthwhile activities for our youth, Junior ACYOA age group. We anticipate new vigorous ventures from these groups in the coming year.

All our auxiliary groups are to be commended for their worthwhile projects in our parish for our church community and specially all those individuals who distinguished themselves with their exceptional work within various service projects which can be regarded as the service squads of our church. Men's Society for their Blood Bank and Ushers Corps, Ladies' Auxiliary for their mas preparation, Women's Guild for their mas packaging. Parents Guidance Council for their assistance and supervision for our youth project activities. Library and Altar Guilds for their much needed services within their particular areas.

EPILOGUE







REGULAR AND SPECIAL MEETINGS DURING 1969

Special meetings were held with the Diocesan Delegates, various church auxiliary organizations, and representatives of our Church Schools to solve problems of the past year. A total of thirty regular Parish Council meetings and fifteen Tivan meetings were held during the year.

PLEDGE SYSTEM

The pledge chairman along with the Parish Council, has made a concerted effort this year to collect past dues along with the current pledges. The response from the parishioners has improved but is still less than expected. The reluctance among some parishioners concerning the payment of their present and past dues has become a growing concern to the Parish Council.

A continual effort was made to have all parishioners sign 1970 pledge cards. Thus far less than half of our 1100 membership have made their pledge known and we urge that the remaining parishioners expedite their 1970 pledge notification.

The Parish Council and pledge committee fervently hope that the parishioners realize the need for a pledge system and the signing of pledge cards and that each member must continue their financial support in order that we may meet our financial obligations.

CULTURAL BUILDING REPORT FOR THE YEAR OF 1969

Meetings held by the following organizations: Parish Council, Ladies' Auxiliary, Women's Guild, ACYOA Seniors, ACYOA Project Youth, Men's Society, Church School Teachers, Armenian School Teachers, Nursery School Teachers, AGBU Men, AGBU Women, AGBU Intermediate, AGBU Midwest, Apostolic Society, Michigan Home for the Armenian Aged, K of V Shavarshan Lodge, K of V Nareg Lodge, and D of V Zabelle Otyag Lodge. The Detroit Bible Students meet every Monday and Wednesday. Nursery School is held three days a week from October through May. Sunday School classes every Sunday from the latter part of September to the first of June. Armenian School classes held every Saturday and Sunday from September through June 1. Coffee Hour 1st Sunday of the month. Easter and Christmas breakfasts were held for the children. A total of 64 paid rentals for the year. Thirty church and affiliated group affairs were held. Nord Bar Review Courses were held three days a week during the summer, for a total of eight weeks. A total of approximately 470 meetings were held in the building during the year. One Pot Luck Dinner for parishioners was given at the Preliminary General Assembly meeting. AGBU Armenian Day School began in October.

The Parish Council would like to thank Mr. Frank Bartholomew and his crew for the job well done in keeping and maintaining the building and equipment in excellent condition. As parishioners with our guests, we should adhere to the rules governing the building and the equipment.

Following are listed the major improvements and additions that were made to the facilities in the 1969 budget year.

ARMENIAN COMMUNITY MEMORIAL - WOODLAWN CEMETERY

With the dedication of the Armenian Martyrs Shrine in Section 28B, on Sunday, November 9, 1969, the second phase of our Armenian Community Memorial in Woodlawn Cemetery was brought to a successful conclusion. This Memorial project, which was instituted by the Parish Council of St. John's Armenian Church on December 22, 1958, is a historic accomplishment for our parish and it is the first and only memorial project of its kind in America. Certainly it is an accomplishment which we can all view with pride and satisfaction. We now have two beautiful memorial shrines in Woodlawn Cemetery. The first shrine is in the traditional design of the Dome of the Cathedral of Holy Etchmiadzin and it was dedicated in 1963, in Section 27. The second shrine is, of course, the Armenian Martyrs Shrine in Section 28B, which features the Urn of Tears dedicated to the immortal memory of the victims of the horrendous genocide of the Armenians, perpetrated by the Turks in April, 1915. Our parish is justifiably proud of this magnificent project, and we are grateful to Woodlawn Cemetery for their cooperation, and especially we are indebted to the late Mr. J. Howard Wendorph, who conceived this memorial project and gave us immeasurable assistance and cooperation in bringing it to a successful conclusion.

10TH ANNUAL CHURCH PICNIC

St. John's Armenian Church held its 10th Annual Picnic at the State Fair Grounds on Sunday, July 27, 1969. Although the day turned out to be a rainy and stormy one, we had patches of sunshine and a host of devoted parishioners who supported the annual affair and attended to make the day a huge success. The committee members, under the chairmanship of Dicron Tafralian, who had to carry tables to a nearby shelter, prepared and served a delicious shish kebab dinner. Over 1,000 persons were served and were also entertained by the music of the Hye Tones.

The Parish Council and Clergy wish to congratulate our picnic committee members for this successful affair and extend appreciation to the parishioners for their continued support.

NEW YEAR'S EVE DINNER-DANCE

The Parish Council expresses appreciation to the committee and Mrs. Helen Armoudlian for the successful Annual New Year's Eve Celebration. The continued participation of our parishioners was the most important ingredient in making our Ninth Annual New Year's Eve Dinner-Dance an outstanding event.

WAYNE STATE UNIVERSITY ARMENIAN STUDIES

Our Church is continuing its support to this worthwhile program of Armenian studies at Wayne State University. Continued efforts have been made to strengthen the program. Presently the committee is working on plans to expand the program.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Six Church School pupils received a scholarship to attend the Summer Study Program at St. Nersess School in Evanston, Illinois during 1969. They are as follows: Margaret Gargarian, Kelli Kuchukian, Kari Kuchukian, Gary Melikian, Jim Stamboulian, and Anita Vanerian.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Diverting from the usual procedure, instead of electing the three members of the auditing committee at the Annual Preliminary Meeting held in November, with the approval of the General Assembly convened on February 28, 1969, a nominating committee was elected at this meeting with the responsibility to serve a whole year and present the candidates for Parish Council and Auditing Committee at the Annual Parish Assembly to be held in February 1970. The three elected were Deacon Ara Haig, Mr. Jack Kazanjian and Dr. Dennis Papazian.

LOAN OF CAR

The Parish Council would like to express their deep appreciation to Mr. Mike Dorian, President of Mike Dorian Ford, for his donation of a 1969 Station Wagon for the Pastors use. This is the fifth consecutive year that Mr. Dorian has presented the Church with a courtesy car.

MEMORIAL SHRINE HONORING ARMENIAN MARTYRS OF 1915

Mr. Howard Atesian, treasurer, reports that as of December 31, 1969, there is in the Martyr's Monument Fund a total of \$5,440.60 in the savings account at the National Bank of Detroit. These funds were contributed at the 50th Anniversary Commemoration Banquet for the purpose of building a monument in memory of our two million martyrs, who were victims of the first Genocide perpetrated by the Turks against the Armenian people.

The committee, under the chairmanship of Mr. Hagop S. Derderian, has delayed erection of a monument because they felt that justice could not be done to a memorial of this type for less than \$10,000 and Detroit has a reputation for doing things properly. This monument should be one that is worthy of the memory of our brothers and sisters. We are sure that all Detroiters will want to have a share in the erection of this memorial monument.

67TH ANNUAL DIOCESAN ASSEMBLY

The 67th Annual Diocesan Assembly and Clergymen's Conference of the Diocese of the Armenian Church of America took place in St. James Church, Watertown, Massachusetts, on May 1-2-3, 1969 with Primate Archbishop Torkom Manoogian presiding and attended by 116 delegates.

Diocesan Delegates from our Parish who attended and were nominated in various committees were Mr. Martin Apkarian, Deacon Ara Haig, Mr. Edward Korkoian, Deacon Daniel Shahan, and alternating for Mr. Edward Mardigian, Dr. Dennis Papazian. Our pastors attended the Assembly.

ARMENIAN-AMERICAN VETERANS MEMORIAL BUILDING

The Parish Council wishes to express its gratitude to the Veterans for their generous donation of the use of the Armenian American Veterans Building for the ACYOA-Project Youth, Church School, and Kindergarten School.

LADIES AUXILIARY

The Ladies Auxiliary completed another successful year under the leadership of Chairman Mrs. Haiganoush Toundaian and the Executive Board. Nine luncheon meetings were held at the Cultural Hall, with an average attendance of 75-85. All membership meetings were presided over by the clergy.

Numerous visitations were made to ailing members. Cards of condolences, congratulatory cards and telegrams were sent to members as the occasion arose.

Thirty-seven members made the pilgrimage to St. Vartans Cathedral in New York City on September 7, 1969 and witnessed the consecration of the main altar. The Ladies Auxiliary made a gift of \$500.00 to provide a cross for the newly consecrated altar in memory of deceased members of the Auxiliary.

The Auxiliary purchased and presented to the Church a new freezer, at the cost of more than \$1000.00 for the Cultural Hall kitchen.

Mrs. Shoushanig Serkian and her committee are responsible for preparing Mas whenever it is needed.

The Ladies Auxiliary participates in activities at the International Institute as well as maintaining an Armenian display window which is changed every three months. The Ladies Auxiliary has through its diversified program of activities added

immeasurably to the spiritual and social life of St. John's Armenian Church Community.

WOMEN'S GUILD

St. John's Armenian Church Women's Guild has completed another successful year under the direction of their able chairman, Mrs. Michael (Mary) Seremjian.

The year 1969 was once again marked with a series of successful affairs. Some of the highlights were the annual dinner dance, Christmas dinner for members, mother-daughter banquet, lenten luncheon and communion breakfast. In addition to these they had a Christmas dinner at the Armenian Old Age Home and a bake sale at the festival at Westland.

The Guild has a current membership of 147 members which includes twelve new members for the year 1969, The Parish Council and Pastors must commend the Guild and the executive board for their devoted service.

MEN'S SOCIETY

KOMITAS CHOIR

Sunday after Sunday, and on feast days throughout the year, our parishioners have had the pleasure to hear and enjoy the wonderful renditions of our most honored liturgical music sung by our Komitas Choir under the direction of the choirmaster, Deacon Ara Haig and assistant to the director, organist, Miss Louise Sarkisian. Acknowledgements are due also to our altar servers, Deacons; Daniel Shahan and John Semizian, sub-deacons; Hagop Asadurian and Mihran Hoplamazian, stole-bearers; Hayrabed Merhafian and Hairabed Mikaelian and clerk, Masa Carman for their devoted service on the Holy Altar. LIBRARY GUILD

The Parish Council wishes to thank the Armenian-American Veterans for their sincere and total involvement in opening their building to all the youth activities. Without their co-operation our program would not be successful.

ST. JOHN'S ARMENIAN CHURCH SCHOOL

The 1968-69 academic year was our 21st in providing for the Christian training and nurture of our parish children through the Church School. The Pastors and Parish Council would like to express their sincere appreciation to all those who have made this possible. In particular they would like to thank Deacon (now Father) Nersess Jebejian, the former superintendent; Dr. Dennis Papazian, present advisor and acting chairman of the board; Miss Rose Samarian, advisor; Mrs. Arshaloys Nersesian, supervisor of the kindergarten; Miss Carol Nersessian, supervisor of the primary department; Mr. Martin Cholakian, supervisor of the secondary department; and Mr. Robert Sarkisian, supervisor of the senior department.

Deacon Nersess' resignation last summer, and his subsequent ordination into the priesthood, left the office of superintendent vacant. ARMENIAN CO-OPERATIVE NURSERY SCHOOL

The Armenian Co-operative Nursery School opened on September 22 for its sixth year of operation. The Parish Council would like to thank Mrs. Jean Pinkelman, director and Mrs. Mary Egigian, staff assistant, for many hours of devoted service. Classes are held Monday, Wednesday and Thursday 9:00 to 11:30 A.M.

SENIOR CITIZENS

The Senior Citizens meet three times a week, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday in the Armenian American Veteran's Building. The program, under the chairmanship of Mr. George D. Baylerian, provides recreation for our retirees in pleasant surroundings. The members provide light refreshments for their afternoon sessions. This organization is now in a formative stage. RULES AND REGULATIONS CONCERNING CHURCH MEMBERSHIP

"All persons who have been baptized and confirmed in the Armenian Church, who accept its doctrine, canons and rites, and who fulfill their obligations to the church and community, shall be members in good standing of the Parish Church and shall constitute the Parish Assembly".

"Every Member of the Parish, 21 years of age or over, shall pay the church an annual due".

"Members in good standing of a Parish Church, who are twenty-one years of age or over, may participate in the assemblies of the same parish and may vote, provided that at least six months have elapsed since the date of their registration as members of the Parish and their dues have been paid. They may be eligible for office one year after becoming members".

"Members who fail to pay their dues for one or more years, automatically forfeit their right to vote at Parish Assemblies, or to hold elective office within the Parish. Such members may reinstate these rights by payment of their dues in arrears for at least the previous two years".


RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING PARISH ASSEMBLY

"The agenda of the Parish Assembly shall be prepared by the Parish Priest and the Parish Council. Other matters of new business may be added by majority vote of the Parish Assembly".

"At Parish Assemblies the presence of a minimum of one-third of the eligible voting membership or fifty members shall constitute a quorum. Decisions shall be rendered by majority vote of members present and voting".

"In a Parish Assembly each member shall be entitled to one vote which is not transferable and must be cast in person."
