PASTORAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR OF 1971

Submitted to the General Assembly Of St. John's Armenian Church of Greater Detroit Convened on Friday, February 25, 1972 at 8:00 P.M.

Dear Parishioners.

With the grace of God another year was completed with considerable achievements. With the close of 1971, your pastor has completed his fourteenth year in the service of Christ as Pastor of this great Metropolitan Church of St. John's Armenian Church and his fifteenth year begins with the near year of 1972.

Pastoral and religious work of the parish was carried out by the clergy in the usual conscientious manner. In the past, the pastor has given a comprehensive annual report which has covered in detail the major areas of pastoral activities. For this year our intention is to deviate from this general procedure and to present our pastoral activities

in more general terms without going into minute details.

The Church functioned properly as much as the given circumstances allowed. Fr. Paren Vartabed Avedikian, aside from his pastoral help as Assistant Pastor, continued to serve as Superintendent of Sunday Church School and Director of Youth Activities under ACYOA. Archbishop Sion Manoogian continued his help as Bishop in Residence; he preached monthly and officiated on major feast days with Solemn High Mass; he attends Church for Sunday worship, presides at special ceremonies and other church gatherings or parish functions. We are also indebted to Deacon Levon N. Zenian who willingly continued his services as preacher, delivering monthly sermons. In connection with Sunday worship services, mention should be made of our own Komitas Choir with choirmaster Deacon Ara Haig, organist Mrs. Louise Yardumian, assistants, deacons, altar servers and choristers, who performed their duties and beautified our liturgy. In connection with the performances of sacraments and rites Deacon Harry Ekizian's participation is invaluable. Our sacristan Hairabed Mikaelian has retired from his duties as sacristan and sexton (jamgotch-lousarar) which he conscientiously performed for the last several years. We will miss him.

The operation of Calouste Gulbenkian Armenian School, which is another phase of our parish work, continued to operate with a new board of administration and with a change of principal. The new board chairman is Robert Thomasian and the new principal is Berj Garabedian.

CLERGY AND PARISH COUNCIL RELATIONSHIP

Throughout the year of 1971, both clergy and parish council independently and cooperatively endeavored to establish a happy working relationship for the good conduct of general parish affairs. After a series of meetings and communications with the Diocese, fortunately for our parish community, these efforts came to a successful fruition with the help of our Diocesan delegates, culminating in a guideline for the general operational procedures of the parish; this was submitted to the Primate and the Diocesan Council and was subsequently approved.

PASTORS' GENERAL WORK CAN BE VIEWED SUMMARILY THROUGH THE FOLLOWING CATEGORIES

A. WORSHIP AND CEREMONIES

Divine Liturgy was celebrated and sermons were provided every Sunday. On occasions we had guest clergy. Divine Liturgy and various church ceremonies were also conducted on special occasions according to the liturgical tradition of our church calendar. In the church we have performed all the special ceremonies whenever the occasion called for it. In this connection, the directives from the Diocese were executed without fail.

B. SACRAMENTS AND RITES

The sacraments and rites were performed with love and care, geared to the individual needs of the families involved. The following services have been recorded in our Parish Registry during the year 1971. Baptisms and Confirmations (including adult Baptisms and sometimes only Confirmations) totaled 49; Weddings (including blessing of marriage) totaled 29; and Funerals 59; also, several betrothals were performed.

C. PASTORAL CARE

Pastoral duties included pastoral visits to families at homes for Christian fellowship and consolation, sick calls at hospitals, shut-ins at nursing homes and also counseling on different occasions. All the requests and religious and social needs related with pastoral duties were fulfilled, as well as different types of help was extended when needed. Pastors made time to attend graduation parties and anniversary gatherings bringing pastoral greetings, unfortunately however, it was impossible to go beyond the call of immediate duties to include many more visitations, simply because of the large volume day-to-day church duties, religious, ceremonial, ritual, sacramental and administrative which consumed all the available time of the pastors.

D. ADMINISTRATIVE DUTIES

Administrative work encompass executive duties related with the Church administration and office management, as well as organizational matters related with Church Auxiliary Organizations. Official correspondence, letters of recommendation, preparation of certificates, paper work and desk work were carried out. Pastors presided over numerous meetings of church organizations, attended many church functions and performances and promoted many parish projects and programs (cultural, educational, social, etc.)

E. PUBLIC RELATIONS AND INTERCHURCH ACTIVITIES

The pastor was actively engaged in promoting neighborly relations within the community of our church locality. Invocations were offered on memorable occasions in our community on invitation by civic authorities, churches and organized groups; publicity on our church, in article and picture form were promoted in area papers by the pastor. With respect to public relations, many groups, religious, civic and fraternal continued to come to our Church for guided tours. The clergy availed themselves in guiding these tours, and using the opportunity they introduced the Armenian Church in all her aspects with comprehensive lectures.

As for interchurch activities, in a time of ecumenical endeavors, such as ours, pastor participated in interdenominational liturgical services and inter-faith actions whenever the opportunity was presented. Cordial relations continued with the Metropolitan Detroit Council of Churches (MDCC) and the Southfield Clergy Association.

NOTEWORTHY ACCOMPLISHMENTS AND MEMORABLE EVENTS

Some memorable events and noteworthy accomplishments within the Church and community, made the year 1971 much more exciting.

A. A NEW BUILDING FOR THE MICHIGAN HOME FOR THE ARMENIAN AGED

After being felt for many years the absolute necessity of a new building for the Armenian Aged, this eventually became reality in the fall with the generosity of Mr. Alex Manoogian through the instrumentality of Mr. Onnig Tabibian. The new **Takvor and Takoohy Manoogian Manor**, in Livonia, is a beautiful building with modern facilities and can accommodate over 60 people.

B. NEW ARMENIAN DAY SCHOOL

Again through the generosity of the great benefactor, Mr. Alex Manoogian the Armenian community has been endowed with a beautiful school building on the premises of St. John's Armenian Church in Southfield adjacent to the Armenian-American Veterans Building. The school has been in operation since the new school year of 1971-72 and almost 100 children regularly attend the A.G.B.U. Alex Manoogian School, operated

by the A.G.B.U. Midwest District. We hope the number of pupils will increase year to year and the school will be expanded to include up to High School grades.

C. ETHNIC FESTIVAL

A weekend International Riverfront Festival held near Cobo Hall in Detroit during summer was the largest project ever undertaken by our Armenian Church under the auspices of Detroit civic authorities. It was a huge success in many aspects especially in promoting good Armenian image among many ethnic groups and in the eyes of municipal authorities. This project kept our parishioners busy for almost the entire summer and forged solidarity among our people.

D. TWENTY-FIFTH SILVER ANNIVERSARY OF ACYOA

During Labor Day Weekend our Detroit Branch of ACYOA played host to the Second Annual Olympics of ACYOA and successfully celebrated the silver anniversary of the founding of national ACYOA with an Alumni Dinner-Dance.

E. FIFTIETH GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY OF LADIES' AUXILIARY

In October the Ladies' Auxiliary celebrated the 50th Anniversary of the founding of their organization with dinner and program.

F. ORGAN DEDICATION

The dedication of our newly installed pipe organ in January 1971 is another noteworthy milestone in our church history. The religious ceremony of the blessing of the organ, presided by Archbishop Torkom Manoogian, the Primate of our Diocese, and the dedicatory organ recital by Berj Zamkochian, the renowned organist from Boston, was truly an eventful occasion. The organ recital, as an inspiring innovation opened the possibility of new avenues of religious expression in our Armenian Church. It heralded, we can say, a promising new era of organ music within the context of Armenian liturgy.

G. DUAL ANNIVERSARY OF OUR CHURCH

In November we marked the Tenth Anniversary of our existence in our new location of Southfield, with the dedication of Armenian Cultural Building (September 1961) and Fifth Anniversary of the Consecration of the new Church respectively (November, 1966). Mr. Berj Zamkochian's brilliant pipe organ recital in our Church was a fitting commemoration of the dual anniversary.

H. JERUSALEM PATRIARCH'S FIRST VISIT TO OUR COMMUNITY

In December Patriarch Yeghishe Derderian of Jerusalem accompanied by his chancellor Bishop Shahe Ajemian visited our community of Detroit for the first time as special guest of our distinguished parishioners, Mr. and Mrs. Alex Manoogian. The visit coincided with the commemoration of Khrimian Hayrig on the occasion of the 150th anniversary of his birthday and the guests participated in the commemorative program during day-long activities, with Church Services in the morning and dinner-program in the evening.

As we embark upon the second decade of our existence in Southfield may God pour his blessings upon this community of St. John's Armenian Church so that in turn the Church may continue to spread her blessings to her surroundings, as she has been doing for the last half of a century during her existence in Detroit long before the first Church was built.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT 1971

LETTER FROM PARISH COUNCIL CHAIRMAN

Dear Parishioners:

I have realized, as the chairman of the Parish Council for the past three years, that the extremely difficult taks of governing this parish takes the complete and unselfish cooperation of members of all church auxiliary organizations.

Even though this has been a difficult year for the Parish Council, we have been actively engaged in sponsoring or supporting many worthwhile activities and programs.

Beginning with the Organ Dedication in January and the Parish Assembly in February, the extent of the activities have included: The Annual Church Picnic, the International Riverfront Festival, the Hovsepiantz Centennial, Tenth Anniversary Organ Recital and the Khrimian Hayrig 150th Dinner and Anniversary Program ending with New Year's Eve Celebration.

Our philosophy has been throughout to sponsor activities that are cultural in nature

yet educational and entertaining with as little cost to parishioners as possible.

At this time I would like to express the heartfelt thanks of the Parish Council to all Church Auxiliary Organizations for their whole-hearted support and devotion throughout the year enabling us to fulfill our obligation to our parishioners. To the Mr. and Mrs. Society, the Men's Society, Ladies' Auxiliary, Women's Guild, Komitas Choir, Deacons, Sub-Deacons and to Deacon Mihran Hoplamazian for organization of the acolytes, Altar and Library Guilds, the Youth Organizations (ACYOA Seniors and Project Youth) and to the supervisors and teachers of the Sunday Armenian and Church Schools. Unquestionably without their support we would not have had the Blood Bank, the Ushers Corps. Communion breakfasts, Vartanantz celebration, Mas preparation and packaging, the various international festivals and many other of the activities and programs and services we so often take for granted.

Without a doubt the successful completion of all these activities could not have been achieved without the complete involvement of all our parishioners. Therefore, we owe an expression of thanks to many, many of you too numerous to mention individually. However, I would be derelict in my duties if I did not acknowledge the wonderful, unselfish and devoted service rendered by two husband and wife teams. Nellie and Steve Boyajian as chairmen of the Detroit International Riverfront Festival and Victoria and Leo Zamanigian as chairmen of the Church Picnic. I am sure that without the enthusiasm generated by the two fine couples we would not have achieved the success we did this year.

We again wish to extend our thanks to the Armenian-American Veterans for sharing their building and facilities with us. We have been able to expand our youth activities

knowing that we would be able to count on using their building.

This year, in spite of the rising maintenance costs and diminishing income, and the many activities sponsored by the Parish Council, we have attempted to live within our allocated budget and still institute new and innovative projects, such as, the completion of the vestment enclosure, the Social Welfare Fund and others.

One of our biggest tasks was to re-organize the Torch Bearer Staff, and select a new Editor. We found a very capable person in Thelma Astourian to assume this responsibility. She, along with her staff, have very religiously seen to the publication of the Jahagir on a monthly basis. We are very proud of our parish paper and we know you are also. We have an enthusiastic staff and we are grateful for their devotion in their chosen task.

A mention should also be made of the newly established AGBU Day School. We are proud to have it as part of our complex of buildings.

To conclude this report I would like to bring to your attention some of the projects and activities the Parish Council has been considering for the coming year. It again

appears to be an extremely active and hopefully a productive year.

We plan to review and update the Church and Building Policies; to investigate the possibility of establishing a Church Credit Union for our Parishioners; institute a new and active cultural committee; implement a visitation program by using the participation of both lay church members and the Clergy. We will participate, again by invitation, in the Riverfront Festival late in Augustandagain sponsor our annual Church Picnic in July.

Perhaps our largest undertaking, in cooperation with the Apostolic Society, will be the

renovation of the cultural hall. This has been in the planning stages for some time and

hopefully will reach fruition this year.

I am sure all of you realize, that no matter how elaborate or extensive our plans may be very little can be accomplished without the whole-hearted support, encouragement, cooperation and involvement of all the parishioners.

REGULAR AND SPECIAL MEETINGS DURING 1971

A total of twenty-seven regular Parish Council meetings and twenty-three Tivan meetings were held during 1971. In addition, periodic meetings were held with the Diocesan Delegates, Church Auxiliary Organization Executive Boards and the Church Schools.

CULTURAL BUILDING REPORT FOR 1971

Meetings held in the building by the following organizations: Parish Council, Ladies' Women's Guild, ACYOA Seniors, ACYOA Project Youth, Men's Society, Church School Teachers, Nursery School Teachers, Armenian School Teachers, AGBU Men, AGBU Women, AGBU Intermediate, AGBU Midwest, Apostolic Society, Michigan Home for the Armenian Aged, K of V. Shavarshan Lodge, K of V Nareg Lodge, and D of V Zabelle Otyag Lodge. The Detroit Bible Students meet every Monday and Wednesday; AGBU Day School held school five days a week, January-June. Nursery School is held three days a week from October-May. Sunday School classes were held every Sunday from the latter part of September to the first of June. Armenian School classes are held every Saturday and Sunday from September-June. Coffee Hour was held occasionally. Easter and Christian breakfasts were held for the children. A total of 58 paid rentals were made during the year. Thirty-seven church and affiliated group affairs were held. ACYOA Sports Weekend was held over the Labor Day Weekend. ACYOA Project Youth served Lenten Dinners every Wednesday evening during the Lenten Wednesdays. AGBU Dance classes were held three days a week, the first part of the year through June 28th. The ladies cooked in the kitchen three days a week beginning June 28 - August 20 in preparation for the Detroit Riverfront Festival which was held the weekend of August 20-22.

The Parish Council would like to thank Mr. Frank Bartholomew and his staff for

maintaining the building and equipment in excellent condition.

The major improvements which were made to the building for the year 1971 was (1) the installation of a new walk-in refrigerator, (2) furnishing the lobby, (3) baptismal font lights.

PLEDGE AND MEMBERSHIP

The Parish Council appreciates the excellent response we received on our drive to collect old and new pledges. The collection for 1971 dues was approximately 85% of the total, however, the delinquent dues, dating back to 1966 by some of the members of our parish, still remains at about \$40,000. If you are one who has still not remitted your past pledges please do so, so that we may be able to maintain and operate our beautiful facilities for our membership.

12TH ANNUAL CHURCH PICNIC

The 12th Annual Picnic of St. John's Armenian Church of Greater Detroit was held at the State Fair Grounds on Sunday, July 25, 1971. The success of the annual picnic was due to the fine support of the parishioners.

The Pastors and Parish Council of St. John's Armenian Church wish to express their appreciation to the picnic chairman, Mr. Leo-Zamanigian and his committee for a successful picnic which resulted in a net profit for the Church in the amount of \$2,216.21.

NEW YEAR'S EVE DINNER DANCE

The Parish Council expresses appreciation to Jack Kazanjian, chairman, and Mrs. Helen Armoudlian for her valuable assistance in arranging tickets, seating and advertisement. A special thanks is extended to Mrs. Barbara Couyoumjian and her committee for decorating the hall with a special flourish. Over 500 people attended this very successful event ending the old year with a bang and giving a profit to the Church for the amount of \$2,750.05.

ARMENIAN RIVERFRONT FESTIVAL

St. John's Armenian Church was invited by the City of Detroit to participate in an Ethnic Festival on the Detroit Riverfront on the weekend of August 20, 21 and 22, 1971.

Although this was a new venture for the Armenian community, it was not allowed to be an impossible one. It was a challenge met by our membership with enthusiasm and a willingness to work shoulder to shoulder to make it a resounding success.

Mrs. Nellie Boyajian graciously accepted the general chairmanship of this magnanimous undertaking and worked many long hours along with the dedicated booth chairmen. This tremendous task could not have been culminated into its success without the unselfish efforts of the men and women who organized each booth. The success of this ambitious

program was the team effort and support of our entire membership.

The weekend festivities were opened by His Honor, Roman S. Gribbs, Mayor of the City of Detroit, at a ceremony attended by Detroit councilmen, city dignitaries, clergy, Mr. and Mrs. Alex Manoogian, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Mardigian, Mr. and Mrs. Armen Simone. The major presented Mr. Alex Manoogian with a Proclamation from the City of Detroit. The mayor also presented "Armenian of the Year Awards" to Mr. Alex Manoogian and to Mr. Edward Mardigian. The ceremony was concluded with a brief musical program. Thus the Festival began. The Riverfront renamed Lake Sevan and Yerevan, became a miniature Armenia, featuring a wide variety of Armenian entertainment, Armenian cuisine, a boutique, flea market, cultural display, games for the children, demonstrations and ever so much more.

This was truly a memorable weekend for all Armenians. It was a great opportunity

for the non-Armenian community to meet the Armenian community.

The Pastors and Parish Council of St. John's Armenian Church are sincerely grateful to all of those who generously donated their time and efforts which enabled the church to realize a sum of nearly \$17,000.

To remember the Festival is to remember our great heritage and our pride in being

an Armenian.

WAYNE STATE UNIVERSITY ARMENIAN STUDIES

St. John's Armenian Church is continuing its financial support to the Wayne State University Armenian Studies Program.

Courses in language minor for college credit, as well as an Armenian culture course in English are offered by the University.

ARMENIAN COMMUNITY MEMORIAL WOODLAWN CEMETERY

The memorial project was initiated by the Parish Council of St. John's Armenian Church in 1958. We are very proud of the two beautiful memorial shrines erected in Woodlawn Cemetery.

The program is still continuing and we urge our parishioners to make their selections while a good choice is available.

TENTH ANNIVERSARY

The combined celebration of the tenth anniversary of the Cultural Building and the fifth anniversary of the Church was held on Sunday, November 21, 1971, with a beautiful organ recital by Mr. Berj Zamkochian.

500 people enjoyed, with a great deal of pride, the musical talents of Berj Zamkochian. His program was highlighted by the interesting, informative and descriptive comments

about his varied selections.

This was another of the cultural as well as entertaining programs that was planned and presented by the Parish Council. The primary cost of this program was underwritten by the Parish Council keeping in mind that this was not a fund-raising or money making activity.

In appreciation for his efforts, Mr. Zamkochian was presented with a \$1,000 check

to the Gomidas Organ Fund which is so dear to his heart.

The Parish Council feels that the successful response to this program will encourage

it to continue to plan for others in the coming years.

A reception was held in the Cultural Building immediately following the recital. Guests were able to meet and converse with Mr. Zamkochian and congratulate him on his exceptionally fine program.

CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION - CATHOLICOS KAREKIN HOVSEPIAN

The traditional Cultural Day in October was fittingly celebrated by the observance of the centennial of the birth of the late Catholicos Karekin Hovsepian, who designated October as Armenian Culture month when he was the Primate of our Diocese more than thirty years ago.

The observance, one of many throughout the Diocese as directed by our Primate Archbishop Torkom Manoogian, was planned by the Pastors and Parish Council and was held in the Cultural Building on Sunday, October 31, 1971, at 7:00 P.M., with The Most Reverend Archbishop Sion Manoogian presiding. The program featured a guest speaker from New York, Deacon Krikor H. Maksoudian, an instructor in Armenian Studies and a Ph. D. candidate at Columbia University. Most of all the children love to sing Der Voghormia. It seems to be significant because they know "why" they are singing it.

Under the direction of Mrs. Florence Gopigian the children enjoy English song and games including birthday time. Even the summer birthdays are not forgotten as we sing

for these children jointly in June.

Three times a year our little ones are tested. It is very simple and a very effective measure of what they have retained. We play Armenian bingo with pictures of words they should know in each square. No one fails these exams because it is fun and if they don't remember the word they learn it while they take the exam.

Little white caps with a tassel and proud parents and grandparents are the only ingredients needed to make everything perfect. This year we bid farewell to 33 graduates. They were each given an Armenian coloring book besides a lovely diploma not to mention a hug and kiss. Class snap shots were taken and sold to the parents who desired them at a very nominal cost.

Mangabardez is self-sufficient and helps meet expenses by the sale of candy and

bread (peda).

Children are encouraged to bring their friends to class as a guest and soon the guest becomes a permanent guest and then a member.

each time.



RULES AND REGULATIONS CONCERNING CHURCH MEMBERSHIP

"All persons who have been baptized and confirmed in the Armenian Church, who accept its doctrine, canons and rites, and who fulfill their obligations to the church and community, shall be members in good standing of the Parish Church and shall constitute the Parish Assembly".

"Every Member of the Parish, 21 years of age or over, shall pay the church an annual

due".

"Members in good standing of a Parish Church, who are twenty-one years of age or over, may participate in the assemblies of the same parish and may vote, provided that at least six months have elapsed since the date of their registration as members of the Parish and their dues have been paid. They may be eligible for office one year after becoming members".

"Members who fail to pay their dues for one or more years, automatically forfeit their right to vote at Parish Assemblies, or to hold elective office within the Parish. Such members may reinstate these rights by payment of their dues in arrears for at least the previous two years".

RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING PARISH ASSEMBLY

"The agenda of the Parish Assembly shall be prepared by the Parish Priest and the Parish Council. Other matters of new business may be added by majority vote of the Parish Assembly".

"At Parish Assemblies the presence of a minimum of one-third of the eligible voting membership or fifty members shall constitute a quorum. Decisions shall be rendered by

majority vote of members present and voting".

"In a Parish Assembly each member shall be entitled to one vote which is not transferable and must be cast in person."
