

The Armenian Church beneath every stone in its floor


Holds a secret passage leading up to Heaven...



#### PRIMATE'S MESSAGE

The Holy Cross Church community of Union City, one of the oldest parishes in our Diocese, has every reason to rejoice in the 90th anniversary celebration of its establishment. Ninety years is certainly a formidable age in human and institutional terms. 

#### THE HISTORIC 90 YEARS OF HOLY CROSS CHURCH

It is the turn of the century.

the 1800's move off the calendar on the wall.

the 1900's begin.


It is a milestone for the United States which is busy transforming itself from an agricultural to an industrial economy.

It is also a milestone in the tragic saga of an ancient peoplethe Armenians - who for millennia having defended and died for their homeland, for their Christian faith and for sheer survival, seem almost certain that a greater tragedy will visit them. Some among them are sadly ready to leave home, farm, church and seek safety somewhere else. They are mostly the poorer elements, defenseless orphans, widows, the elderly and the hopeless. They go to Bulgaria, to Roumania, to the Middle East and then turn Westward to the Land of New Hope...America.

They are not the only ones who have headed West. For some sixty years, immigrants have by the boatload poured daily into cities along the American seaboard. They have come from Ireland, from Germany, from Italy and from many other countries in Europe and Asia --- and they have come in far greater numbers than the Armenians.

Ellis Island, the major port of entry, is in a continual tumult --- a tumult caused by the excited hubbub of so many tongues whose owners have just had their first glimpse of the Statue of Liberty.

Scores of Armenian immigrants are in the daily bedlam of Ellis Island. Some of the newcomers from the Armenian Homeland will head for New England, for the city of Worcester, MA,

In Memory of my Dear Husband DERAN By Ann Chopoorian where the first Armenian colony was established some fifteen or twenty years before. Some will journey for days cross country by train for a place in California called Fresno where the more adventurous Armenians had gone. A certain number, however, will travel only a short distance --- maybe by ferryboat and trolley car --- to the melting pot in New Jersey's Hudson County --- to a town known then as West Hoboken, now Union City, New Jersey.

Most of the newcomers to West Hoboken will settle in a section of the town known as "the Dardanelles". The name derived from the polyglot makeup of the teeming five-to-six block square area in which, living almost on top of one another, are Armenians, Germans, Greeks, Irish, Italians, Jews, Swiss, Syrians --- and even a few other ethnic groups. This almost unbelievable human melange is clustered about such streets as Shippen Street, Dodd Street, Angelique Street, West Street, Jane Street and Highpoint, Central and Summit Avenues.

Each Dardanelle group has its own culture. But all have two problems in common --- adjusting to the English language and to a new way of life. But they manage. They get along together, And they grow together. Most of this adaptation and assimilation takes place under the presidential administrations of William McKinley, Theodore Roosevelt and Woodrow Wilson.

The West Hoboken Armenians hail almost entirely from the proud ancient city of Dikranagerd, the City built by Dikranes the Great, that indomitable, ferocious, mighty king who enlarged the Armenian borders, declared the city he built the capital of Armenia and ruled over a vast land. These descendants of King Dikran were a proud people, proud of their language - a mixture of Armenian, Persian, Arabic and Turkish - and especially proud of their Christian heritage and tradition. But like all other ethnic groups their newcomers began assimilating and soon became accustomed to the new ways, new customs of the new America which would be their

new home, as their return to the homeland, Armenia, become less and less a reality.

Those roots go all the way back to the year 301 A.D. when historic Armenia becomes the first nation in the world to adopt Christianity as its national religion. Down through the centuries that are to follow, they are to fight and die for that religion. Very late in the 19th century --- in 1895 --- the first tremor of the ghastly Genocide that is to horrify the world in 1915 --- befalls the Armenians of Dikranagerd. A bloody three-day carnage leaves the streets strewn with bodies --- and it is then that the Armenians of the once-proud capital decide that their homeland is no more for them.

It is not easy getting to the New World. there isn't an Armenian family around today who has not heard stories of years of temporary haven and privation in the Middle East, in Egypt's Cairo and Alexandria or maybe France's Marseille and Le Havre. But eventually, the Armenians get to the New World. And once they set foot on new soil and settle permanently, it is not surprising they talk of building a church.

So it is in West Hoboken. There are many informal discussions, but on September 15, 1899 a group of prominent Armenians meet to declare themselves "Gregorian Armenians entitled to protection of the free use of their religion by Constitution and law..." and petition the State of New Jersey to grant them permission to "electing trustees with a view of becoming incorporated according to Law."

On the first day of July 1901, the State grants their request and thus a Board of Trustees is born.

As the leadership was certain that the State would grant them Incorporation and authority to elect a Board of Trustees, it called a meeting on April 21, 1901 for the election of Trustees. The minutes of the meeting - supervised and presided over by the Very Rev. Vahram Nazaretian - indicate the names of elected trustees and number of votes each one received. Even then much attention was given to democratic rule and preservation of records for posterity.

Around 1903 the "Hokepartzoo's" purchase a plot on which to build the church. A year later they decide the plot is not large enough. They negotiate, swap the original site for a bigger one across the street and on Sunday, September 16, 1906, they consecrate the ground.

Sixteen pillar and cornerstones, each stone carrying the name of a saint, were blessed and consecrated before being placed in a vault that is buried in the ground directly under the altar of Holy Cross Church. Each stone had a different sponsor and among the sponsors was Mrs. Helen Holthausen, a Christian-minded lady who although not a communicant of the church nevertheless contributed a substantial sum of money toward the building fund and sponsored a cornerstone in memory of her late husband, Arend, who had years before founded a department store in nearby Union Hill.

A photograph of that ground consecration still survives. The men wore derbies and many had flowing handlebar mustachios; the women wore big picture hats with plumes.

Things move rapidly. A little over four months later, on Sunday, January 27, 1907, Holy Cross Church opens its doors.

The Holy Cross Armenian Church was the third to be established in the New World. The first, Church of our Saviour, was built in Worcester in 1891, and the second, the Holy Trinity Church of Fresno in California in 1903. Unfortunately, the Worcester church was sold some years back to an Abyssinian congregation and the Fresno church was burned down making the Holy Cross Armenian Church of Union City, New Jersey, the oldest standing church in the United States and the New World, designed and built as an Armenian Church, and her doors open for worship through the nine decades of her founding.

Bishop Hovsep Sarajian celebrates the first Badarak in Holy Cross Church. He has served previously as a Vartabed at occasional services held in nearby Episcopal Churches (notably Jung Den Sun en fund

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St. John's Episcopal Church on the same Clinton Avenue - now New York Avenue) before Holy Cross Church is erected.

An indefatigable worker, the Bishop is also a highly capable fund raiser in those early years. He obtains substantial contributions from three wealthy New York families - the Tavshanjians, the Gulbenkians and the Kareoghosians.

The community does its share, too. Every affair seems to have had as its primary purpose the raising of money for the erection of the church. There is a record of a young men's athletic group --- known as Gajar A.C. -- presenting a play as far back as Sunday, March 22, 1902, for such a purpose. The name of the play was "Vreshkhntir Dikran" -- Vengeful Dikran.

Many wrinkles are ironed out before the building of the church begins. The Ladies Educational Society, organized even before the consecration of the church ground, is prevailed upon to wait for the building of a school for which it has ben pressing constantly. And then there are problems with the Armenian political clubs which were active in the early 1900's.

But Bishop Sarajian succeeds in solving the problems. The church is completed at a cost of \$11,000. A mortgage of \$4,000 is the tideover.

A story of that first service is carried on the first page of THE DISPATCH, then an afternoon newspaper. Not only does the story describe the Badarak in complete detail --- but it concludes one paragraph with "the service began at nine o'clock and was not concluded until 2:30 in the afternoon!"

It is a source of constant surprise to many that the Ladies Educational Society preceded the establishment of the Holy Cross Church. Way back, on September 6, 1905, some of the newly arrived Armenian women aimed towards the perpetuation of the Armenian language and culture, and established the "Hye Dignantz Gurtasiratz Miutyun" -- the Armenian Women's Cultural Society.

Their dream for a school building is finally realized in 1913, when the building which is now known as the Annex, is completed. On April 13, 1913, the school is formally opened. Classes are held daily from 4 to 6 p.m. --- after public school. Three years later, in July of 1916, Mrs. Aroosiag Jerrahian, the then teacher, awards diplomas to the school's first graduating class. The seven graduates are Azniv Ansoorian, Rose Aslanian, Noyemzar Minassian, Josephine Keshishian, Marion Shatafian, Dicran Goulian and Lud Shahbazian. The graduation exercise is held at Oak Street's Swiss Turn Hall --- site of the important Armenian functions of the time.

Down through the years, Soorp Mesrobian Hye Varjaran's many dedicated teachers have taught the "aip-pen-keem" to many, many students. One of the school's highlight years in 1932 when another beloved teacher, Mrs. Siranoosh Katchouny at the graduation exercises honors no less than 16 students. the diplomas are handed to the graduates by none other than the Diocesan Primate of the time, His Eminence Levon Archbishop Tourian who the following year will become a martyr to his church.

Mampre Vartabed Calfayan is pastor at the time. Because of the gradual social mobility of the population, Armenian schools are established in West New York (the Tourian School), in North Bergen and even in Jersey City. Economic conditions, however, force the closing of the perimeter schools by the time of Mrs. Zabelle Sahagian's tenure as teacher. They are combined under one fold again. To accommodate the outer students, parish trustees such as Mike Megerdichian, Harry Sabonjian and Mike Nakashian rotate at picking up students for the Saturday morning classes (every day classes have long disappeared).

In due time, a regular bus service is arranged --- and it still holds forth Saturday mornings. But buses --- and teachers --- and text books --- all cost money and the Ladies Educational's longtime chairperson, Mrs. Alice Najarian, has a constant financial problem on her hands. Thanks to energetic advisor, Victoria Tukmanian, and her committee, the Ladies Educational Society manage to provide Armenian education and culture to the Armenian youth.

The community's joy over the Armenian School's first graduation in the summer of 1916 is severely shaken, however, when the news begins coming in of the appalling 1915 massacres of the Armenians by the Turks --- a holocaust that starts on the night of April 24 --- a tragically unforgettable date in Armenian history.

News travels slowly in those days. There is no radio --- no television. Only by long-delayed mail sent months later by survivors who have escaped and found refuge elsewhere in the Middle East do the Armenians of West Hoboken learn of the tragic fate of their kinfolk in the homeland, of the merciless, stone-hearted carnages --- of the death marches in the burning desert --- of the savage butchery that will take a million and half lives --- of the horrible blood-letting which will go down in history as the First Genocide of the 20th Century.

Overwhelmed with grief, an anguished parish immediately takes steps to save survivors from wherever they have found haven. A huge benefit for funds is held in West Hoboken's newly-built Emerson High School at which the three most noted Armenian singers of the time --- Shah Muradian, Armand Tokatyan and Mrs. Zabelle Aram are on the program which concludes with a massive "hankanagootyoon." (fundraising).

It is a most grievous period and the entrance of the United States into World War One in April 1917, makes conditions more grave. Scores of young men from the parish go into Uncle Sam's service. They are even preceded to the front by

some who have volunteered earlier to fight in the Caucasus under General Antranig's Armenian Legion organized in France.

It is only after World War One ends that some of the dazed survivors of the 1915 holocaust are located and brought to the United States, not a few of them to West Hoboken. The late beloved Very Rev. Vahram Nazaretian, pastor at the time, is of great help to the new arrivals.

It is during Father Vahram's first tenure that the Sunday School is established. Though there have been sporadic classes in the past, parish council chairman, Dicran Simsarian, noting that many parishioners' children are attending Sunday School at nearby churches, proposes on November 2, 1921, that a regular Holy Cross Sunday School be launched. The proposal is accepted immediately and his bride of only a few months, Satenig, is the first regular teacher.

The growing community's Armenian School enrollment also increases with the arrival of Mrs. Siranoosh Katchouny as teacher. Enrollment reaches as high as 150 and other teachers such as Mrs. Rosa Varzhabedian and Mrs. Siranoush Bledjian are fondly remembered. But it should be mentioned that the community hasn't started to move northward and westward as yet.

Harry K. Norian and Peter M. Fanarjian, long active parishioners and trustees, enthusiastically prepare the unified community for the celebration of the 25th anniversary of the church. Attendance at both the Armenian School and the Sunday School keep going up. Shamiran Shapshapian (now Kassabian) is in charge of the good-sized Armenian-English library in the Annex and is kept busy indeed after Badarak ends each Sunday. Mampre Vartabed Calfayan, sensing the needs of the outer population, establishes St. Leon's Church in Paterson (which will move decades later to Fair Lawn). The first requests come in at this time for a church in the Newark area.

In the midst of all this ascending movement, the untimely death of Archbishop Levon Tourian, Primate of the North American Diocese, affects the Holy Cross Armenian Church immediately. Mampre Vartabed is called to Diocesan headquarters in New York City and is named Locum Tenens. Courageously he carries on Archbishop Tourian's work. Very Rev. Nazaretian is called back as pastor of Holy Cross.

In the midst of these trying times and amid the Great Depression which all but drowns the United States in utter desolation --- the Ladies Aid of Holy Cross is born.

Half a century later it will be renamed Women's Guild of Holy Cross. But it is born Ladies Aid. Three women parishioners -- Mrs. Makrouhie Kazazian, Mrs. Ovsanna Kassabian and Mrs. Hyganoosh Attashian hold an informal conference on October 11, 1934 and send out notices for an organizational meeting. Mrs. Attashian is elected president.

Soon thereafter the group begins pressing the parish council to build a church center where affairs may be held with ease. By 1938, a drive for funds begin.

But in the early 1940's, World War II breaks out, a conflagration that will embroil the entire globe. All civilian projects come to a halt.

Not until the war is over years later --- and more than 600 parishioners turn out to welcome back home some 300 veterans at nearby Schuetzen Park's pavilion --- does the clamor for a center resume.

It is around this time that Khoren Shahbazian is elected parish council chairman. After listening to the interminable discussions and recommendations as to where-to-build and what-to-build, he personally purchases in the early summer of 1952, a building at 27th Street and Bergenline Avenue (the old City Theater), just one block from the church, and donates it to

Holy Cross for a center.

To the great sorrow of the community, Mr. Shahbazian dies of a heart attach while on vacation in Fresno, California, on September 8, 1952. Vice Chairman, Edward Turnamian, and the parish building committee consisting of Haig Simsarian, Krikor Chakmaklian, Haig Sheklian and Deran Chopoorian, have the center ready by December for dedication by the then Diocesan Primate, Mampre Archbishop Calfayan. Two years later, the center houses the annual Diocesan Convention, the first time in which the Holy Cross parish is host since 1910.

Its dream at last realized, the Ladies Aid is to make full use of the Center. Ladies Aid will soon be called "the good right arm of the parish council". In turn the Ladies Aid calls the Center "the good right arm of the Ladies Aid" --- especially the Center's kitchen whence derives most of the monies from the organizations's affairs. "There is nothing like Armenian cooking," one old timer says. The Ladies Aid helps regularly with contributions to the parish treasury for renovations and refurbishing, etc. In 1955, Khoren Shahbazian's wife, Mary, a Ladies Aid member and a very close friend of the Ladies Aid's chairlady, Azniv Hakimian, dies. In her will she leaves a beguest for \$5,000 "for any sums that may be due on the Center account." Another faithful parishioner, Araxy Mason, follows suit many years later and donates \$5,000. Recognizing the historical value of Holy Cross, not only for the present, but for the future as well, many similar donations are made in smaller, but steady amounts.

Post war years are always marked by surges in religious activity. There is great movement in the Diocese. Karekin Surpazan Hovsepian, primate from 1939 to 1944, has started a movement for the erection of an Armenian Cathedral in New York City. Tiran Archbishop Nersoyan who succeeds him, furthers the movement by launching a brick campaign in which Holy Cross takes a solid part.

There is great movement among the Diocesan Clergy also. Father Mesrob Semerjian succeeds Father Nazaretian as Holy Cross pastor. Khoren Kahana Mamigonian follows Father Semerjian. There comes periods when Father Semerjian returns but in early 1952, Father Hmayak Intoyan is named pastor. In between the shifting of pastors, Father Zgon Der Hagopian serves Holy Cross.

Father Intoyan spurs new life into all the church organizations, particularly the Armenian Church Youth Organization. Then one day comes the news that Father Hmayak has been assigned by Etchmiadzin to Persia. Again Father Zgon Der Hagopian is called upon to resume his former duties.

On May 25, 1956, the parish council chairman, Lud Shahbazian, and the congregation's elder of the church, Haig Simsarian, greet the new pastor at Idlewild Airport. He is a slender young seminarian who has studied at Antelias, Manchester and Edinburgh.

He is Vatche Apegha Hovsepian.

For the next dozen years, father Vatche is to have a tremendous impact on Holy Cross. It is his first pastorate ---but his tenure will be referred to in time as Holy Cross' "Golden Years" --- outrivaling the stretch between 1927 and 1934 which saw Mampre Vartabed Calfayan as pastor.

The new pastor stops only briefly at the Diocesan Headquarters on New York's Second Avenue (where the Cathedral stands today) before heading for New Jersey. In the next decade or so, with the aid of parish council chairman, Nubar Dorian, and Harold Azmelian (who serves 8 years) he:

- Effects the establishment of the Sunday School classrooms in the church basement;
- Replaces the altar, which has served

since 1924, with a traditional Armenian-style altar designed by noted architect, Jacob Bilzerian;

- Replaces the standard windows of the church with stained glass windows;
- Encourages the parish to purchase a building next to the Center. The kitchen is shifted to the rear of the Center and a new front is carved out on the south side, freeing hundreds of square feet for the hall proper;

- He responds favorably with the suggestion that a Men's Club be formed;
- Wins adoption of the pledge system for parish dues.

Father Vatche does our church real proud when on the night of May 30, 1960, he is host clergyman to His Holiness, Vasken I, Catholicos of All Armenians. It is an epochal event for it is the first time that an Armenian Catholicos has come to America. His Holiness presides over an evening service at Holy Cross after which he is escorted to the Church Center where Nubar Dorian makes such a magnificent welcoming speech that His Holiness pays him a very warm compliment.

And eight years later Father Vatche plays a major role again when Vasken I comes to America for the second time for the dedication of St. Vartan Cathedral in New York. Krikor Bendian, who with Mardiros Katoonagian, has served on our Altar for more than 40 years, is Holy Cross' godfather for the occasion.

Shortly thereafter, good news and bad news arrive

simultaneously.

The good news is that Vatche Vartabed has been ordained a bishop! The bad news is that he will leave immediately for Canada where he has been assigned as Primate.

With his departure, some problems are to arise for Holy Cross. Having served so long and with such dedication to the community, it will seem difficult to find a replacement. successive parish council chairmen --- Zaven Hovsepian, John Hovsepian, Bart Sarkissian, Charles Apkarian, Harry Shenloogian, attempt to serve the needs of the parish.





In May of 1968, Very Rev. Vertanes Kalayjian is named pastor. It was also during his tenure that tribute is paid to Haig Simsarian who had reached his 90th year and was awarded the Medal of St. Gregory, highest distinction accorded to a layman by the Armenian Church. He was the fourth Holy Cross parishioner to have won the honor, having been preceded by Dicran Simsarian of Fort Lee, Jack Shahinian of Tenafly and Lud Shahbazian of Ridgefield.

With the permission of the Primate and the blessing of the Catholicos, Very Rev. Vertanes Kalayjian was married, thereby changing his status to Der Hayr. His Yeretzgin, Anahid, proved to be very useful to our Parish. After serving Holy Cross for 4 years, Rev. Vertanes was reassigned to St. Mary's Church in Elberon to revitalize the former "summer" church to full scale activity.

Following a short period without benefit of a pastor, the parish council, under the chairmanship of John Hovsepian, continues to carry on parish responsibilities until the arrival of Rev. Fr. Vartan Megherian.

During the two years that Father Megherian served Holy Cross, we greatly benefited from his experience and especially that of Yeretzgin Yefkine's activities in reviving interest in the Sunday School and Der Hayr's formation of the Senior Citizens

### Group.

Shortly after Father Megherian's reassignment to Holy Cross Church of New York City, Father Ari Kehaiyan assumes the pastorate. During his brief tenure, Holy Cross sponsored the banquet celebrating the 25th anniversary of the ordination to the priesthood of Archbishop Vatche Hovsepian, our former pastor. Another accomplishment of Father Ari was to take decisive action in welcoming the new Armenian immigrants, especially from Beirut and Aleppo, into our Parish.

During the interim between the departure of Father Ari and the arrival of Father Carnig Hallajian, Dick Assoian carried out his duties as chairman of the parish council much in the tradition established by his predecessors.

When Father Carnig returned to Holy Cross as the Parish Priest he came not as a stranger. He had spent the required 40 days of pastoral preparation under the guidance of Father Vatche and prior to that served as a deacon in the 1950's. It seems fitting that he chose as his Yeretzgin a former Holy Cross parishioner, the former Rose Norian.

Before returning to Holy Cross, Father Carnig served as pastor in two parishes which brought him tremendous opportunity to gain experience and to recognize the need that some changes had to be made in Holy Cross. Chief among these were the physical alteration of the church, including new carpeting donated by the Nakashians, his former parishioners at St. Leon's, the church annex was completely refurbished as was the parish house. In addition the age of modern technology required the purchase of new equipment for the office. Father Carnig also began to prepare and publish a weekly Sunday Church Bulletin.

The Holy Cross Choir, steeped in the tradition of Anton Cherezian, Harry K. Shalian, and Hosrof Hamamjian, is ranked as the best in the East. Since the departure of Mr. Hamamjian, it has been under the direction of Ann Dadaian, Arpena Tavitian Sbarbaro and Dawn Foronjy Donofrio. Toward the end of 1980, it moved upstairs into the "choir loft", from the chancel to the balcony.

It would be remiss of us not to recognize the model devotion of Ann Dadaian to the Holy Cross Church. Our choir's success is due to her untiring efforts to recruit members and to inspire them to perform in an exemplary fashion. In addition to her responsibilities with the choir she has been the volunteer secretary of our church for many years and continues to attend to all the needs of the community whenever called upon.

The delegate set-up has undergone a major change, too. For many years Holy Cross has sent five delegates to the annual Diocesan Convention. To comply with the new regulations regarding the ratio of delegates to parish membership, the Holy Cross delegate are now but two, Nubar Dorian and Zaven Hovsepian.

Still other changes seem to be necessitated due to the changing American lifestyle as it effects our Armenian-American families. The Ladies Aid Society, which was an afternoon organization did not allow for expansion of membership since most of the second generation women worked. Its once strong membership began to dwindle until it regrouped itself as the Women's Guild of Holy Cross. Under the energetic chairpersonship of Arpena Sbarbaro, the membership has grown, and it seems to have the same vitality for this generation as its counterpart had for the earlier years. Arpena Sbarbaro's innovative mind and leadership qualities coupled

with her love for our church continues to make our Women's Guild the envy of all neighboring churches. Much is owed to Arpena and her organization for the financial stability of our church --- through the bazaars, flea markets, rummage sales, picnics and other church activities, this auxiliary has donated tens of thousands of dollars to our church.

Yeretzgin Rose, a state certified teacher, had taken on the responsibility of reestablishing the Sunday School along professional lines, in keeping with the many changes being proposed by the Diocesan Council for Religious Education. Yeretzgin Rose had sought out, as Sunday School teachers, those who are already teachers: i.e., Sylvia Bozoyan and Alice Bozoyan and Gloria Mary Zulumian, and those who have particular skills and talents to benefit the young children as displayed by Thomas Dabakian and Vivian Hovsepian.

With the support of the Sunday School Faculty, Yeretzgin Rose had pushed for complete renovation of the Sunday School facilities in time for the September reopening of classes. Her untimely death continues to leave a void in our church.

In keeping with the expansion of women's roles in general in the United States, Holy Cross elected Anne Hachadoorian, the first women to be a parish council member. Her untimely death on November 15, 1980, saddened the community, but also broke up the husband-wife church team that worked diligently for Holy Cross.

Towards the end of 1980, news came from Miami of the passing of Very Rev. Vahram Nazaretian, a priest who touched the lives of so many of the Holy Cross parishioners. Only Vatche Vartabed's tenure has exceeded the time spent by Father Nazaretian over two pastorates, at Holy Cross.

The Senior Citizen's Group, loosely organized during Father Megherian's time, has blossomed into a full fledged organization meeting every Tuesday in the newly renovated

annex officially dedicated on November 15, 1980.

And, to end on a bittersweet note, Martyr's Day this year (1981) was commemorated at Holy Cross by the planting of two trees in front of the Church building. It was an inspiring day --- survivors of the 1915 holocaust, newer refugees from Istanbul, Aleppo and Beirut, together with third and fourth generation Armenian-Americans were spiritually joined as one sharing their group identify and religion.

A true milestone of the church was the celebration of the 75th anniversary of the Holy Cross Church Consecration on Sunday, September 27, 1981. No event of such magnitude had ever taken place. Archbishop Torkom Manoogian, Primate of the Eastern Diocese and Archbishop Vatche Hovsepian, Primate of the Western Diocese were both present to emphasize the importance and meaning of the occasion. following Church Services more than 800 attended the banquet held at Schuetzen Park. Both clergy and lay from all the neighboring Armenian communities took part in this unforgettable celebration. Mr. Harold Azmelian, the chairman of the banquet committee, was outstanding in organizing the affair. Mr. Philip Arpiarian, the then chairman of the parish council and Harold Azmelian together did the Holy Cross family so proud that it owes every accolade and gratitude to these two outstanding members of our church.

During 1982, we celebrated the 30th anniversary of our community center and also the first parish Christmas Party took place. This has become an annual event whereby the church shows its appreciation to its devoted members by sharing food and fellowship.

The congregation was extremely pleased when the church was air conditioned and the exterior cross on the church building was repaired.

In 1984 the church community deeply grieved the passing of Yeterzgin Rose Hallajian. Although she left us in body, her

memory will always remain with us and her spirit will always be embedded within the walls of our church. We cannot forget the concern shown by Rev. Arshen Aivazian for taking care of Sunday Services for over three months during Rev. Carnig Hallajian's tragic loss.

The computer age has hit our church community when we modernized our office by computerizing the office functions. A great deal of computer support assistance was given by members of the church community.

Rev. Diran Papazian was assigned as pastor of our parish by the Diocesan Primate, Archbishop Torkom Manoogian on October in 1985.

It was learned that Mr. John Ayvazian, who lived most of his life in New York, bequeathed in his will a considerable sum of money to our church. This is another example of remembering one's original roots and ties to Holy Cross Church.

In 1987, another significant void was created in our church community with the loss of Mr. Deran Chopoorian. His many decades of service to his beloved church will forever be recognized as a model of true love for the mother church.

With the parting of Rev. Diran Papazian and the unavailability of a new pastor, our church relied on visiting pastors for the celebration of the Divine Liturgy. Father Carnig Hallajian, Father Arnak Kasparian, Father Garden Gdanian, Father Mardiros Chevian, Father Arten Ashjian, Father Yeznig Balian, Father Mesrob Semerjian and others deserve our gratitude and thanks. The administrative functions were handled by the Parish Council --- a truly devoted group of men and women who did all in their power to glue the community together and attempt to function without the benefit of a full-time pastor. The Parish Council alone could not function had it not been for the voluntary and loving leadership it received from Father Carnig Hallajian. Even though retired he did more for our community than most full-time priests had done.

Father Carnig helped prepare Sunday Bulletins, supervise and organize the contents of our monthly VISION, attend our Parish Council meetings when asked, give spiritual and administrative leadership to the entire community --- all this can only be described as superb. We deeply appreciate his irreplaceable assistance. He continues to celebrate Divine Liturgy in our church at least 26 Sundays out of the year and attends to all our Christmas and Easter Week service needs.

Upon his retirement from the St. Thomas Church in Tenafly—the Parish Council approached Rev. Father Arnak Kasparian and suggested that he consider celebrating the Divine Liturgy 26 Sundays a year and preside over the Sacraments of Baptisms, Weddings and Funerals when asked. We are extremely delighted and are grateful to him for his graciously accepting this arrangement. His visits to the homes of Parishioners, visiting the sick in hospitals are appreciated by the Holy Cross Church Family. Taking advantage of his years of experience, his wise counsel and advice has helped further strengthen our church and community.

Aware of the need to help Archdeacon Hagop Hovsepian at the altar, the Parish Council asked him to train John Hovsepian, John Malool, Hacik Sariminassian and Hagop Kradjian in the various aspects of deacon responsibilities. With great dedication Hagop undertook the task and after successfully passing the examination by the Primate, the Parish Council invited the Primate, Archbishop Torkom Manoogian to celebrate the Divine Liturgy on April 10, 1988, and give them permission and privileges to bear stoles and perform other duties during the Divine Liturgy. The community owes Hagop Hovsepian gratitude and thanks for this exemplary dedication to our church and admires his knowledge of all phases of our church services. Along with Deacon Hagop, we are pleased to have Archdeacon Mardiros Barsamian who faithfully serves our Altar during the Divine Liturgy.

Our church is proud and privileged to support St. Nersess Seminary. Throughout the years, we have been one of the few churches who donates \$3,000 each year because our community feels strongly the need for well qualified priests. In addition, we are happy to be assigned seminarians to serve at our altar, and this practice continues to this day. We provide their transportation expenses.

The tragic earthquake of 1988 in Armenia was devastating to Armenian everywhere. Yet, all Armenians have pulled together to help overcome the natural disaster that caused death and destruction to so many of our brothers and sisters.

Upon the arrival of His Holiness Vasken I and Catholicos Karekin II (of the See of Cilicia) to coordinate the Earthquake Fund, members from various Armenian organizations and other individuals active in the community were invited by the two Catholicoi to formulate plans. Mr. Nubar Dorian was among those invited to represent the Holy Cross Community. Our parish was most active collectively as well as individually, donating more than \$50,000 for the Earthquake Fund.

An organ committee was formed, led by Ms. Mary Shalakian to raise the necessary funds for the purchase of a new church organ. The response from the Holy Cross community was overwhelming and as a result, two new organs were purchased at a cost of \$32,000. One organ stands in the church proper and the other in the balcony. Churchgoers have only to sit in their church pews and listen with open ears to the melodic sounds bellowing from the organ pipes surrounding the interior of the church during Sunday Services. Also in 1989, a new Kavazan (staff) was purchased and is kept on the altar.

Our Church had the distinct honor of having His Eminence Bishop Khajag Barsamian, perform his first Divine Liturgy as Bishop in Holy Cross Church. The Holy Cross Church community also had the distinguished honor of being the first Parish to host a dinner for His Eminence following his consecration to the rank of Bishop in Holy Etchmiadzin. Recognizing the extreme importance of missionary work in Armenia, the Annual Assembly of Holy Cross allocated the princely sum of \$15,000 to be used for the much neglected religious needs of Armenia, such as the Sunday School's printing of religious materials. Father Carnig was asked to supervise the distribution of these funds. The Holy Cross Church Family is determined to continue its missionary work which it believes is so vital for the strengthening of the Homeland.

Mrs. Alice Najarian who for years had dedicated herself to the Mesrobian Armenian School's well-being proposed and the Annual Parish Assembly voted to assign all responsibility of operating the history laden 90-year old school to the Parish Council. The Ladies Educational Society which had been kept alive and active only through the efforts of Mrs. Najarian transferred its entire funds of some \$8,000 to the Parish Council. The Council, meeting with the new supervisor and superintendent of the Armenian School, Mrs. Alice Yigitkurt, decided to inaugurate bus service to keep the increased enrollment. Since this action was taken 11 new students enrolled and with two other teachers, Maggie Nazarian and Sela Nazarian continue to help the community's children learn our precious language. The Parish Council extends thanks and gratitude to Mrs. Alice Najarian for her decades of service and pays tribute to Mrs. Yigitkurt for continuing to serve our Parish School. Mrs. Yigitkurt also serves on the Parish Council and acts as the liaison with our ever-growing new Bolsahay community.

Our Sunday School with far less number of students than ever before, continues to function only through the exemplary dedication of Sylvia Bozoyan, our superintendent. The Parish Council recognized her many years of service to our Sunday School on September 15, 1991 immediately after Church Services and presented her with a gem studded cross. Ms. Elise Antreassian, Director of the Council for Religious Education also presented Sylvia a gift on behalf of the Diocese.

The entire Holy Cross Armenian Church Community was saddened by the death of Mr. Lud Shahbazian. Lud will always be remembered for his devotion and dedication toward the perpetuation and advancement of our church. His wise counsel will be dearly missed.

Since the establishment of our Senior Citizens Group in 1980, Mrs. Mary Seraidarian, a devoted member of our choir, had been its chairperson and the force behind this auxiliary. We much regret her passing two years ago. The Senior Citizens Group continues to function with the able leadership of Mary Kaprielian and Mary Sahagian.

Upon learning that Rev. Father Carnig Hallajian was officially notified by our Primate that His Holiness Vasken I had elevated him to Avak Kahana, the Parish Council --- against Father Carnig's wishes - organized a reception in his honor on June 12, 1992. The entire community, along with delegations from St. Leon's and Holy Martyr's Churches, attended making this affair not only a memorable one, but also an occasion for the outpouring of love and respect for this truly dedicated clergyman.

Along with every religious and lay organizations, their members and the entire world Armenians in the diaspora, our parish was uplifted and gave thanks to the Lord for the phenomenon that few if any of us thought possible in our lifetime; namely, the end of Communism in the now defunct U.S.S.R and the independence of our homeland, ARMENIA.

Holy Cross was conceived by a handful of Armenian immigrants not even certain at the time that they themselves would remain in this country for long. Its significance is that it stood out as a beacon for newer arrivals, symbolically a traditional link with the very meaning of our Armenian identify and early traditions of the Armenian church - from the miracles of St. Gregory the Enlightener to the tragic heroism of St. Vartan and the Battle of Avarayr.

Numerous clergy have served as pastors of Holy Cross; some for short periods --- others for prolonged periods. Despite length of service, however, it must be noted that each one came with an earnest desire to serve the Church and its parishioners to the best of their ability.

And, since Union City was the Armenian hub, there is hardly a family from New Jersey who was not affected by Holy Cross and the many services it provided for all age groups.

When the Armenian church history in America is written, Holy Cross Armenian Church will stand out --- not as a cathedral --- but as a "Mother" church. It was due to the diligence, dedication and generosity of the former members of this venerable church that the East Paterson church - now St. Mary's in Livingston, St. Leon's in Fair Lawn, St. Thomas in Tenafly and St. Vartanantz in Ridgefield were built and now flourish with strong membership and their various auxiliaries.

The preservation of Holy Cross is not therefore merely an act of vanity on the part of a few parishioners. It is a vital part of the history of the Armenians in America, and we as inheritors of such a glorious past and deep religious conviction must do all we can to ensure the future security of Holy Cross... by our financial contributions and even more importantly by our physical presence at our Sunday Services.

How many young people present at the Consecration of Holy Cross in 1906 even thought about 90 years into the future. Yet their offspring are with us today celebrating this glorious occasion. How many more of us will be present at the Centennial of Holy Cross which will carry us further across the threshold into the 21st Century and will watch Holy Cross continue to meet the needs of the ever-changing Armenian society is known only to God. We are confident that just as it has in the past grown and developed, she will continue to steadfastly adhere to the basic tenets of our forefathers, yet will sustain the future generations of Armenian-Americans.

To capture the historic events and describe them in several thousand words is an onerous task. It is especially difficult as it spans through 90 years of tragic events, momentous developments seldom witnessed in prior centuries. Obviously then, many details and events affecting Holy Cross and the community had to be skimmed over or omitted in order to present a broad perspective of the Holy Cross experience.

When we have needed you, you have been there --- it is therefore time for us to honor you today, and to promise the celebration of your Centennial in the year 2002!



deserved heavenly peace.












