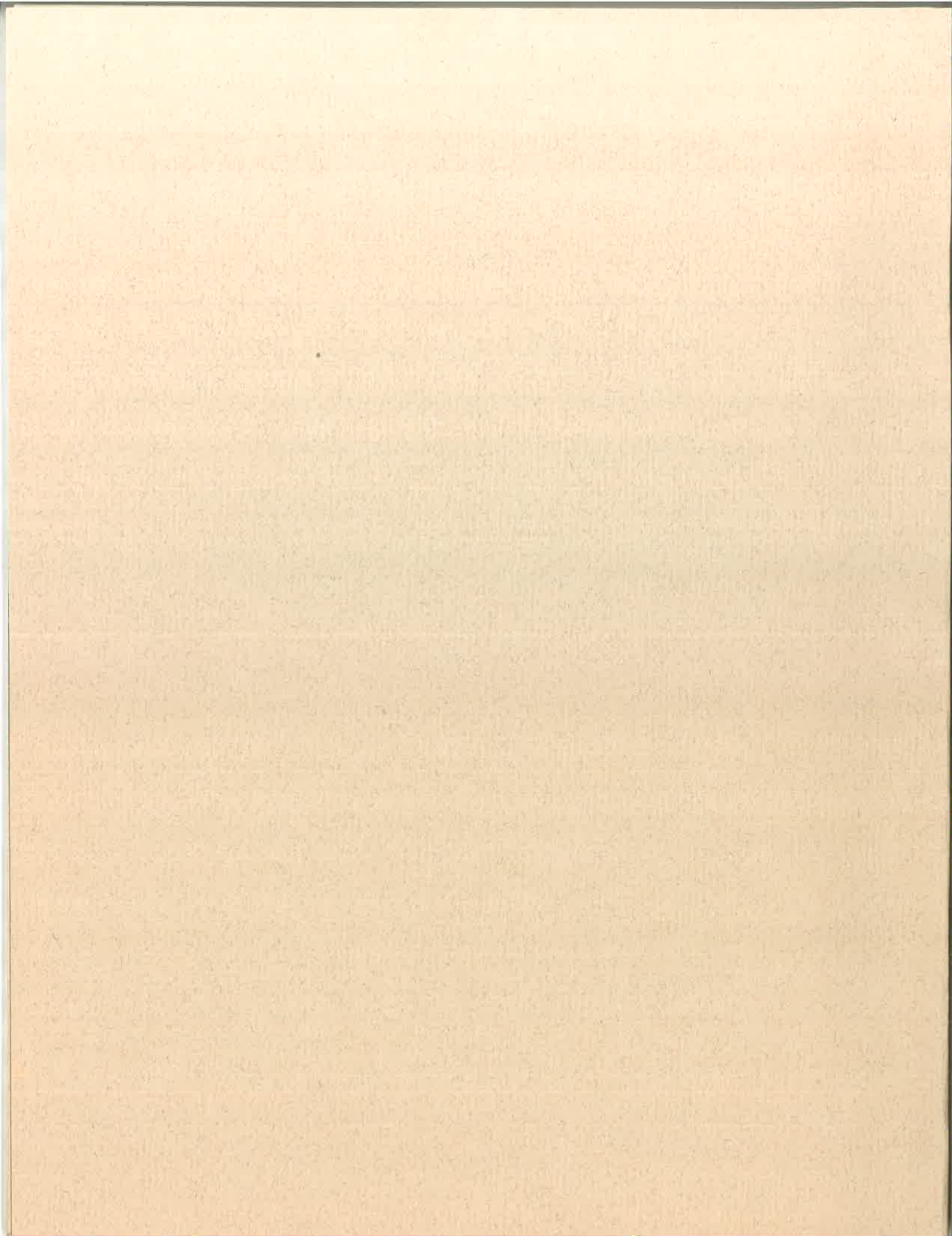

He was ordained a priest in 1928 and served in various parishes in Constantinople. He was elected Bishop of the Armenian Diocese of New York in 1932, serving in that post until 1938. He was then elected Bishop of the Armenian Diocese of New York and the Eastern United States in 1938, serving in that post until 1944. He was then elected Primate of the Armenian Diocese of New York and the Eastern United States in 1944, serving in that post until 1958. He was then elected Patriarch of the Armenian Diocese of New York and the Eastern United States in 1958, serving in that post until 1989.

Back in London, he had charge of the Armenian Church which, in addition to the regular one in the main, the blitz, counseling and entertaining hundreds of Armenian-American G.I.'s, celebrating Divine Liturgy with bombs dropping on London.

Archp. Tiran was elected Primate of the American Diocese, arrived in 1944 and was succeeded by the late Archp. Garegin Hovsepiantz, then Primate. The new Primate served for seven years; during his tenure, ten new churches were built in the United States, the Diocesan constitution and administration were modernized, and the difficult ground work prepared for the erection of a Cathedral. (Not to mention many other accomplishments, such as the establishment of the ACYOA, bringing young theologically-minded candidates to study in the United States as future parish priests, and translating the "Hadarak".)

In 1956, Archp. Tiran was sent to Jerusalem where the St. James brotherhood chose him as *tochin, terem*. Elected Patriarch in 1957, he served until August 1958, but the King would not give him the necessary "termian" and deported him. (Des to Eghmashen were respect in that familiar period of McCarthyism and anti-communism.)

IN MEMORIAM...

A native of Aintab (1904) Abp. Tiran Nersoyan was born Nersess Tavoukjian, the son of a priest and a former schoolteacher. At the age of 11, he and his family became refugees, traveling by mule to Aleppo. The boy endured many hardships, especially hunger, even after his father returned from the exile which he and other priests and leaders had to undergo.



The Tavoukjian family eventually went back to Aintab, and in 1921, Abp. Yeghishe Tourian, then Patriarch of Jerusalem, gladly accepted his former pupil's son, now 17, in the seminary. Nersess graduated, taught at the lay school for the children of refugees, and was ordained a deacon, studying at night with Abp. Tourian, who taught his young students church history, liturgy and philology.

On the day of the Feast of the Transfiguration in 1928, Nersess walked to the altar, escorted by his father, and was ordained by Patriarch Tourian. He was sent to London for academic training, chiefly at King's College, and went back to Jerusalem to teach in the seminary, of which he became principal in 1932, serving in that post for five years. Back in London, he had charge of the Armenian Church which, in 1938 and thereafter, meant enduring the blitz, counseling and entertaining hundreds of Armenian-American G.I.'s, celebrating Divine Liturgy with bombs dropping all around.

Abp. Tiran was elected Primate of the American Diocese, arrived in 1944 and was installed by the late Abp. Garegin Hovsepian, then Primate. The new Primate served for ten years; during his tenure, ten new churches were built in the United States, the Diocesan constitution and administration were modernized, and the difficult groundwork prepared for the erection of a Cathedral. (Not to mention many other accomplishments, such as the establishment of the ACYOA, bringing young theological candidates to study in the United States as future parish priests, and translating the "badarak.")

In 1956, Abp. Tiran went to Jerusalem where the St. James brotherhood chose him as *locum tenens*. Elected Patriarch in 1957, he served until August 1958, but the King would not give him the necessary "ferman," and deported him. (Ties to Etchmiadzin were suspect in that familiar period of McCarthyism and anti-communism.)

New York has been Abp. Tiran's home base in recent years; a long series of invitations to serve as celebrant of Divine Liturgy in our churches around the country, to give lectures on a great variety of subjects, religious and otherwise, with which he is conversant, and to write articles, has been a way of life for him. He is in constant touch with his brother, Dr. Hagop Nersoyan in Ohio, a sister, Mrs. Mariam Jebejian, and several nephews and their families. And with a great host of friends and admirers, many of whom are here tonight to honor Abp. Tiran Nersoyan, an illustrious Armenian-American clergyman.

I feel gratified that our energetic youth at St. Gregory of Narek Armenian Church spearheaded by Mona Karoghlanian, have taken the initiative of playing host to the ACYOA General Assembly and 20th National Sports Weekend to be held in Cleveland.

It is considered a project of great significance which involves determination, hard work and sacrifice. The thing that amazes me deeply is that our youth look on this project as a challenge to mobilize their potential resources and direct them to a worthy or noble cause benefiting our church. In addition to being a challenge, the project also offers opportunities for fun, skills development, introduction to the competitive environment and development of social and interpersonal skills.

A reason most frequently cited by youth for participating in Sports Weekend is the joy of running fast, enduring a long run, flying through the air on a long jump, catching a softball all are sensations young athletes experience on Sports Weekend. When asked why they like to take part in Sports Weekend, youth often respond by saying that they want to develop new skills. They are eager to learn new ways in jumping, bumps, hitting a baseball, shooting a basketball with accuracy and doing floor exercises or gymnastics or diving.

We live in a competitive society. Competition is almost innate with youth. Athletes, when asked why they participate in Sports Weekend, say very simply, "I want to compete." They are anxious to be able to measure their abilities by comparing them to others. How does competition affect their personality development? According to psychologists, athletes develop desirable character traits that help them in the real world. They found out that athletes showed more self discipline, self-confidence and ability to work cooperatively with others.

Young athletes frequently say that they like to participate in Sports Weekend because they can meet other people, form relationships and spend time with their friends. We all have a strong social need to feel included in a group. Through team sports, youth learn to work with others and to subordinate personal goals for the benefit of the group. This attitude can serve as a model and base that will develop throughout life. Learning to be a part of a team will help in adult life.

Our youth had undertaken this big project years ago. They made a good showing of themselves. Based on the valuable experience gained by their predecessors, they pledge to do much better this time by rising to the occasion and relying on God's help.

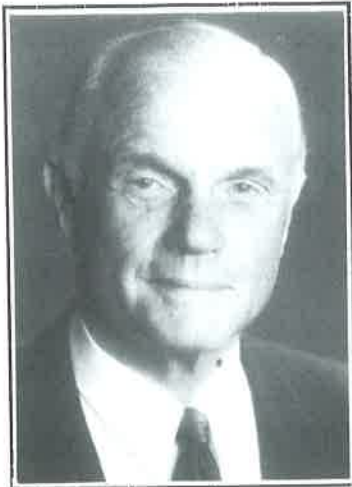

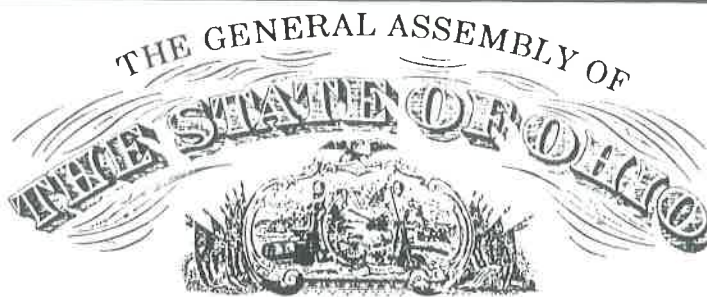

THE ARMENIAN CHURCH YOUTH ORGANIZATION OF AMERICA

The Armenian Church Youth Organization of America of the Diocese of the Armenian Church of America was created on January 12, 1946 in Providence, Rhode Island.

The new Diocesan-wide National Organization, created for the youth of the Armenian Church, emerged from the foundation of the then many local Junior Leagues and clubs that were formed for the young people of the Armenian Church Parishes.

World War II interrupted the activities of these local groups, many of which were simply inactive during those difficult years. With the termination of the war, a renewed necessity took place of re-organizing the local Parish youth groups. Bishop Tiran Nersoyan, the newly elected Diocesan Primate, wholeheartedly took on the challenge of a problem which was causing the elders of the communities to question the future of the Church in America. This challenge was carried by Bishop Tiran to the American-Armenian youth. To all communities he passed on the informing spark, so important to the creating and continuation of activities for this new Organization. This culmination of all his activity and work took place at the "Constitutive Assembly" of Church Youth, held in Providence Rhode Island, January 12, 1946.

The Assembly gathered young Armenians from as far West as Wisconsin, and as far South as Virginia. The delegates at this Assembly elected the first ACYOA Central Council from among their members to carry out the administrative functions of the ACYOA on the national level. These first Council members included: Zaven Hovsepian, John Soursourian, Arthur Yagjian, Matthew Matteosian, Grayce Yeramian, Jack Kazanjian, and Mary Shalakian.

In what seemed a short time, the ACYOA had a strong parish-base through the chapters, as well as a strong administration embodied in the Central Council. Throughout the Diocese, ACYOA events and activities took place with growing success. In parishes across the Diocese, an excitement filled the air as young people of all ages were coming to the Churches, participating in programs and sponsoring events season after season.

Throughout the years, the ACYOA has taken on various projects within the parishes as well as on the Diocesan level. Anniversary Balls, June Festivals and ACYOA Day observances were established and helped

to raise funds for worthy projects. Some of these local activities have included consistent help with annual events in the parish, sponsoring Fund-raisers, planning programs and participating in building projects.

On the national level, some projects have included raising sizable funds for the restoration of the Mother Cathedral of Holy Etchmiadzin, as well as contributions to the former Youth Camp Fund and the Seminary Fund of the Diocese.

Better known of ACYOA accomplishments is the sponsorship of publications in the Diocese, such as **Sacraments and Prayers of the Armenian Church**, a **Pictorial Guide to Armenian Divine Liturgy**, **Catechism of Christian Instruction**, **Home Blessings at Christmas and Easter**, **The Armenian Church and Her Teachings**, **Handbook to Armenia**, as well as **The ACYOA Chapter Handbook**. Some of the earliest publications of the present Department of Religious Education found their roots in the ACYOA.

Preparation of audio-visual programs is yet another aspect of ACYOA since the early years. The ACYOA has produced and/or assisted in the preparation and production of programs, such as: **The Divine Liturgy**, **Symbolism in the Armenian Church**, and **Vestments and Practices of the Armenian Church**.

An **Armenian Theological School** was one of the more cherished dreams of the ACYOA and today it has become a reality. Sunday School Teacher conferences were organized and held by ACYOA, and out of these conferences was born the **Department of Religious Education (DRE)** which now directs the Church Sunday Schools.

During the 1960's the ACYOA sponsored Missions Programs visited various cities with teams of members and a clergyman to conduct activities for spiritual renewal of the community.

The A.C.Y.O.A. has also initiated and developed an **Armenian Studies Program** of overseas trips to Armenia and the Holy Land. The early 1970's found to be the most worthy of A.C.Y.O.A. programs developing into an annual pilgrimage to Armenia.

Newsletter and periodicals have also been an important mainstay of the A.C.Y.O.A. For many years ACYOA news and information was delivered to members via the monthly issues of **The Armenian**.

Guardian, Keghard, Executive Update, and ACYOA Junior Newsletter. They have included articles on contemporary issues in American society, as well as concerns and perspectives of the Armenian Church and community in the Diocese.

The **National Sports Weekend**, concerning athletic competition and social activities took over in the 1970's and 1980's where the great General Assemblies of the 1950's and 1960's left off. Attracting an estimated 600-800 members annually in its 17 year history, this is the one event that every member plans for each year. Taking place over the Labor Day holiday weekend, the program has been hosted by various chapters from throughout the Diocese. Offering both sporting events and social events, Sports Weekend is one of the most successful A.C.Y.O.A. programs.

The General Assembly and National Sports Weekend were designated inseparable and assigned to Labor Day Weekend each year.

Junior-age (junior high and high school) youth were also active and gaining momentum. All through the 1970's these groups were very popular and active in most Parishes across the Diocese. This has continued to the present with Regional Weekends held in the Fall and Spring of each year in most regions of the Diocese. The Junior version of Sports Weekend, on the regional scale, has been most popular with youth from different regions crossing over and attending each other's weekends.

The A.C.Y.O.A. initiated plans in the late 1970's for a Diocesan Youth Camp. A.C.Y.O.A. organized and started what is now a flourishing program under the direction and sponsorship of the Diocese, entitled "St. Vartan Camp".

For many years, the A.C.Y.O.A. has promoted the observance of commemorative Martyrs Day events for the victims of the Armenian Genocide of 1915.

The Archbishop Torkom Manoogian Basketball Tournament, initiated by His Eminence in 1970, has also become the responsibility of the A.C.Y.O.A.

The ACYOA Chapter "A" Award continues to be presented each year to an outstanding chapter. Initiated in 1952, this Award has been given to numerous chapters, large and small, and has proven to be an attainable goal for every group.

In recent years, other awards and scholarships have been offered. A scholarship to attend the summer studies conferences at St. Nersess Armenian Seminary is given each year. The Sam Nersesian Award named for a young man after his sudden tragic death, is given

to the young person who best exemplifies the character of a sincere Christian.

Through the years, A.C.Y.O.A. has grown into a strong and vigorous organization. Many dedicated young men and women have passed from its ranks into positions of responsibility and leadership in their communities. Most of our present American-born clergy, many parish council members, diocesan delegates, deacons and Sunday school teachers have been members of the A.C.Y.O.A. It is also interesting to note that many members of ACYOA met their spouses through interaction at ACYOA meetings and related events and programs.

The mission of A.C.Y.O.A. is to create among the younger generation a greater spiritual culture and tradition, and to instill into its members a true spirit of civic mindedness.

Before embarking on to the future, a word of appreciation must be said for all the past participants of ACYOA. These include the Primates of the Diocese, who have continually supported the young people in their efforts to serve their Church. The Pastors, who have dealt with the concerns, problems and successes of their groups on a day-to-day basis. The members of Central Council who have volunteered their time and energies in an effort to maintain the operations of the Organization and its programs. The Chapter Executive Committees, especially the Chairpersons, who must continually think creatively to keep their chapters moving ahead with excitement and activities.

The future for the A.C.Y.O.A. can be a glorious one. With continued support, A.C.Y.O.A. can achieve unprecedented heights. This must be our constant aim. The community should realize just as the seed of today is the harvest of tomorrow, so it will be that the future of our beloved Church will rest upon the shoulders of the members of the Armenian Church Youth Organization of America.

THE EMBLEM OF THE ARMENIAN CHURCH YOUTH ORGANIZATION OF AMERICA AND ITS SYMBOLIC MEANING



The emblem of the Armenian Church Youth Organization of America adopted at its inception, is to be interpreted as follows:

The radiations from the center of the cross symbolize the truths of the Christian religion that shine forth through centuries.

The symbols under the horizontal bar of the cross are:

- a. (right hand side) The double peaks of the Mount Ararat, representing the Armenian people and its destiny. Mount Ararat has been the silent witness of the victories as well as defeats of the Armenians through their existence as a people and a nation. Its representation on the A.C.Y.O.A. emblem means that the members of the Organization make the pledge of standing for the ideals for which the Armenian nation has stood always.
- b. (left hand side) The United States eagle with its wings widespread and star above each wing. The eagle looks proudly into far distances and holds, as usual, a batch of arrows. The eagle represents the United States. Its presence on the A.C.Y.O.A. emblem symbolizes the loyalty of the members of the A.C.Y.O.A. to the Constitution of the United States and to its principles of democracy and freedom.

The chain that encircles the cross on the emblem represents solidarity among the members of the A.C.Y.O.A. in their service to God and to people.

These symbols are designed on a shield which stands for the determination with which the objects of the A.C.Y.O.A. are to be carried out. The shield also stands for defense against dangerous encroachments.

It will be noted that the dominating feature of the emblem is the cross. This indicates the fact that Christ is our Lord and that to Him we owe obedience above all.
