PHILLY IN A NUTSHELL

The 1986 ACYOA Sports Weekend, hosted by the Philadelphia ACYOA was a tremendous success. Several hundred people, from many mid-western mid-Atlantic and New England states participated in the educational and entertaining agenda: sporting events; dances; lectures; banquets; and parties.

The Labor Day weekend began Friday with a spirited Kef night, featuring the Jack Zartarian Ensemble and a DJ offering lively and popular American music.

Sporting events, including tennis, track and field, swimming, basketball, volleyball, softball, table tennis and chess began Saturday. Competition was stiff and the prepared athletes worked enthusiastically for their awards.

The Babayan Cup, awarded to the branch that wins the most points overall, went to the Philadelphia ACYOA. Philadelphia captured the basketball championship, as well as other first place victories. The Detroit chapter returned home as volleyball champions.

The Kulharjian Award, which names the team exhibiting best sportsmanship, went to the Washington D.C. chapter, while the Yaghoobian Award, the best sportsmanship distinction for an individual participant, went to Melina Spinuzza of Evanston, Ill.

Those who did not attend the sporting events enjoyed the recreational facilities at the Adam's Mark Hotel, particularly the outdoor pool - a favorite site for daytime parties under the picture-perfect sun.

Saturday and Sunday evenings began with a banquet dinner in the ballroom of the Adam's Mark Hotel. Saturday's banquet speakers included: Malcolm Avrigian, co-chairman of Sports Weekend 1986; Mr. Edward Mardigian of Detroit; attorney Zaven Hovsepian, the first Central Council Chairman in 1946; and Reverend Paro Mesjian, pastor of the host chapter, St. Sahag and St. Mesrob Church, Wynnewood, Pa. Marilynn Mardigian Vardabedian was presented the Primate's ACYOA Alumni Award, in its second year of establishment.

Ms. Vardabedian was chosen by the Primate as a person who has shown accomplishments in her profession and has served outside of her profession above and beyond the call of duty. Ms. Vardabedian, having been elected Mayor of Cranbrook, Michigan, in 1984, and having served as a member of numerous committees and boards in her area, is currently serving her third term as City Commissioner.

Ms. Vardabedian expressed her appreciation for the foundation established at an early age by her experience as a member of the ACYOA and congratulated the ACYOA on their 40th Anniversary, wishing them continuing success.

Sunday's awards banquet speakers featured: Lisa Manookian, co-chairperson of Sports Weekend 1986; Shake Ajamian, ACYOA Central Council Chairperson; Mr. Edward Mardigian; the honorable Judge Vincent Gurahian, who is chairman of the Diocesan Council; and the Archbishop Vicar General.

Roger Krikorian, Kenny Kalagian, Leon Janikian and Joe Kouyoumjian filled the hall Saturday and Sunday nights with superb Armenian music that kept the crowd forever hopping. Live American music played alternately throughout the night and a DJ carried the festivities until dawn.

Insights '86, a program of educational and religious seminars were offered. This year's topics were: "When Prayer goes Unanswered;" "SUCCESS-What is it?" and "Armenian Youth: Our Hope for Years to Come." The speakers were Nancy Basmajian of Philadelphia, Dean Shahnian of Washington D.C. and Edward Mardigian, respectively.

Reluctant though they were, seven hundred weekenders wrapped-up at a Farewell picnic on the lawns of the St. Sahag and St. Mesrob Church with live Armenian music and classic Armenian foods.

An ACYOA tradition was continued and enhanced by hospitable and enthusiastic Philadelphians. And this celebration could not have been better named. It certainly was "Hyo Energy - Philly Style."

AN ACYOA MESSAGE

Edward Mardigian of Detroit spoke to an audience of over 600 ACYOA members August 30th at the 1986 Sports Weekend banquet. Mr. Mardigian was an especially honored guest, as he has always taken a devoted interest in the ACYOA. The ACYOA was, on this particular occasion, the fortunate and grateful recipient of the newly established Helen and Edward Mardigian Fund. In his poignant message, Mr. Mardigian stressed how crucial is the existence of the ACYOA. He likened our organization to an insurance policy, which protects the Diocese and keeps it alive and rejuvenated. Mr. Mardigian cited the famous Shakespearean question, "What's in a name?" as he showed all the identity, ideals, hopes, goals and aspirations that are synonymous with ACYOA.

The first "A" in our organization's name stands for the Armenian heritage. Mr. Mardigian pointed out that the ACYOA has an important role in transmitting the Armenian language, religion and culture to future generations. Mr. Mardigian again quoted Shakespeare in suggesting that learning about one's Armenian identity helps in learning about oneself as a whole: "To thine own self be true."

The "C", Mr. Mardigian said, means more than the Church as a religious institution. The church represents a sustaining body that is responsible for the preservation and perpetuation of our values throughout a turbulent history.

The "Y" means an energetic, enthusiastic Youth, the people on which the continued existence of our nation depends. The Armenian community expects that the educated, knowledgeable generation of today will not only remember the past, but will be mindful of future needs.

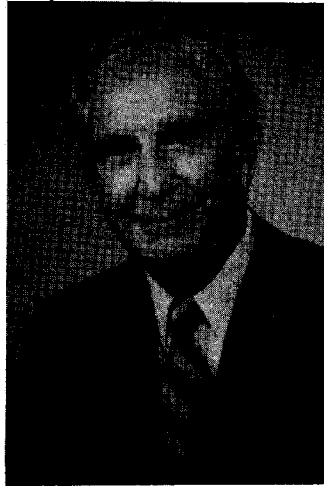
The "O" for Organization, is defined as a group of persons having specific goals and responsibilities and united for some special purpose. Not an accident, the birth of the ACYOA was a response to the needs of Armenian youth. The organization of the Armenian Church Youth have a responsibility to assess priorities and to control their own course of action.

The "A" for America signifies to Armenians the promised land, the land of freedom and opportunity. America is a great country and as Armenians part of America, we have every right to be proud Americans. America is a land rich, not only materialistically, but also culturally and Mr. Mardigian said, "I am proud to say that we, as Armenians, have contributed to this wealth."

"And what makes us proud of you?" Mr. Mardigian asked his audience. "You do not reject your past. You are faithful to your Armenian heritage. You are proud of the great things your ancestors have done and you want to preserve their traditions." Mr. Mardigian stressed that America is more than a melting pot, it is a nation where differences make the culture rich and beautiful.

In his final remarks, Mr. Mardigian emphasized how important is finding one's own special talents and asking the Lord for His guidance. Both Helen and Edward Mardigian feel very fortunate - God has been kind to them and they are forever grateful to Him. Directing their money and talents towards helping those in need, supporting the Church and such public projects as fine buildings and education, Mr. Mardigian noted, "Every time we give, we always get far more in return."

From the eloquent Mr. Mardigian came this particularly memorable metaphor. "May you (ACYOA) be a spiritual filling station where Armenian youths can come and get refuelled and have their spiritual batteries recharged. May you be fulfillers, extenders, enlargers of the best of your Armenian American dual heritage. May you rekindle the flames of spiritual dedication and patriotic devotion and make the meaning of Armenian Christianity a great inspiration."

CENTRAL COUNCIL UPDATE

As most of you know, James Magarian resigned as ACYOA Executive Secretary this past August. Jim left behind six years of dedication and administrative organization. The ACYOA was taken from the Dark Ages of communication to such fine tools as the EXECUTIVE UPDATE, a 2,500 name, computerized mailing list, dozens of standardized administrative forms, a highly successful Armenian studies program and increased communication between the Eastern and Western Diocese. Most importantly, Jim lent a high sense of professionalism to the ACYOA. He is certainly missed. The Central Council has undergone a dramatic change in the past few months.

Many of the Administrative tasks of the executive secretary have now been assumed by Central Council members. The following are some goals, which have been set forth for the coming year:

- a commitment to raise \$50,000.00 during the next fiscal year
- to produce a professional and informative publication
- to increase membership
- to produce more accurate and up-to-date reports
- to create and finance educational and religious programming
- to improve communications with chapters, utilizing the acting Executive Secretary and CC regional representatives
- to create a permanent source of financial stability, utilizing the Armenian Church Endowment Fund
- to be highly visible at all national and regional functions
- to dramatically increase chapter visitations by either the CC representatives, the CC chairman or the acting Executive Secretary
- to produce and update a national event calendar
- to produce a directory of all dues paid members, including names, addresses and phone numbers. This will be distributed to all parishes before the 1987 General Assembly
- to hold at least one regional conference in each of the three major regions (New England, Mid-Atlantic, Mid-West)
- to update, reprint and distribute a new edition of the ACYOA constitution
- to update, reprint and distribute a new edition of the ACYOA chapter handbook
- to ensure that the RED SOX capture The World Series crown. (Oh Well!)

Work has begun on ALL of these projects. Many have already been realized. CC members have arranged to meet a record number of times this year, many times at their own expense. While many groups set high standards with no hopes of achieving them, this Central Council is determined to produce results.

*Read below for a brief description of each of the ACYOA National Committees outlined by Anthony Barsamian and passed at the 1986 General Assembly.

THE NEW ACYOA NATIONAL COMMITTEES

I. THE ACYOA ALUMNI FOUNDATION

A committee made up of ACYOA ALUMNI, designed to involve alumni in the organization. This committee will also help the ACYOA as a fundraising source for new programs.

II. THE ACYOA COLLEGE CONNECTION

A committee that will develop ways of reaching out to Armenian College students by sponsoring religious, educational, cultural and social activities for students on their campuses.

III. THE ACYOA PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE

A committee that will generate a high sense of spirit and enthusiasm for ACYOA national programs. A principle focus would be the promotion of the ACYOA Sports Weekend all over North America.

IV. THE ACYOA CULTURAL COMMITTEE

A Committee, divided regionally, that will promote ACYOA sponsored cultural programs and that will stay abreast of current activities and developments regarding Genocide Recognition.

V. THE ACYOA CHRISTIAN EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE

A committee that will work closely with the Departments of Religious Education and Armenian Language at the Diocese to develop such Christian Armenian Programs as Bible Studies, Seminars and Retreats.

VI. THE "NEW" ACYOA PUBLICATION

A committee comprised of editors, writers and visual artists that will develop a new newsletter. This publication will carry on the high level of quality achieved by its predecessor publications, "The Guardian" and "The Kheghard".

VII. THE ACYOA NATIONAL FINANCE COMMITTEE

A committee of ACYOA members that will be responsible for developing fundraising programs for the National ACYOA. This committee will also be subdivided into groups that will effectively manage the funds raised.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY BUSINESS

The 1986 General Assembly of the ACYOA convened at the Adam's Mark Hotel in Philadelphia, Pa., from Wednesday August 27 to Friday August 29. His Eminence, Archbishop Torokm Manoojian, Primate of the Eastern Diocese of the Armenian Church of America, presided over the Assembly sessions.

The arrangements and administrative functions were the responsibility of the ACYOA Central Council and acting Executive Secretary Anthony Barsamian. Assembly participants included eight members of the clergy and over forty delegates.

In his opening address to the Assembly on Wednesday, the Primate stressed the importance of the attachment of the youth to the church and to the history and direction of the ACYOA. He discussed that many of our American-born Armenian leaders are ACYOA alumni and that the ACYOA members are the leaders of the future and the leaders of today. He urged the ACYOA to examine its past and create a new structure for the future, to continue to lead the youth.

His Eminence announced the resignation of Executive Secretary James Magarian and introduced Anthony Barsamian (Worcester), who will serve as acting Executive Secretary until a permanent secretary is found.

Anthony Barsamian addressed the Assembly with his plans for a new and stronger ACYOA. With the expertise of our members in mind, Barsamian proposed specific committees and programs that he feels can change the ACYOA now and in the future.

Reverend Tateos Abdalian of Greenfield, Wis., spoke to the Assembly about the issues surrounding the priesthood and the consideration of the priesthood by our youth.

In its business sessions, the Assembly dealt with: non-diocesan youth participants in Sports Weekend activities; ACYOA transfer of funds to the Armenian Church Endowment Fund; 40th Anniversary Regional Balls and celebrations; a new Sports Weekend Award; the function and responsibility of the Advisory Committee; and the subsidiary committees of the ACYOA.

Assembly officers included: Steven Sarkisian (Watertown), chairman of the Assembly sessions; Michael Yapchaian (Watertown), vice-chairman; Sara Martinian (Providence), coordinator of the minutes; Lori Kalemkarian (Northern New Jersey), parliamentarian; and John Apkarian (Lowell), sergeant-at-arms. Lisa Kalustian from the ACYOA Western Diocese was also present at all Assembly proceedings.

Among the proposals that passed with discussion in the 1986 Assembly, was Melina Spinuzza's to designate annual dues at \$10.00. Other business that passed the Assembly was Reverend Nerses Jebajian's (Houston) motion to transfer \$15,000.00 from an account to the Armenian Church Endowment Fund, with interest transferred annually to the ACYOA Central Council for educational and religious programs.

Three amendments to the National Sports Weekend Rules and Regulations were passed. First, Canadian and Western Diocese ACYOA members will be allowed to participate in future Sports Weekends.

Second, in addition to an overall award for the chapter with the most points, there shall be an additional award for the chapter with the highest average points per person participating. To ensure fair competition for smaller chapters, there will be a qualifying minimum of five participants per chapter.

Third, \$1,000.00 will be allocated as a loan, each fiscal year from the annual Central Council budget, to be used as initial seed money by the Sports Weekend executive committee of the respective host chapter. The \$1,000.00 will be repaid (interest free) to the ACYOA Central Council at such time when a final accounting of the Sports Weekend is complete.
