PASTOR'S REPORT FOR 1967

As I reflect upon my twenty years as a priest of the Armenian Church, I thank God that I have been able to serve His Church one more year during 1967. As much as my abilities would allow me, I have brought my share also to the spiritual and administrative efforts of this community. It is true that as life itself, the life of our parish has had to face some small difficulties, but like pebbles in a running stream, they have not become obstacles in the path to progress. Facts and records prove that 1967 has been one of our most successful years. I have always been confident that our church will progress spiritually, educationally and socially, so long as we do not miss the real meaning of the Christian motto, which is so appropriate ly written on the facade of our altar, "Love ye one another, for God is Love."

Worship

During all of the Sundays of the year, without exception, Divine Liturgy was held and appropriate sermons were given in either or both Armenian and English. This year during the church school year, sermonettes in English were delivered by me to the children on Sundays. This year again, Deacon Hagop Nersoyan assisted me at the altar, and delivered sermons on occasion, until the time of his departure for Ohio. Besides this, other church services were conducted on special occasions. These are:

Theophany Eve, "Jerakalouytz", on Thursday, January 5 - Special Service and Divine Liturgy.

Holy Communion on Thursday, January 5, for the Armenian mothers and fa-

thers at the Old Age Home.

Armenian Christmas, on Friday, January 6 - Women's Guild members participated in the Divine Liturgy where they took corporate Holy Communion followed by Communion Breakfast.

Holy Communion Service for Sunday School children, on Saturday, Jan. 7. Blessing of the Water, "Tjurornek", on Sunday, January 8. This ceremony was performed on the Feast of Theophany in commemoration of Christ's Baptism.

Feast of St. Vartanantz, on Thursday, February 2 - Divine Liturgy was

celebrated.

Sunrise Service, "Arevakal", performed during the Sundays of Lent. Lenten Vigil Service (Peace and Rest Hours), held every Wednesday evening during Lent.

Holy Week Observances:

Maundy Thursday, March 23, Holy Badarak was celebrated and Holy Communion was administered to the Women's Guild followed by Communion Breakfast. Feet-Washing Ceremony, on Thursday evening, March 23, followed by the Service of the Betrayal of Christ, "Khavaroom".

Burial of Christ, "Taghoom", on Good Friday, March 24.

Holy Communion Service for Sunday School children, Saturday, March 25. Easter Eve, "Jerakalouytz", on Saturday evening, March 25 - Special Service and Divine Liturgy was celebrated.

Grape-Blessing Ceremony, on the Feast of the Assumption of the Holy

Mother-of-God, Sunday, August 13.

Festive Antasdan (Processional of Blessing of the Four Corners of the World) on the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, Sunday, September 17. Antasdan was performed on major Holy Days.

Pontifical Prayer, "Hayrabedagan Maghtank", services were offered on the 12th anniversary of the Consecration of Catholicos Vasken I, Sunday October 1,

and on the Feast Day of Holy Etchmiadzin, Sunday, May 28.

Memorial Services, "Hokehankisd", were conducted for the soul of Francis Cardinal Spellman (December 24) and for the deceased founders of the A.G.B.U. (April 17), as directed by the Diocese, and almost every Sunday as requested by the parishioners.

Christmas Midnight Candlelight Service (December 24). This service, which is performed all in English, is well attended, especially by the youth, and has been one of the most inspiring services of our parish. This year more than 400 worshippers were present.

The Church expresses itself at its best in the worship of God. The beauty of our worship services depends on a choir whose contribution is singular and most valuable. To this end, this year, the Choir of our church as well as the Junior Choir were reorganized, to the efforts of which I am pleased to have brought my share also.

Visiting Clergy

In the course of the year, guest clergymen have participated in our church services as celebrants and preachers.

The Most Rev. Bishop Torkom Manoogian, Primate of our Diocese, paid his first official visit to our church on April 21-22-23. On April 21, His Grace was present at a dinner-meeting with the Pastor, Parish Council, and the Diocesan Delegates, after which officers of the church organizations also arrived to participate in the discussion. On April 22, the Primate conducted an Evening Service as well as a choir rehearsal, which was followed by a reception to give parishioners an opportunity to meet their Primate. On Sunday, April 23, His Grace celebrated the Divine Liturgy and delivered the sermon, after which he presided at the Banquet given in his honor as well as in commemoration of Armenian Martyrs Day.

The Very Rev. Vasken Kebreslian, the Vicar-General of the Primate, celebrated the Divine Liturgy and delivered the sermon on Sunday, March 19, in our church, on the occasion of the anniver sary celebration of the Gomidas Choir.

The Rev. Fr. Levon Arakelian, Executive Secretary of the Cathedral Project, was guest celebrant at our church on Sunday, November 12.

In addition, we had four guest clergymen who exchanged Sundays with me. They were: The Most Rev. Bishop Papken Varjabedian, the Pastor of St. Sahag and St. Mesrob Church of Philadelphia, Pa., on April 2; The Very Rev. Vatche Dz. V. Hovsepian, the Pastor of Holy Cross Church of Union City, N.J., on May 28; The Rev. Fr. Mampre Kouzouian, Pastor of St. Mary's Church of Newark, N.J., on October 15; and The Rev. Fr. Garen Gdanian, Pastor of St. Gregory the Illuminator Church of New York, N.Y., on December 10. Deacons and Choirs accompanied their Pastors during the last two exchanges. These exchanges were well received on both sides and will be continued in the coming year.

Sacraments and Rites

During the year 1967, the following services were performed by me:
Baptism and Confirmation 26 Weddings 20
Adult Confirmation 3 Funerals 22
A few Betrothals were also performed.

Visitations

Pastoral visitations, being a very important task, were rendered by me to the best of my ability and time. During the year, numerous contacts in the way of sick calls to hospitals and homes or of visits to bereaved families or of the blessing of homes were made by me. According to the registry kept in the office, this year I have had the opportunity of making more visitations, numbering 143.

In addition, pastoral counseling, family conferences and pre-marital consultations were administered by me. This important work of the Pastor, although it requires much time and effort, is difficult to report upon because of its personal nature.

Birthday and Anniversary Letters

Beside the ties of communication which I have tried to establish with my parish members by means of telephone to show personal interest in their sorrow or joy, I have written letters of congratulation or good wishes on their birthdays and marriage anniversaries which, according to my records, number 275 this year. I have requested dates from our church-member families whose records are not complete. I am pleased that some have already responded Only those who value receiving congratulatory greetings from their Pastor will join the ranks in sending their family record information.

Educational Activities

In the educational work of the parish, the Pastor's share is two-fold:

supervision of the schools of the church and educational talks.

The Sunday School, in which more than 350 enrolled children were given instruction in the teachings and the heritage of the Armenian Church, received my guidance in acquiring teachers and in functioning according to curriculum and discipline. I am happy that, since September 1966, the Sunday School Staff adopted my proposal to include in the curriculum the teaching of the songs of the Badarak at the assembly sessions of our Sunday School. This knowledge of melodies will make a lasting impression on our children, not only by making the worship services meaningful to them as they attend church, but also will strengthen our Choir in the future by having prepared prospective choir members. In addition to this, prayers in Armenian as well as elementary conversational Armenian have been introduced, again as part of the curriculum for the nursery and kindergarten classes, upon my suggestion. Both are progressing well.

Our Saturday Armenian School also had my immediate supervision in its educational program. It was a gratifying experience working with the school committee and with the teachers on curriculum, teachers' meetings, and prob-

lems concerning education.

An adult Armenian class in language and history was conducted by me on Monday nights from September 1966 to late winter 1967. Despite the fact that members of the class said they were interested and stimulated by the new conversational methods, they were prevented from continued participation due to inclement weather and circumstances beyond their control.

In my last year's report, I mentioned that I was giving considerable thought to the project of having a daytime Nursery School on our church premises. In the course of this year, I was in charge of an interim committee to investigate and work closely with the New York City Department of Health for the fulfillment of the necessary requirements. I am pleased that our efforts have been brought to fruition by the formation of a permanent Day School Committee and the opening of the Hye-Bardez Nursery School.

The lecture which I gave to the parishioners of St. Robert's Roman Catholic Church in our own church building at the beginning of this year and the various short cultural talks to our organizations have also been part of my educational work in this parish during 1967.

Publications

The "Narrec", official semi-monthly paper of our parish, continued to be published this year also as one of my activities in this church. Besides the parish organizational news, effort was made to present other items of interest to our parishioners.

The "Sunday Bulletin" this year, without interruption, became one of the regular facets of my work every week. By means of the material on its first and fourth pages, spiritual, informative, instructive and educational topics, most of them prepared by me, were offered to worshippers and Sunday School children.

Meetings

As expected of the Pastor to participate at the meetings of the parish, I have attended and presided over the meetings of church bodies -- the Parish Council, Women's Guild, Men's League, Mr. & Mrs. Auxiliary, ACYOA, Armenian School Board, Armenian and Sunday Schools, Bazaar and other committees, as Youth Study or Nursery -- to which I have brought my contribution. Besides this, I have attended almost all church functions. It would be fair to say that, considering all these, my attendance averages two meetings per week.

In the deliberations of finding a remedy to the ailing ACYOA Senior Chapter, I have called special meetings. Despite the formation of a new executive committee, the ACYOA Senior Group was unable to overcome outside circumstances and, therefore, fell into a state of lethargy. The details relating to this problem, which is not peculiar to this parish but exists throughout the Diocese, can be found in the report of the Youth Study Committee created by the 1967 Parish Assembly.

As Pastor of this church, I had the opportunity this year to participate in two important assemblies held on the Diocesan level. At the Diocesan Assembly, held in Detroit on May 5-6, I accompanied the five Diocesan Delegates of our church and brought my contribution to its deliberations, serving as chairman of the Budget Committee of the Diocese.

At the 21st Annual Assembly of the ACYOA, convened at the Holiday Hills YMCA, Pawling, N.Y., on September 1-4, I joined the delegates from our church chapter and participated in all its sessions.

Preceding the Diocesan Assembly as well as the Youth Assembly, I was present at the Clergy Conferences, held under the presidency of the Primate, Bishop Torkom Manoogian.

In addition to the above, I have also attended the New York and New Jersey Armenian Clergy Conferences which are held monthly to exchange ideas and to program for the betterment of our churches.

Inter-Church Relations

As representative of the Armenians in this community, I have endeavored to maintain good relations with our community-at-large through the churches. My contacts with the clergy of the community, my presence at the Ecumenical Luncheon given by the Catholic Church on December 14 of this year, as well as the visit of the priest and the parishioners of St. Robert's to our church to hear me speak on January 21, are examples of this relationship noteworthy of mention.

Besides this, I am a member of the Fellowship of the Institute for Religious and Social Studies and, as such, have participated with the Catholic, Protestant and Jewish clergy in the lecture series which take place on Tuesdays during the months of October through January at the Jewish Seminary in Manhattan. The purpose of this Institute is to develop a keener awareness of the contributions which the various religious traditions have made to advancement of civilization and can make toward solution of the perplexities of our day.

Cathedral Campaign

There is no doubt that every one of us is happy that the dream of the Armenians is embodied now in the beautiful Cathedral and Cultural Center, symbolizing our faith concretely. However, the need is still crying and immediate and our parish's share in that campaign is not yet completed. During 1967, as did some leading members of our church, I also took it upon myself to go from house to house for pledges, and the result of my share in the campaign proved satisfactory to all expectations.

Office Procedure

No small amount of time is required by the Pastor in his office work to reach the demands of parishioners and the work of the parish. Church correspondence is attended to, numerous telephone calls are made, conferences with parishioners are held which require my assistance and action.

In one word, if each parishioner considers his own demands of the Pastor of one kind or another, and multiplies them by those of the thousand families of the parish, he would become aware of the extent of the work which the Pastor tries to fulfill.

Recommendations

- 1- In order to keep pace with the times and to function as a church, our church members must make some committment in doing some evangelical activities. One way of doing this is to launch a project of visiting the parishioners who consider Holy Martyrs as their church; this will not only show that we care for each other but also create stronger ties of Christian unity among Armenians. This activity on the part of lay members of the church is common to other American churches and has been tried also by some Armenian churches of our Diocese, such as Tenafly and Detroit. Let me immediately mention here that this visitation has nothing to do with collecting pledges or contributions from the parishioners. This will be purely for fellowship. For this purpose, therefore, I recommend that the Parish Assembly create a committee whose duty will be to organize and launch this project, with a definite program of canvassing the parishioners. An incidental benefit of this work might very well be the compilation of a directory of Long Island Armenians.
- 2- During 1967 our parish registered 511 paid members in good standing which, however, does not include those members who made their payments in 1968 for the 1967 membership year. During 1967, 42 persons registered as new members. To bring church membership to its potential as well as to give a boost to our pledge system, it seems to me that it will be beneficial to make an attempt at combining the pledge system with membership and thus to bring forth a new system of church affiliation. It has been two years now that I have been propounding the idea to follow the example of the Detroit Church and ask for only one contribution from each family for each year, which will include or to which will be credited their yearly pledge, membership, Christmas and Easter offerings, donations for sacramental services (baptism, wedding, funeral), etc. For this purpose, therefore, I recommend that the Parish Assembly create a committee whose duty will be to consider the practicability of this proposal and, if need be, to revise it and bring forth a new system, submitting it to the Parish Council for execution.
- 3- In September 1968, it will be a decade since the Consecration of our church. An appropriate 10th anniversary celebration banquet and a souvenir book will score the achievements of our parish with accompanying history and pictures of our organizations and schools. For this purpose, I recommend that the Parish Assembly commit this task to the Parish Council immediately, since time is short for its preparation.
- 4- The last Diocesan Assembly, which convened in Detroit on May 5-6 of 1967, accepted a recommendation "that each parish appoint a youth leader to work either full time or part time, his detailed duties to be defined by the Pastor and the Parish Council. In case such a person is not available, each parish should encourage and, if possible, sponsor the training of such an individual in the field of youth work." Without additional comment on my part to emphasize the need and the importance of the above resolution, I recommend that the Parish Assembly adopt this resolution of the Diocesan Assembly and submit it to the Parish Council for execution.

5- In anticipation of the visit of His Holiness Vasken I, Catholicos of all Armenians, to consecrate our new Cathedral, work has begun by the Diocese to give His Holiness a royal reception with the widest participation possible. His arrival is scheduled for Wednesday, April 24th. It is my recommendation that all my parishioners make it a point to greet His Holiness at the airport along with their children and to be present at other ceremonies presided over by him to express their joy and loyalty to him.

Let us bear in mind that this is the first time in history that Armenians have built a Cathedral on American soil and that the Supreme Patriarch is to journey from the Holy Mother See of Etchmiadzin to consecrate personally this symbol of our faith.

Acknowledgements

Allow me to take this opportunity to extend my appreciation to all our parishioners who, in one way or another, have tried to fulfill the grace that God had bestowed upon them in their dedication and efforts on behalf of our church. My thanks also go to our deacons, Dr. Hagop Nersoyan and Mr. Edward Karnikian, to our choirmaster, Mr. Onnik Dokmejian, to our organist, Mr. Eli P. Kimatian, to our choir members, to our Sunday and Armenian School teachers, to our secretary, Mary Selvinazian, to our Parish Council and to all our parish organizations who worked tirelessly for the progress of our church.

May the Lord Himself illumine our paths so that we, with full appreciation of our duties, may walk toward the future and toward His glory. Amen.

During the course of the year, the Parish Council met and conducted 27 business meetings and two joint meetings with all the church auxiliaries represented. One of the joint meetings took place on Friday, April 21, on the first official visit of our Primate, Bishop Torkom Manoogian.

The Parish Council initiated a series of clergy and choir exchanges. Six exchanges took place during 1967, the details of which may be found in the Pastor's Report. On the Sunday of the St. Gregory clergy and choir exchange, a combined luncheon for 108 persons was held at Holy Martyrs, including the families and members of both churches' choirs, deacons and parish councils.

The following items are some of the more significant actions taken by the 1967 Parish Council:

- 1- Put into effect the concept of the Long Range Planning Committee. (See recommendations under Committee report.)
- 2- Endorsed the recommendations of the Nursery School Committee to open the Hye-Bardez Nursery School in October 1967, provided the school operate on a self-sustaining basis pending action of the 1968 Parish Assembly. (See detailed report of Hye-Bardez Nursery School.)
- 3- Completed the transfer of the deeds of the church properties to the Diocese of the Armenian Church. At this point we would like to acknowledge the great amount of time that was taken and donated by our legal advisor, Mr. Edward Chapian.
- 4- Initiated the practice of providing each Parish Council member with individual copies of: a) the agenda for each Parish Council meeting; b) major reports; c) monthly and quarterly financial status reports.
 - 5- Printed a "Membership Directory".
- 6- Representatives of the Parish Council, Building Committee, and Architect, met in an attempt to resolve the heating and air-conditioning problem in our new community center.
- 7- Published an Annual Report Booklet covering all church activities and organizations, which was mailed to every member prior to the February 25, 1968, Parish Assembly.
- 8- Initiated the column in "Narrec" called "The Parish Council Reports" as another way to improve the flow of information to our church community.
- 9- Installed a new multiple microphone and amplifier system to improve the transmission of sound during church services.
- 10- Parish Council members responded to the need for house-to-house canvassing for pledges for the Cathedral Campaign.

Long Range Planning Committee

The following parishioners were appointed by the 1967 Parish Council to serve a two-year term starting April 1, 1967:

George Papalian, Chairman Edward Chapian Dr. Zaven Daderian Jack Guevrekian Mrs. Lucy Jamakordzian John Kimball Mrs. Araxie Mergerian Dr. Hagop Nersoyan Manoog Tatosian Mrs. Helen Vetzigian

The objective of this committee is to investigate, study, and recommend solutions to those problems which concern the future growth and development of our parish. They may initiate projects for investigation and study, and from time to time projects will be turned over to them by the Parish Council for their study and recommendations.

The Committee has vigorously considered many ideas and suggestions during the nine months since their first meeting. The following are their recommendations to the Pansh Council:

- *1. Create direct communication between the Parish Council and the parishioners by the insertion of an unedited column, "The Council Speaks," monthly in the "Narrec".
 - *2. Take steps to re-establish a Junior Choir.
- *3. Adopt a policy of exchanging clergy and, if possible, choirs, for a minimum of six times between September and June.

- *4. Announce in the Sunday Bulletin the celebrant and the title of the sermon for the following Sunday.
- *5. Maintain a permanent attendance record for church services and record vital information pertaining to weather and special circumstances.
- *6. Install ear phones in a section of the balcony, utilizing a tape recorder for interpretations and commentary on the Divine Liturgy in English.
- **7. Establish a method of informing worshippers as to the page number in the Divine Liturgy book during church services.
- ***8. Adopt a manual to serve as a guide for the Parish Council which would spell out established internal procedures and practices. This manual would be especially useful for new members of the Parish Council.
- 9. Realizing the need for a "Healing Ministry," it is recommended that this need be brought to the attention of the Diocesan Delegates for presentation to the Primate and/or Diocesan Assembly. There is a definite need for pastoral counseling on a professional level and the training of clergy for handling psychological problems in the church community. The responsibility for the training should be initiated under the direction of the Primate.

The Committee recommended that our Diocesan Delegates be instructed to present the following proposals to the May 1968 Diocesan Assembly:

- A. The recommendations outlined in Item #9 above.
- B. Propose to amend the Diocesan By-Laws by changing the revised Article 33N to read "To meet with the Diocesan Delegates at least \underline{two} months prior to the Diocesan Assembly to review the affairs and status of \underline{the} parish."
- * Recommendations adopted by the Parish Council.
- ** Recommendations under consideration.
- *** Forwarded to the Primate for his comments.

Cathedral Campaign

The Diocesan Assembly of 1966 issued a directive that all parishes should actively participate in the campaign to collect funds for our Cathedral Project. The quota for the Holy Martyrs Church was set at \$150,000.00

Upon the directive of the Pastor and the Parish Council, a meeting consisting of Diocesan Delegates, former Parish Council Members and officers of all church organizations was called. At this meeting, committees were formed to collect funds. Ten groups were organized as teams to cover our entire membership for door-to-door solicitations.

As of December 31, 1967, we have collected or received in pledges approximately \$20,000 from this door-to-door campaign. In addition, some parishioners, including godfathers who took part in the Cornerstone Blessing, have contributed in excess of \$65,000. During the Cornerstone Blessing Ceremonies, our Church paid \$10,000 from our own treasury. We are about two-thirds complete on our quota; there is more than \$50,000 to collect from our parishioners.

It is quite imperative that our church do its share and live up to its responsibility toward this project. We have a great deal of work to do. Needless to say, it is the obligation and duty of each and every one of our church members to make a commitment toward the Cathedral Project.

We, therefore, make a personal plea to each of you that when one of the committee knocks at your door, please do your utmost in supporting your Cathedral and Cultural Center Project where funds are needed immediately.

Notes and Comments

Increase Membership - The table below indicates the family and individual members for 1960, 1964, 1965 and 1966. Membership figures for 1967 cannot be counted until after the 1968 Parish Assembly because some members pay their dues that day. Comparing the 1960 and 1966 figures, we see that the membership has remained about the same over this six year period.

The distance between the church and the Nassau-Suffolk County line is 22 miles. Conservative estimates indicate that in this area a minimum of 100 Armenian families representing 225 adults and 150 children are not members of any Armenian church. Add to this those Armenians living in eastern Queens who are not members of any Armenian church, and you have a vast potential who could be members and attracted to Holy Martyrs. There has been a big growth in population on Long Island during the past ten years.

Each year, a number of Armenian families who are not members use the facilities of our church for baptisms, weddings and funerals. This group also represents an additional source of future members.

There is a strong need to pursue vigorously the above potential sources to enlarge our membership and to make our church the continuing means for maintaining our Christian and cultural heritage.

Appoint Public Relations Committee - A working committee with an active chairman should be appointed whose main function should be to keep our external image constantly in a favorable light. This committee should endeavor to acquaint and expose our improved image not only to the Greater New York area but also to those areas across the United States that have large Armenian communities, i.e. Los Angeles, Boston, Detroit, etc.

More Donations for Altar Flowers - Donations for altar flowers are lagging. We do not have sufficient funds donated on many Sundays to cover the purchase of flowers for the altar. Possibly our church organizations would consider taking turns one year at a time to coordinate this effort and thus ensure adequate funds for altar flowers every Sunday.

Improve "Narrec" - Twelve hundred copies of the "Narrec" are currently mailed twice each month. This repeated contact with so many of the members and friends of our church can become a powerful and effective means of communication for conveying the activities at Holy Martyrs. I believe the time has come whereby the format and contents of the "Narrec" should be reviewed and revised. An Editorial Board should be created to provide the direction for improvement.

Consolidated Financial Report - For the first time, a consolidated comparative report of receipts and disbursements for the period 1960 - 1967 is being provided for our members. This will give you an opportunity to study our past financial performance as a church, to see where we are at the present and, hopefully, to provide some basis for future planning.

Improved Financial Practices - I have requested that our church accountant, Robert Babaian, recommend a simplified, uniform system of fiscal practices. The Parish Council, therefore, is planning a Fiscal Workshop soon to provide assistance and instruction to all organizations in the church to facilitate the handling, recording and reporting of money.

Service in the Church Organizations and the Parish Council - We have had many parishioners in the past who have given valuable and extensive service to our church community as members and leaders of our organizations, committees and the Parish Council. However, recent nominating committees have had an extremely difficult task of recruiting individuals for important assignments. The need at Holy Martyrs for continuing responsible leadership is urgent. Personal sacrifices in terms of time and effort must be made or we cannot grow. Let us not forget the sacrifices of all those wonderful men and women who, in the past 14 years, gave us what we have today.

Each of the eleven members of the Parish Council has, on the average, 25 years of experience in business, government and education, totaling 275 years for the group. Add to this 20 years of experience of the Pastor and you have a total of 295 years of collective experience.

Under conditions of mutual trust, understanding and cooperation, pooling 295 years of experience could provide a basis for sound approach to problemsolving and mature decision-making. This would ensure continued growth and progress in our church community.

1968 Proposed Budget - This year the Parish Council called upon George Papalian and John Serabian, past treasurers of the Parish Council, whose experience related to the church's financial matters proved valuable. Assisting me on the Budget Committee from the Parish Council were John Pilibosian, Aram Avakian and George Ajemian. The Budget Committee and the Parish Council devoted many hours to reviewing and formulating the 1968 budget. The proposed budget printed in this report booklet is their recommendation for adoption by the Parish Assembly.

Acknowledgements

I wish to express, on behalf of our parishioners, the gratitude for the services performed by Mr. & Mrs. Khantzian in maintaining the premises of the church in a clean and presentable fashion at all times.

Also, to Mr. Edward Chapian, our church attorney, who donated many hours on several legal matters and especially for the transferring of our property deeds to the Diocese of the Armenian Church.

Also, to Mr. Robert Babaian, our church accountant, who devoted many hours in the preparation of our financial reports and statements.

Also, to the church organizations which cooperated with the Parish Council to make the operations of the church smoother.

Also, my gratitude for the sincere cooperation I received from the men on the Parish Council who devoted unselfishly their time and effort to serve the church in this important and responsible way.

BUILDING COMMITTEE REPORT FOR 1967

During the first few months of 1967, the Building Committee functioned as an advisory body, making recommendations as needed and requested.

In a letter dated April 29, 1967, which was read at a joint meeting between the Building Committee and the Parish Council on May 2, 1967, all the papers and accounts pertaining to the construction of our School and Community Center Building were turned over to the Parish Council, since the work for which this Committee had been created was now done. The amount we turned over was \$13,711.74.

Letters were written to donors of \$500. or more, inviting them to make further donations toward a memorial and giving them full credit for their original contributions.

A total of \$234,003.00 has been paid to the contractor, Schumacher and Forelle, leaving a balance of \$2,906.00 outstanding, against the original adjusted contract price of \$236,909.00. The Parish Council is currently in negotiations with the contractor in the settlement of this matter.

The present status of outstanding pledges is as follows: From individuals, \$21,261.65; from organizations, \$9,485.25. Organization accounts are as follows:

YOUTH STUDY COMMITTEE REPORT

The Youth Committee of the Armenian Church of the Holy Martyrs, which was appointed by the Parish Council early in 1967, at the direction of the Parish Assembly, to study the possibilities of increasing attendance of youth in church and church related activities, met on ten different occasions during the year. A question-naire was formulated by Dr. Hagop Nersoyan and the other committee members and distributed to 169 young adults between the ages of 17 and 29. Responses were received from approximately 30% of the group.

About one-half of the respondents showed an indifference to God. There seemed to be much confusion and lack of spiritual understanding of God. The law of God and Church seemed to run subordinate to the individual young adult's personal feelings of right and wrong when moral decisions were to be made. Thus the presence of God and the need for the Church are no longer foremost in the minds of young Armenian-Americans.

After examination of the replies to our questionnaire, and after interviews and conferences in depth with church and lay leaders, we strongly recommend the implementation of a five point parish-wide program. These points are listed below (not necessarily in the order of their importance).

- A. Religious and spiritual understanding
- B. Cultural and educational programs
- C. Social and fund-raising functions
- D. Athletic activities
- E. Fellowship (service groups serving individuals and groups in and outside the community)

Through implementation of the above, a sense of fellowship, belonging, and identification is expected to be achieved. The following are some activities which fall under the above-mentioned five categories:

A. Religious

- 1. Bible study and prayer groups.
- 2. Teaching Badarak to different age groups.
- 3. Using Sunday School graduating class in church oriented duties such as assisting parish, giving "Kiss of Peace," bringing "mas" from deacon to vestibule, reading of lections, and counting of offerings.
- Week-end retreats for various groups such as teen-agers, young adults, mothers, businessmen, etc.
- 5. Religious counseling for teen-agers.

B. Cultural and Educational

- 1. Instruction classes for teen-agers.
- 2. Discussion groups with parents.
- Monthly discussion group on contemporary vital issues as they relate to Christian ethics.
- 4. Leadership training program.
- 5. Initiation of a drama group.
- 6. Formation of choral groups.
- 7. Formation of Armenian folk dance troupe.
- 8. Initiation of art classes.

- 9. Monthly instruction classes for our older folk to be conducted in Armenian.
- 10. Career night or career month where business or professional leaders can introduce their respective fields to the youth and give them the opportunity to ask questions and assist them in choosing professions.

C. Social and Fund Raising

- Dances
 Car washes
- 2. Parties 5. Cake sales
- 3. Bazaars 6. Paper drives

D. Athletic Activities.

- 1. Continuation of the successful program stressing team sports.
- 2. Setting up our existing recreation room with adequate facilities and equipment (billiard table, juke box, games).

E. Fellowship and Service Groups

- 1. Visitations to shut-ins, sick and elderly at
- 2. Visitations to hospitals and mental institutions.
- 3. Participation in community-wide projects.
- Car-pools for church attendance.

The Youth Committee realizes that the size of our ever-growing community and the various needs of its members makes it virtually impossible for one person to plan, organize and coordinate this five point program in addition to the numerous priestly and administrative functions of the church. Therefore, the Committee strongly recommends securing the full time services of a qualified and trained program coordinator with special emphasis on youth work.

For this purpose we have recommended to the Budget Committee that \$9,500. be placed on the annual church budget for 1968 with the understanding that the overall budget will be greater when the program is in full operation.

Steps should be taken to find such a person, male or female, without delay.

If no one can be found, the committee then recommends that the Pastor and Parish Council use methods to find and underwrite the expenses for a prospective candidate to be trained for this position.

In the meantime, a standing committee from the parish must be appointed to carry out some of the functions of a youth coordinator during the transitional period.

CHURCH CHOIR REPORT FOR 1967

Reverend Father, Mr. Chairman, Fellow Parishioners:

Unlike other organizations within the church, the choir does not have activities involving finances. We therefore dispense with a financial report. Our main mission is not to raise money but to present choir singing in the church each Sunday and on special holidays, and work for the betterment of the choir. We have about 25 mixed voices; we rehearse every Monday evening, and this year we have visited two churches on an exchange basis and plan to continue to do so this coming year and include in our tour all the neighboring sister churches. But what is of greater interest here are our activities regarding our immediate and long term plans to strengthen the choir.

During the course of this year, an executive committee has been formed under the initiative of Fr.Vartan for the general purpose of improving the size and quality of the choir. A number of decisions have been made and are currently being implemented. Among these are the reorganization of the Junior Choir and the participation of the older Sunday School students in the Senior Choir. We wish to stress on this occasion, that the revitalization and continuity of the once disbanded Junior Choir is essential to the health and effectiveness of the Senior Choir. No organization can thrive without new recruits; we are convinced that the Junior Choir is the proper machinery to pave the way of our youth from the Sunday School to the choir and hence to the church proper where the Badarak takes place.

The success of this important program depends on community support and the musical leadership of the young. What this means is that we must find a qualified Junior Choir Director and pay him if necessary. We think this would be a good investment. In this connection we are happy to acknowledge the cooperation and support of Der Hayr, the Parish Council and the Sunday School Staff who understand our problems and appreciate the importance of the choir. To date, we have not yet been able to find a qualified Junior Choir Director. However, Dr. Dikran Tahtaburunian and Mr. Vahe Hajinlian who share our concern and enthusiasm for the musical education of our youth, have generously consented to share the leadership of the Junior Choir on a temporary basis until a more permanent substitute is found. We are grateful to them.

Recently announcements have been made that the Junior Choir is in business. We wish, on this occasion to appeal again to parents to encourage their children to enroll in this choir. This will involve a small sacrifice since they have to report on Sunday mornings a half hour earlier than usual.

With regard to the needs of the Senior Choir, we respectfully submit the following requests:

- . Individual lockers in the choir room to be shared by no more than two or three people.
- . A new set of Shabiks and Veils. It is important, however, that the lockers be acquired first.
- A yearly budget of about \$300 to cover our operating expenses.
- . The designation of a Choir Day to be observed by appropriate services followed by a dinner in recognition of the service of the Choir members. (We are happy to report that the Sunday of Feb.11, 1968 has already been designated as the first Choir Day. We understand our Primate Bishop Torkom plans to be present that day. We urge all friends of the choir to do likewise.)
- Last but not least, to secure the services of a permanent Junior Choir Director.

In concluding our report we would like to ask a ques-If this community has the resources and the will to build such a magnificent church and community center, and organize a Sunday School system of which we are justly proud, then why shouldn't it strive also to have a choir that is second to none? Let us face it, this task has long been neglected. We offer no immediate cure for the revitalization of the Senior Choir, but we do believe that in getting the Junior Choir off the ground we have begun to bridge the gap between our thriving Sunday School and struggling Church Choir. We don't think that the choir is an ornamental appendage of the church any more than the Sunday School is. They all need and supplement each other in the religious education of our Remember that the Ten Commandments that we teach in Sunday School are common to most religions, but the music of our Badarak is unique and it is ours. It conveys the religious experience of our ancestors with beauty and power. Our concern is to pass this experience to our youth. They will need it in years to come as much as our choir needs them now.

In closing I wish to express my personal thanks to all those who served the choir in numerous ways. In particular, to Father Vartan for expediting the affairs of the choir and making things happen; to Mr. Aram Avakian who, as choir liaison officer in the Parish Council, has championed our cause; and last but not least to our resourceful and dedicated Choirmaster, Mr. Onnik Dokmecian.

SUNDAY SCHOOL PROCEDURES

- 1. Choir Participation The graduating class (11th grade) of this school year, 1967-68, is participating in the choir during Divine Liturgy every Sunday morning. Their attendance is staggered throughout the year to enable them to be present at all parts of the Liturgy. Choir participation is offered in addition to their regular class sessions.
- Communion by Classes Each class, first grade and up, receives Holy Communion at least once during the year besides Christmas and Easter. The response of parent participation at class communion time has been rewarding.
- 3. Open School-Parent Visitation Days Parents were invited to visit their children's classes and assembly periods on three Sundays in December according to the following schedule:

December 3 Pre-school through 3rd grade
December 10 4th grade through 7th grade
December 17 8th grade through 11th grade

4. Mas and Sunday church bulletins are being distributed to all Church Sunday School children each week through the Sunday School Office.

GRADUATES

Twenty-six young people received diplomas from the Council for Religious Education upon their graduation from the Church Sunday School in June, 1967. Two other students were awarded attendance certificates. Most of these students were of the original group who began Sunday School when it was held at the Flushing YMCA; therefore, they were the first class to go through the entire curriculum to graduation.

PROGRESS REPORTS

Progress reports are sent home three times during the school year for children in 3rd grade and up. The reports indicate the attendance and behavior of the child as well as his progress in learning curriculum material.

STUDENT ACTIVITIES

During this report period, our children have been involved in various activities:

- They have sold raffle tickets to help the bazaar project.
- 2. They have served each Sunday on the altar as acolytes.
- They raised \$48.65 for UNICEF, on Halloween, in lieu of Trick-or-Treating.
- 4. They donated \$279.17 in mite box proceeds to the Armenian Missionary Association of America; \$150 will go to the Child Education Program and \$129.17 to the Lunch Fund Project.

ARMENIAN SCHOOL REPORT FOR 1967

We are happy to state that this year the Holy Martyrs Armenian School completed its tenth year. During this time, a group of women, having in their hearts the love of the Armenian language, spared nothing to make our school self-supporting and to put it on a high educational level. The graduates of our school represent the reward of our sacrifices.

In May 1967, the following Executive Board was elected to serve the Armenian School:

During the period January to June 1967, the School Board was headed by Mrs. Emma Babaian. At that time we had an enrollment of 65 pupils in four classes whose teachers were Mrs. Angele Hovagimian, Mrs.Siran Demirdjian, Mrs. Berjouhi Tamzarian, Miss Mary Selvinazian.

The Annual Dinner of the School was held in January 1967 and the Closing Day Dinner and Hantess in June 1967, during which the outstanding pupils of each class and those with perfect attendance were given awards. There were no graduates that year; however, with the addition of a higher grade, the standard of our school was raised.

Our current school year opened in September 1967 with an enrollment of 60 pupils divided into four classes in which the curriculum proposed by our Pastor is followed and the textbooks suggested by the Diocesan Educational Council are used. Conversational Armenian, reading and writing, grammar and composition, history, culture and literature, are the subjects taught. Quarterly report cards are issued to show the pupils' progress.

The teachers of our Armenian School are: Mrs. A. Hovaqimian, Mrs. B. Tamzarian, Miss M. Selvinazian, Miss Elizabeth Norshanian. Singing instruction is given by Miss Selvinazian who this year also prepared an Armenian songbook for the use of our pupils. The Armenian alphabet was prepared for us at our request by Rev. Nerses Baboorian, and appears in every classroom.

Transportation is in the responsible care of Mr. John McCormick. Open School Day is held once a year in February. In addition to our regular monthly meetings and teachers' meetings which are held to administer the needs of the School, the activities of the Armenian School Board during 1967 were as follows:

In February we had a Vartanantz Program where Fr. Baboorian was present. In April, the Sevan Theatrical Society presented the Armenian Comedy "Nut Number 5" for the benefit of our School. In May we celebrated Mother's Day with an appropriate luncheon and program at which Mrs. Satenig Bazikian spoke and Mrs. Araksi Kirishjian sang.

At our Cultural Month Celebration luncheon in October, we welcomed the newly consecrated Bishop Vasken Kebreslian, Vicar-General of the Diocese. On this occasion Mrs. Julia Kaprielian rendered a few Armenian songs.

In December 1967, the children had a Christmas party and were remembered with gifts. We would like to express the gratitude of our School to Mr. George G. Bashian through whose generosity this year we were able to show our appreciation to the children.

At this time I would like to thank our Der Hayr, Father Vartan, who is always present at our meetings and gives his blessings and guidance to our undertakings. Our appreciation goes also to Miss Mary Selvinazian who helps us not only as a teacher in the Armenian School but also by doing all our paper work, and to the Parish Council for their moral support.

HYE-BARDEZ NURSERY SCHOOL REPORT FOR 1967

The Hye-Bardez Nursery School Committee, which was appointed by the Parish Council on September 8, 1967, understandably on an interim basis, to organize and establish a nursery school in our community, is pleased to report that, within a short time, that is, since its opening date of October 16, 1967, the Nursery School has met its most important and we might add critical test—it has won over the complete confidence and respect of all the parents who were trusting enough to enroll their precious children, at considerable cost to themselves, in this our new project.

As you know, our Nursery School is duly licensed by the Child Care Division of the Department of Health of the City of New York, and is administered and directed by Miss Lucille Mazujian, who has an exceptional scholastic background and vast experience in early childhood education.

A select group of ladies, mostly members of our committee and others, offer their volunteer assistance to the Nursery School, five days a week, from early hours in the morning until at least 1 P.M.

All this work is in addition to attending extensively frequent meetings of the committee in its efforts to seek funds, contact parents and to prepare active fund raising projects, yet all the while closely watching the smooth running of the Nursery School and finding solutions of its administrative problems.

Presently, from an initially registered ten, we have now eight children who attend nursery class regularly. Parents of two of the original ten could not satisfactorily solve their transportation problem.

Our Nursery School, in addition to the regular New York City curriculum, provides the desired and intended benefits of a well balanced program of Armenian songs, music and rhymes taught by Mrs. Ardemis Nazerian, also of the Nursery School Committee, who is a teacher of music and very knowledgable in the teaching of Armenian as well.

There are also 13 more women who are Chairmen of Standing Committees, who work very devotedly and with a great sense of responsibility. Together with the above 10 names, the total of 22 women and Fr. Vartan comprise the Executive Board, which always meets prior to each membership meeting.

Although the job of Women's Guild Chairman is very time consuming and challenging, my meetings and rapport with the women in the Guild has created such a strong bond of fellowship and mutual respect -- that it has truly enriched all our lives. I earnestly invite all the women of this church who are not members, to join our group. Since my term of office will soon be over, I am taking the liberty of digressing from just an activity report, and emphasizing the fellowship and cooperation between our members. Working together for the church with members of the Women's Guild, has opened a wonderful new door to me, a door to a "church family", to which we should all belong.

Our activities always start with a Women's Corporate Communion Breakfast, which was very successful last January. We always prepare a light luncheon for the annual Parish Assembly and, in January, there is always an election. In 1967, we elected the three new Advisors, who replaced Alice Avakian, Beatrice Mekjian and Astrik Saraf. Isabelle Herdemian, who had been elected Assistant Treasurer, resigned due to lack of time to attend our meetings, and Beatrice Mekjian was appointed to replace her.

On January 26, Father Vartan was host to the neighboring parishoners of St. Robert's Catholic Church, for an Ecumenical Meeting. Over 100 of their members listened to Fr. Vartan describe and interpret our Liturgy. They then toured our buildings, which they greatly admired. The Women's Guild served them coffee and cake.

We attended World Day of Prayer Services in Bayside and New York City. His Grace, Bishop Torkom Manoogian, asked two women from our church to represent the Diocese in New York. This was on February 10.

On March 3 we gave our traditional Lenten Supper and Easter Communion Breakfast on March 23. At these Communion Services, Eli Kimatian plays the organ and Edward Karnikian assists at the altar. We wish to thank them.

All winter and spring, our activities for "Arshin Mal Alan" never ceased. Regardless of weather or health, rehearsals were held, costumes were measured, tried on, scenery was fashioned, tickets were sold -- in short, it was always with us.

In April, a committee of women paid an Easter visit to the Armenian Welfare Home, taking them tulumbah, and a group sang for them under Lucy Jamakordzian's guidance.

April 23, Martyrs Day, was the dinner for Bishop Torkom's official visit to our Parish. Due to many conflicting circumstances over which we had no control, this affair was not as well attended as it should have been. The Women's Guild would like very much to invite the Primate again.

This past spring, Women's Guild members sewed a new altar curtain for our church, as the old one was very worn.

In May, our women again joined forces with the Picnic Committee. Also in May, we all finally enjoyed the thrill of seeing "Arshin Mal Alan", directed by Siranoush Katchouny and beautifully presented. We again thank all those who helped, including the busy members of the Parish Council. The tremendous profit realized was very gratifying. So many people helped in cutting costs, getting things donated, subsidizing costs, asking favors, working day and night, that I can never begin to name them. The beautiful program booklet put together by Walter Kaprielian was a credit to the production. We can never thank Mrs. Katchouny enough; her own health finally failed her, so hard did she work.

In June, we always have a Covered Dish Luncheon Meeting which was held in our new Reception Hall this year. It was a perfect setting for an art exhibition, arranged by Program Chairman Mary Pilibosian, of paintings and art work done by our own members.

Lucille Kimatian, our Chairman for Church Women United, informed us that World Community Day will be observed in our church November 1, 1968, just as the Guild had requested.

Our September meeting featured a Silver Tea, which is traditional, and picnic and bazaar plans. Housekeeping Chairman, Margaret Kaloustian was very busy this year, putting away our new China presented to the church by Mark Markarian; and also equipping the new kitchen.

In October, which is always observed as Cultural Month in the Armenian Church, some of our members performed Armenian dances, in costume. Mrs. A. Vartanian recited a beautiful poem by Bedros Tourian entitled, "Complaints" and Julia Kaprielian delighted us with two Armenian songs. We were also very happy to hear how successful our picnic was.

At our November meeting, once again we chose a committee to cook for the Parish Assembly in December. We listened glowingly to the wonderfully profitable bazaar report. This year's bazaar was a delight and a pleasure.

ARMENIAN CHURCH OF THE HOLY MARTYRS GEORGE G. BASHIAN SUNDAY SCHOOL & ARMENIAN SCHOOL FUND

STATEMENT OF THE AUDITING COMMITTEE

To the Members of the Parish Assembly Armenian Church of the Holy Martyrs

We have examined the financial books and records of the Armenian Church of the Holy Martyrs, the Women's Guild, Men's League, Mr. & Mrs. Auxiliary, A.C.Y.O.A., Sunday School, Armenian School, Reserve Fund and Picnic Committee. We have found the receipts and disbursements reported by the foregoing and which are attached hereto, to be true and correct.

We have also examined the records and report of the Bazaar Committee as submitted to us and we find that there is insufficient evidence to reconcile its final report with the facts reported. Therefore, we find such records and report to be incomplete.

We submit the following recommendations:

- Uniform system of bookkeeping among all parish organizations should be maintained.
- 2) More detailed records of receipts and disbursements should be maintained by each organization as well as by the special committees of the church.
- 3) The Parish Council should examine the recommendation to combine the Sunday School account with the Church account.
- 4) No saving account balance should exceed the guaranteed insurable amount of that bank.
- 5) Building and Church pledges should be examined by the Parish Council to determine uncollectability, and the Parish Assembly should give the authorization to write off such findings.
