TO: ALL MEMBERS OF THE CENTRAL COUNCIL. RE: SUGGESTED CHANGES IN KEGHARD PROCESS

Dear Central Council member:

We are about to begin our third year of circulation of the KEGHARD, our national publication. Both our NY and Boston staff people have discussed our pros and cons after two years of existence and have made constructive criticism and suggestions for future operation.

This letter concerns itself with the technical process of printing and circulating, where our shortcomings have been more serious than in the actual "copy" end of the magazine. No matter what the quality of the magazine is, certainly not receiving it when one is entitled to receive is a serious problem and bad PR.

Presently, the gathering of material, final editting, layout, typesetting and paste-up are done in the Boston area, while printing and mailing take place in NY. It is in the latter of these areas that we've experienced problems, which are dissected for you as follows:

- 1. PRINTING: The present printer is an excellent person who has been good to us as well as to the Diocese and has given us an excellent price. The drawbacks are that the quality of printing has been inconsistent, and more importantly, the time needed in the printing process varies from 10 days to more than two weeks, depending on his work load. Furthermore the layout has to travel from Boston to NY which requires extra time and extra peril. It should be noted that this is not the fault of the printer for the most part, but the process can be made smoother and quicker.
- 2. ADDRESSING: Our addressing is done at the Diocese, where one staff member of the Diocese handles the entire mail room operation. There are two problems here. One is that there is no one constantly updating and checking the plates to make sure the lists are complete and correct. Secondly, depending on the work load of the other Diocese mailings, there may delays in the addressing, sorting and delivery of the KEGHARD to the Post office.
- 3. MAILING: Somewhere in the process, either on the original lists, the plates, the addressing, the sorting or the actual mailing by the post office, several issues of the KEGHARD do not get to their destination. Since the NY Postal service is one of the possible places where issues get lost, NY because of sheer volume, may not be the most desired city to mail from. NY mail is also the most delayed mail and often takes longer than it should.

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SUGGESTED ADJUSTMENT: Move the printing, addressing, and mailing process all to the Boston area. We've already found a printer who does better quality work and gaurantees the job will take no more than a week, but who will be slightly more expensive. However, costs would decrease because of the deleting of mailing things back and forth from Boston to NY; you should also know that since the typesetting and paste-up have moved to Boston, both are now done more cheaply and this cut saves the ACYOA more than \$100.00 per issue. So even with the increase in printing costs, we will remain about the same and still well under budget.

The mailing list will be made into a master for KEGHARD and each time the list will be Xeroxed onto labels(minimal cost). The labels will be neater, placed on the back of the magazine, the list will be easy to correct, and the labelling and sorting process will be handled by the Boston staff, thus freeing up the mail room person, Papken, to do other jobs.

Lastly, we are checking into the legal requirements for having the magazine mailed from here with a second class permit, which should not pose any problem.

With these adjustments, we'll have a neater, more accurate operation, which will inturn insure a better magazine, reaching more people. This can only help promote the magazine further, thus increasing subscriptions and with them increasing income.

We've discussed this thoroughly in our meetings and feel it's the best way to go. We would like the Central Council to discuss it andhopefully give us the green light as soon as possible, perhaps by the Spring or Summer issue. I'll be glad to answer any questions you have on this matter.

TC: ALL MEMBERS OF THE CENTRAL COUNCIL RE: POTENTIAL PROGRAM FOR ACYOA CHAPTERS

Dear Central Council member:

I'd like to suggest a program which may serve two purposes at once. It revolves around the Readers'Forum section of KEGHARD.

As you know, the Readers' Forum section presents an essay on a pertinent subject each issue. Forum essays have discussed the following relevant areas: monastic clergy, the role of the Armenian language, who goes to church-why and why not, the film <u>Midnight</u> <u>Express</u>, thefaith of our Fathers, Women and Christian Priesthood, and young people and their roles in the community.

These have been good essays that shed light on the subject, but unfortunately have generated little written response. An actual forum for discussion has not yet taken shape. Therefore, perhaps by having a program based on these topics, the readers' forum and ultimately the KEGHARD can be enhanced.

My suggestion is to hold "Readers' Forum Panel Disussions" in the chapters and communities. For each panel night, get four or five panelists, a moderator, and send them the essay ahead of time. If you can, try to pick panelists that have some tie to the topic of discussion, or get the author of the forum essay himself to be a panelist. For example in Cleveland or Chicago, have the panel on Women and Priesthood and invite Prof. Hagop Nersoyan, an Armenian clergyman, a young woman interested in working in the church, and another.Or in NY, have a panel night on young people and public service in the Armenian community and invite Jack Antreassian, Syraun Palvetzian, a young clergyman, and another, like a young college student about to consider careers.

Enclosed are various materials for your review, commentary and suggestions. Kindly review each item (note backed sheets) and return to the Executive Secretary to later than MARCH 1st.

Item I. Certificate of Recognition

Itended for ACYOA members who have served on the Central Council. Designed in such a way that it may be given by the Organization to individuals who deserve to be recognized for their outstanding contributions - members and non-members.

Item II. ACYOA Emblem

A redesigning, or, Armenianizing of the ACYOA Emblem. Major distinctions to note: Armenian Cross, black on white design and (to be drawn)the American eagle.

Item III.Stationary design

Intended to standardize ACYOA stationary - from the Office of the Executive Secretary to the Chapters themselves. Where "Central Council" is imprinted, the Chapter name may be inserted. The Council may consider providing "official" ACYOA Stationary and charge a nominal fee for the service. The ACYOA Junior Division Director has requested that both the Junior and Senior Divisions use similar stationary to illustrate continuity between the two. The type-face for the "ACYOA" is modern and is used by graphic artists to imply a flow or moving image, with depth and content. (Note: Reversal of Primate and Archbishop Torkom Manoogian, etc. See Item V. for costs.)

Item IV. Lecture - Discussion Program

Self-explanatory. This program would be initiated in Mid-Autumn of 1981, or, the Winter of 1981-82.

Item V. Printing Costs

Membership Cards are needed. Stationary is needed. We may perhaps not concern ourselves with the costs of reprinting any former ACYOA publications until the financial situation of the Organization is more stable.

Item VI. ACYOA Banners and Posters

Self-explanatory. This would add a needed visual perspective within the parish for established, as well as new chapters. Using like or similar designs, posters with thought-provoking statements done in a very fine and artistic way would also serve to give a physical presence to the Organization. Like any symbolism, banners and posters can only reflect the particular chapter. However, if done properly and directed to the public eye, it can serve to show a fine illustration of the Organization from an ideal perspective. It may also assist when soliciting for funds.

We should like to remind Council members that during parish visitations, programs and coming events should be promoted. Refer to the Outline of Programs and their Breakdown for brief descriptions of some of the ACYOA programs. Be sure to review the Parish Visitation Report form before to understand information requested.
