ARCHBISHOP MANOOGIAN PARTICIPATES IN THE OPENING OF NEW YORK CITY'S OBSERVANCE OF 200 YEARS OF AMERICAN INDEPENDENCE

On Thursday, May 22, on the opening of N.Y.C.'s Observance of the Bicentennial of the Independence of the U.S.A., His Eminence Archbishop Torkom Manoogian, Primate, accompanied by the Canon Sacrist of St. Vartan Cathedral, participated at the opening ceremonies with church and civic dignitaries from New York City. At 11 a.m. at St. Paul's Chapel, Trinity Parish, where George Washington had prayed, a religious observance was held in front of the chapel where the Mayor of New York City, The Honorable Abraham Beame, laid a wreath in memory of those who gave their lives for the independence of our country.

His Eminence Terence Cardinal Cooke, His Eminence Archbishop Iakovos of the Greek Orthodox Church, His Eminence Archbishop Torkom Manoogian, His Grace Bishop J. S. Wetmore, Suffragan Bishop of the Episcopal Church of New York, Rabbi Usher Kirshblum and leaders of the New York City Council of Churches took part in this religious observance.

The religious dignitaries then viewed the colorful parade, which led to the City Hall park where the civil ceremonies took place. The Declaration of Independence was read by Mr. Walter Cronkite, and Marian Anderson narrated during the singing of the All City Chorus. A picture of Archbishop Manoogian and the other church leaders appeared in the New York Times the following day.
