Dear Archbishop Manoogian:

I enjoyed the opportunity of meeting and having lunch with you in New York last Thursday, when we had some preliminary discussion relative to the projected visit to Philadelphia of his Holiness, Vasken I, next year.

As a memorandum of our meeting and in order to inform other interested persons by a copy of this letter, I note that we discussed the following:

l. I conveyed to you the thought of both the local clergy and other persons involved in plans for the Diocesan Assembly and the Catholicos' visit that it would simplify matters greatly if his Holiness' point of entry in the United States were Philadelphia rather than New York. This is so because of the large mass of people who will be in this city because of the Diocesan Assembly and it would obviate the necessity of disrupting the Clergy Conference to allow all the participating clergymen to travel to New York to greet his Holiness if he should arrive there. Apart from a matter of mere convenience, travel from Philadelphia to New York and back, as well as the time consumed getting to and from the airport and ceremonies attendant with his Holiness' arrival, will effectively consume an entire day of the Clergy Conference which might otherwise be more profitably spent. Your observation in this connection was that for economic reasons, his Holiness will be coming aboard an aeroflot flight,

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which terminates in New York. I suggested to you that we explore the possibility of his Holiness flying to London or Paris via aeroflot, and thence to Philadelphia on a scheduled American airline.

- 2. In connection with housing accommodations for his Holiness and his entourage, I advised you that the Diocesan Assembly Committee had made tentative arrangements to reserve the Philadelphia Suite at the Marriott Motor Inn. I also expressed to you my feeling that, notwithstanding the Suite itself might be appropriate in all particulars, the Marriott was not a fitting place to house a clergyman of his Holiness' stature. You concurred, and further noted that it would be preferable to house his Holiness at another location to discourage encroachments on his time and person by well-meaning communicants. I informed you that the local clergy and I had inspected the Presidential Suite of the Bellevue Stratford Hotel, where his Holiness was housed during his 1968 visit, and found it fitting in every respect; however, we were not able to confirm as of the day of our visit that it would be available when needed next year. Also, I told you of our visit to the home of one of my friends in Gladwyne, a Philadelphia main line community, which both the clergy and I felt would be eminently suitable if I can convince my friend to offer his home for the 4 or 5 day period necessary. It is my hope to bring the owner of that home to New York for a visit with you and further discussion in this regard at an early date.
- 3. In connection with providing personal security for his Holiness, you noted that we should have 2 security personnel accompany his Holiness at all times. I noted that I did not recall our having done that on past visits, but we are to look into this matter further, particularly as to the availability of off-duty Armenian-American policemen providing their services on a volunteer basis.
- 4. Insofar as his Holiness' involvment with the Diocesan Assembly is concerned, it is my understanding that this entails his person at the following:
 - (a) "Hrashapar" service upon his arrival.
 - (b) An initial appearance at the Diocesan

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Assembly for a brief ceremony after his arrival, which will be his only appearance at sessions of the Assembly.

- (c) Attendance at the Assembly Banquet on Saturday evening.
- (d) Celebrating the Divine Liturgy on Sunday morning.

My committee will be involved in scheduling all other time of his Holiness' visit, including possible appearances, courtesy calls, receptions and the like.

- 5. In connection with services on Sunday morning, I told you of our discussion relative to the holding of such services in the Ss. Sahag-Mesrob Church with additional seating provided in the Church Hall where the services would be projected on closed circuit T.V. I also suggested to you the possibility of his Holiness' celebrating the Divine Liturgy in a local Church of another faith, particularly if it was one of the historical Churches, such as Christ Church. This would depend, of course, on whether the Church was large enought to accomodate the expected congregation and also on his Holiness' agreement.
- 6. We considered the matter of expenses in connection with the visit of his Holiness and I told you that I had roughly estimated it would cost between \$3,000.00 and \$5,000.00 for the period of his visit, and suggested that we might organize a "Committee of Hosts to his Holiness", members of which would contribute either \$50.00 or \$100.00 each. As an inducement to participate on this committee, we could present contributors with a color portrait of his Holiness (perhaps autographed by him) or schedule a private reception at which only the hosts would be present.

I believe this covers in substance the matters discussed, except that I am to prepare and present you with a proposed
