SOORP GHEVONT

At the dawn of the 5th century, Armenia was an independent nation. Its people had invented an alphabet, translated the Holy Bible and established their first university. It was during this era, known as the Golden Age of Literature, that a promising young man was ordained a priest. His name was Father Ghevont. He emerged as the most enlightened leader after the deaths of the great illuminators, St. Sahag and St. Mesrob. The St. Leon parish is honored to be the only church in America that bears his name.

In 432 AD, King Ardashes was deposed, exiled and jailed in Persia. The Persians were determined to destroy the Christianity of Armenia and establish their religion of fire-worship. The Persians delivered an official ultimatum. Father Ghevont, chief spokesman, drafted a firm and dignified refusal. The Persians were enraged. Battle was inevitable. The eloquence of Father Ghevont inspired General Vartan Mamigonian to take command to defend the Armenian Christian religion and homeland.

The Battle of Avarair in 451 AD represents the first military battle fought in the defense of Christendom in the history of the world.

On the eve of the battle, Father Ghevont stressed the supreme sacrifice of Jesus, before offering the sacrament of Holy Communion. During the ensuing battle, General Vartan was killed, and the Armenian forces collapsed. Father Ghevont walked through the battlefield, administering last rites to the dying. He and other surviving clergy were captured, subjected to unbearable tortures, and finally put to death by the sword.

- St. Ghevont's courageous spirit, patriotism and devotion to the Armenian Church have been a source of pride and inspiration for fifteen centuries.
- St. Ghevont is the patron saint of the Armenian clergy and is remembered two days before Vartanantz Day when St. Vartan and the spiritual victory of the Battle of Avarair are commemorated.

HISTORY OF ST. LEON ARMENIAN CHURCH

Before the turn of the 20th century, Armenians began to flee the persecution of the Ottoman Empire. Some settled in Paterson, the busy hub of the silk weaving industry. They arrived in small numbers with little money, fortified by an ancient heritage.

In those days, there were no parkways, no turnpikes. The roads were long, which led from Paterson to Passaic County to Holy Cross Armenian Church, Union City. Between the years 1906 and 1930, Armenians made the journey by horsecar and trolley car to Holy Cross, the "mother" church in the New World of New Jersey, to worship, to wed and to baptize their children.

So it was that the "Paterson Church," later to be consecrated St. Leon Armenian Church, became the healthy offspring of the parent.

The Armenians of Paterson rented halls and churches for occasional visiting clergy to celebrate liturgy and to administer the sacraments. Deacons also did their best to serve the community. By the late 1920's, the Armenians of Paterson desired their own church and pastor. Under the spiritual direction of the late Mampre Vartabed Calfayan, who later became Primate, a decision was made to purchase land for future use as a church site. The year was 1929. The project had to be abandoned because of the Depression.

It was not until 1932* that a special meeting was held, presided over by the late Primate, Archbishop Ghevont Tourian. A fund raising committee was formed to purchase a church for the Armenians of Paterson whose number was exceeding 500. In that same year, St. Luke Episcopal Church on Bloomfield Avenue, Paterson, was purchased for \$6,000. Despite a severe, world-wide depression, the entire mortgage was paid within two years.

The congregation was to spend the next 33 years in this modest church, which offered a center for religious and cultural continuity. Annual bazaars, hantesses, Armenian and Sunday School classes, and youth activities were organized and conducted in the basement hall. During those years, the children cultivated their values. The church fathers and lay leaders faced the decision to build a larger church with a community center and educational facilities. The second generation helped to meet this challenge.

In 1958, through the efforts of the parish council and the help of the late Haroutune Nakashian, three acres of land were purchased on Saddle River Road in Fair Lawn. The original plan was to erect a much needed community center and to follow it with the building of a new church.

In January 1963, during the pastorate of the newly ordained Reverend Carnig Hallajian, priorities were reversed. The parish assembly created an executive building committee and authorized to build a church. Under the General Chairmanship of E. George Dabagian, construction of the new church began in March 1965. On September 19, 1965 Archbishop Sion Manoogian, Primate, consecrated the newly erected St. Leon Armenian Church in Fair Lawn.

In the 16 years since the Consecration, the parish has continued to thrive. During the past decade Armenians leaving the political unrest of the Middle East have found a spiritual home to bridge the gap to life in the United States. They, in turn, have been a welcome impetus to the Armenian cultural life of St. Leon parish. The Church is the custodian of our heritage, which is being ingrained in yet another generation of parishioners.

The challenge was again presented to a modest people, small in numbers, but groomed in faith, hard work, and sacrifice. On February 3, 1980, the parish assembly created an executive building committee to plan an expansion project with Zaven Dadekian serving as General Chairman. On June 6, 1980, a special parish assembly authorized the Building Committee to proceed with construction of the long awaited St. Leon Armenian Church Community Center along with the conversion of the existing hall into an Educational Wing.

On November 9, 1980 Archbishop Torkom Manoogian, Primate, blessed the site of the proposed Community Center. Contracts were signed with Joseph A. Natoli Construction Co., Pinebrook, N.J. on December 9, 1980. Following the plans of Thomas Ashbahian, project architect with the firm of Mario B. Cammarano, Ridgewood, N.J., the construction was begun and completed on schedule.

The parish life has continued to flourish with the additional classrooms and spacious Community Center facilities. For the first time in its history, St. Leon hosted the 82nd Annual Diocesan Assembly May 3-6, 1984. Banquets, weddings, Diocesan programs, plays, concerts, even a retreat (Women's Guild held its second annual retreat in the Community Center January 1983) have steadily filled the calendar since the completion of the Community Center.

It has been said that one generation travels on the achievements of another. We offer humble prayers on the eve of this celebration, that these historic and glorious years will inspire everyone. May the fellowship of the Holy Spirit remain with the St. Leon family and continue to illuminate the path that its posterity will travel.

HIS BEATITUDE SHNORK PATRIARCH KALOUSTIAN

His Beatitude was born in 1913 in Edeli, Turkey. He lost his family during the deportations of 1915. Only he, his mother and his brother, Armen, were saved, but he somehow was separated from his mother and was never able to see her again. Young Arshag (as he was christened) spent his years from 1920 to 1927 in the American orphanages in Beirut and Nazareth where he obtained his elementary education. In 1927 he was admitted to the school of the Armenian Patriarchate of Jerusalem amd was graduated in 1932. At that time he was ordained deacon by Torkom Patriarch. In 1935, after completing his studies in the theological school of the seminaries, he was ordained a celebrant priest by Torkom Patriarch and renamed, Shnork (Grace from God or of God).


From 1936 to 1940 he served as Director of the Printing Press of the St. James Convent. From 1940 to 1941 he served as pastor of the Armenian parish in Haifa. From 1941 to 1944 he was named the Dean of the Antelias Seminary and taught the Armenian language, church history, as well as commentary of the Bible and Classical Armenian.

In 1945 he journeyed to London, England where he served as pastor of the St. Sarkis Armenian Church. He continued his theological studies there until 1948 when he was called by the primate of the Armenian Church of America, Tiran Surpazan, to assume the duties of pastor for both St. Leon Armenian Church of Paterson and St. Mary Armenian Church of Newark (now Fair Lawn and Livingston respectively).

While in America for those few years (1948-1955), he served as Diocesan Council Chairman, organized the Sunday Schools and Armenian Schools of the two New Jersey parishes, initiated the "Gantegh" newsletter, which is still the official newsletter of the St. Mary parish. His vision gave birth to the first ACYOA chapters of those parishes. He edited the official monthly publication of the Diocese, "Hayastanyaitz Yegeghetzy" (The Armenian Church). In 1953, he was elected Primate of the Diocese of California.

In 1955 he returned to Holy Etchmiadzin where on October 6 he was ordained Bishop by His Holiness Vazken the I. He returned to Jerusalem after his ordination and served as chief canon sacristan of the Armenian Patriarchate until 1959. He then went to Istanbul as the guest of the late Patriarch Karekin. On October 6, 1961 he was elected Patriarch and was installed January 3, 1962.

His Beautitude has written several books and publications and has translated several works from classical Armenian into modern Armenian. He continues to be a faithful, devoted and beloved shephard to his work.



HOLY CATHEDRAL OF ST. ETCHMIADZIN

THE SIGNIFICANCE OF CONSECRATION

The ritual origins of the consecration of a Christian Church go as far back as Hebrew times, to the consecration of Solomon's temple.

Consecration is "the act by which a person or thing is separated from common use and permanently dedicated to the service of God." Besides its permanence, a consecration is distinguished from simple blessing by its greater solemnity.

The word church (ecclesia) originally referred to the group of people who came together in order to celebrate the Divine Liturgy. It is only by extension that it came to mean the building in which people congregated for that purpose. Naturally the first Christians did not have special buildings for their religious services. They gathered together in private houses. It was only after the end of the third century that church buildings began to be erected. Thus our own mother church at Holy Etchmiadzin has the distinction of being one of the very first buildings in the world built especially as a church.

The essential part of the consecration of an Armenian Church is first the anointment of the Altar, then of the two pillars of the Apse, then of the center of the front of the Ambon (where the lectern is placed), then, consecutively, of the western, northern, and southern sides of the church, and finally of the Main Door. All but the Altar, Ambon, and Main Door are consecrated in the name of the twelve Apostles and of St. Paul. The anointing is done with Holy Chrism or muron and incense is used throughout the service. Holy Chrism is the symbol of grace or divine presence. Incense is the symbol of praise.

In a truly Christian community all buildings and all things should serve God. An Armenian church is a building where our Lord Himself is bodily present because the Divine Liturgy is celebrated there at least every Sunday. For this reason it has a very special function. It should be set apart. It should be consecrated.

Originally the word "church" did not apply to a building. It applied to the people who came together in order to celebrate the Divine Liturgy. To this day it really keeps that meaning.





ST. LEON CHURCH CHOIR

The Church Choir has had its share of prominent members. In the beginning, it was led by Sisak Sargavak Nalbandian, who later was ordained as Khoren Kahana Mamigonian. At the same time, the altar was served by Yeghishe Sargavak Churchian who performed these same functions even before St. Leon Church was officially consecrated. There was also Garabed Der Boghosian who assisted in the services, as did Mardiros Tellalian and Bedros Shemiranian.

Our first Organist was Mrs. Esther Avedisian. She held this position for many years in addition to being Choir Director.

When Mrs. Avedisian retired, Mrs. Isabelle Pabian, a long-time choir member, took over the position as Director and Organist and performed faithfully for a number of years.

Lillian Boyajian Kasparian was our next Organist, who also was our soloist. Lillian left after her marriage to Caspar Kasparian.

Next in line was Mrs. Lucy Dabagian who served with great dedication as Director and Organist for more than 22 years. Assistant organists were Dawn Dabbakian Hourdajian, George Marootian and in later years, Arline Dadekian.

In 1952, Rev. Arten Ashjian, as Pastor of our Parish, was responsible for training a number of male choir members to serve on the Holy Altar. These included such members as James Boyajian, Bared Dabaghian, Jack Hachigian, Sarkis Jamgochian and Charles Pinajian. Within a short time, these Choir members became the first American-born Armenians to be ordained as sub-deacons in our church. Archbishop Tiran Nersoyan, then Primate of the North American Diocese, performed this ceremony.

All of these members subsequently served on the Altar and in the Choir. Special recognition must be given to Charles Pinajian, who has faithfully and devotedly served on the Altar from that time to the present.

In August of 1965, another generation of American-born Armenians was ordained as acolytes and subdeacons by Archbishop Sion Manoogian, Primate of the North American Diocese, at that time.

Ordained as acolytes were: Robert Atamian, Drew Dabbakian, Wayne Keshishian Rallo, Aram Mazoujian, Richard Noorigian, Sam Tungrian, Gregory Voskian and Gregory Zara. Ordained as sub-deacons and now eligible to serve on the Altar were Richard Dabagian, Peter Gamgochian and George Marootian.

In 1965, the Parish relocated from Paterson to Fair Lawn, and our growth was stimulated by this move. All of our Pastors have continued to train and prepare our young acolytes for ordination as Tbirs.

During April 1977, a record 17 Tbirs were ordained by Archbishop Torkom Manoogian, and was said to be the greatest number ordained by him. These, and subsequent Tbirs, had been prepared by Der Paree Metjian. Highlights of the most recent ordination of Tbirs on September 16, 1984, were featured in this Anniversary Booklet.

During the transition years, beginning with the elevation of Charles Pinajian and Sarkis Soultanian to the rank of full Deacon in 1968, the number of our Altar Servers has continued to grow.

In 1980, Shavarsh Torosian and Hagop Demirdjian were made full Deacons along with Wayne Rallo, a dedicated Acolyte, and George Paroonagian, our capable Choir Director, who became Sub-Deacons. On September 16, 1984, Dr. Berdj Feredjian was ordained a Full Deacon.

Lucille Varjian took over as Church Organist for a short time after Lucy Dabagian left. In 1979, Sirvart Galstian assumed the responsibilities of Church Organist and has since served the Church with great capability.

The Choir's performance has been enhanced additionally with the installation of the new Electronic Pipe Organ, generously donated in memory of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Sohigian, by Charlotte and Vincent Abajian.

The Choir and Altar Servers continuously work in harmony and maintain a high standard of performance through dedication and faithful attendance.

WOMEN'S GUILD

For the Armenians outside their native country, the Armenian Church has always been their spiritual and intellectual center. Here, Armenians maintain the inheritance of their forefathers. This fact has always been recognized from generation to generation.

Being devoted daughters of the Armenian Apostolic Church and inspired by the strong Christian faith of our ancestors, a group of ladies initiated the Ladies Aid Society on September 1, 1928, in Paterson, New Jersey. The charter members were Helen Abajian, Gadar Alijian, Vartouhi Marootian, Munoosh Mazoojian, Nemzoor Sahatjian, Hannah Shahinian, Munoosh Soghomonian, and Sophie Turpan.

In the beginning, the Ladies Aid, later to be called Women's Guild, launched an active membership drive. The result was the formation of a strong and vital group. Over the years, the Ladies Aid has worked to find ways and means to raise money in order to bring into reality the wish of the faithful children of the Armenians in Paterson, namely, to have their own church.

Throughout the years, the membership and activities have increased. The present Women's Guild is involved not only in fund-raising programs, but, also, in many philanthropic works: the education of needy Armenian children abroad, donations to the Shnork Kaloustian Fund for Children, and sponsoring of church youths to St. Nerses Seminary and to St. Vartan Camp. Its 96 members constantly provide moral and financial support for the progress of the church.

Among many of its activities are the annual Bazaar, the Fish and Chips lenten dinner, Charity Food Festival, rummage sales, Chinese auctions, musical programs, guest speakers, the publication of a cook book in 1974, and visitation of the sick and bereaved.

On April 29, 1979, the 50th Anniversary of the founding of the Women's Guild, a banquet was held at the Marriot Hotel, Saddle Brook, New Jersey, featuring the celebrated mezzo-soprano, Maro Partamian. Public tribute was made for 50 years of service to Helen Abajian, Maritza Giragosian, Elizabeth Hachigian, Nevart Sahatjian, and Hannah Shahinian, and for 45 years to Arshalous Dishian and Yeranouhi Vartanesian.

ST. LEON SUNDAY SCHOOL

The first Sunday School of St. Leon Armenian Church was begun under the guidance of Patriarch Shnork Kaloustian, who at that time was a Hayr Soorp and our church Pastor.

The first class was held on Sunday morning, May 1, 1949, with a teaching staff of two—Mr. Leo Bakalian and Miss Bette Noorigian. Seven children attended and within one month the number had grown to fourteen. Lessons and curriculum were devised through the ingenuity of the teachers. Two years later, Sunday School enrollment had increased to thirty students and three teachers, the third teacher was Yeretzgin Mary Ashjian. By 1960, the Sunday School had grown to 48 with a teaching staff of five persons, four substitutes, two supervisors, one pianist and a secretary-treasurer.

At the close of the school year in June 1965, enrollment stood at 86 children, with an average attendance of 70. The staff numbered twenty, with Yeretzgin Rose Hallajian, its dynamic and dedicated Superintendent.

Sunday School classes are held every Sunday during the school year from 10:30 to 12 noon. Sessions are divided into three parts—joint worship service from 10:30 to 11 a.m., class sessions from 11 to 11:40 a.m., Assembly or Church attendance until noon.

Special recognition should be given to Rose Najarian for her years of devotion and excellence in teaching our children the Bible and Armenian history during the joint worship service.

The Sunday School conducts a full range of special programs for the children; one of the most pleasing and well-attended is the Annual Christmas Pageant.

In the Summer of 1976, the Vacation Bible School was organized by our Pastor, Rev. Paree Metjian, and has flourished under the able direction of our Yeretzgin Angel Metjian.

The Sunday School follows the recommended curriculum of the Council of Religious Education of the Diocese and receives from that Organization all the material taught on the History of Armenia, the Armenian Church—its creeds, sacraments, feast days, holy days, saints and martyrs, etc. Sunday School children receive a well-rounded education of the Holy Bible. Attendance at Armenian Sunday School not only benefits the children religiously, but serves a means of instilling in them their Armenian heritage and makes for many lasting friendships.

Many thanks to all the superintendents and teachers who throughout the years have faithfully served our beloved St. Leon by dedicating their time and talents for the education and betterment of our children.

ST. LEON ARMENIAN SCHOOL

Fifty years ago the Armenian School began at St. Leon.

Sponsoring an Armenian School had always been a wish of the Armenians in the Paterson area. It was first formed prior to the purchase of the Church in Paterson. Initially, classes were held in private homes. On April 22, 1934, the Parish Council appointed the first church-sponsored Armenian School Committee. Members of this Committee were: Megerdich Akellian, Manoog Jamgochian, Dicran Berberian, Mardiros Hatchigian and Sarkis Filian.

Classes were held in Tourian Hall, under the supervision of Mrs. Manooshag Telalian, and met three times a week from 4 to 6 p.m. Committee members worked hard to secure financial support for the school.

The school had many capable and dedicated teachers. Mrs. Nevart Hajian (Bakalian), during her teaching years, had more than thirty students in her classes. She terminated her teaching when she was married. Mr. A. Hovasapian and Mrs. Vartanoosh Paboojian followed as teachers and Yeretzgin Jelalian became supervisor of the School.

After a lapse of several years, the Armenian School was reinstated by Rev. Carnig Hallajian and the Parish Council. Der Carnig was the Superintendent, and the teachers were directly responsible to him. Classes grew and the Armenian School flourished from 1958-1965, at which time, Vahram Varjabedian became the Principal. Mr. Varjabedian's position was succeeded by Mrs. Hermine Menakian and this year by Ms. Verkin Marashian, who is our present Principal.

The Armenian School today is divided into six levels—kindergarten through sixth grade. Areas of concentration include: language, history, song and dance.

In 1984, a "Conversation Course" was initiated. Each child is responsible for fifteen minutes of Armenian conversation every week.

The School's main fund raiser is its Annual Valentine Dance. The year-end Annual Hantess has been a tradition for many years and gives the children an opportunity to perform their Armenian accomplishments.

Enrollment is up to 55 students, who are learning their mother tongue, Armenian history and songs—all designed to maintain our Armenian heritage.


