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RELIGION CALLED VITAL TO SELF IDENTITY

If people are to regain their identity, the revival of religion is essential, Barry Ulanov, professor of English at Barnard College, said at the Cardinal Newman Day dinner last night at the Hotel Statler Hilton.

"When we talk of religion, we talk of the survival of western nan," he said, "because the values of western nan are tied to religion...the understanding of human potential and worth."

Ulanov, is a convert to Catholicism, a philosopher and a jazz music critic. The annual dinner is sponsored by the Newman Campus Ministry of the Cleveland Catholic Diocese.

Ulanov said the rituals of hate and violance of today are the product of a great failure within ourselves to know who we are. "There is the same living emptiness in us," Ulanov said, comparing society today to the walking dead of science fiction, the zombies.

He said the drug scenes of today have the same motivation behind them as religion —man is looking for the same consciousness.

The communes, the pot rituals, the riots in the ghettos all have "this kind of understanding and reconciliation to the human condition." They're all looking for self, he said.

** Because of permissive parents the rites of identity searching has been postponed into later college years, he said.

Though pessinistic about the shape of the world, he added that "we will get better, but slowly."
