Armenians pool cultural heritage

Gregory Goekjian was only responding to a letter to the editor last summer, but his action led to formation of a formal Armenian Community of Oregon.

The original letter, printed in The Oregonian, asserted that a Turkish massacre of 11/2 million Armenians in 1915 did not occur.

"I had to respond; you cannot say that history never happened," said Goekjian, whose father survived a death march through the Turkish desert before emigrating to the United States. "That would have been like saying my father's life was a lie."

Several Armenian families contacted Goekijan after his response was printed. They agreed to form a local organization to perpetuate Armenian culture, customs, language and education.

"We decided to pool our knowledge," said Goekjian, 40, who serves on the board of the new group. "We'd like to establish the sense of community. which many of us grew up with, for our children, letting them know where we came from and giving them an opportunity to preserve their cultural heritage."

The group plans a memorial service at 10 a.m. Sunday, April 24, at Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church on behalf of Armenians who died in Turkey between 1915 and 1922. It was on April 24, 1915, that Armenian intellectuals were rounded up and killed, Goekjian said.

"This is the first time such a memorial service will have been held in Portland," said Geokjian, for 13 years an associate professor of English literature at Portland State University.

"Part of our role is remembering our" history," he said. "We need to remember what we lost. Flag-waving is a thing of the past. It's important that we. remember our heritage and who we are."

Since organizing last October, the group has published a directory of its 92 members, held a potluck and a dinnerdance, and shown films at its bimonthly meetings.

The group hopes to begin a language school for Armenian children, as well as hold musical, artistic and other cultural, events. The group eventually may organize a church, said Suzi Karakashian, a board member.

Officers are Yerchi Arakelian, president; John Manougian, vice president; Kathy Arakelian, secretary; and Melene Sakouyan, treasurer.

"The Armenians are a fun-loving and a non-violent people," Karakashian said. "We've tried in the past to get an organization going, but it's never gotten off the ground. This time we have. Even though we're operating on a shoestring budget, we have plans."

Goekjian estimates there are 200,000 Armenians living in the United States. He said that similar organizations exist in Seattle; Los Angeles; Detroit; Chicago; Fresno, Calif.; and Vancouver, British Columbia.
