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Your Beatitude, Reverend Clergy, Honored Guests, Friends:

It is a great pleasure to be here in Cheltenham, for the observance of the 30th anniversary of this parish building. Your celebration today is a glowing testimony to the vision of those who originally built this church, and to the dedication of those who have continually renewed her life over three decades

The Holy Trinity Church stands apart from all the other landmarks of your lives. It was built to be a true sanctuary—a place of peace—where Armenian Christian families could come together, to be inspired by their distinctive tradition, and to dedicate their hearts to God.

Along these lines, we should remember that while we are honoring 30 years of the Holy Trinity <u>building</u>, the history of the Holy Trinity <u>Church</u> goes back even farther.
