

God bless you all on this remarkable milestone, and may His Spirit continue to dwell in each and every faithful heart for many, many years to come.





Dear St. Thomas Family,

St. Thomas, from its beginnings, has been comprised primarily of 2nd or 3rd generation American-born Armenians who left their urban areas and settled in suburban Bergen County, where they established this parish. And it was fitting that the first pastor of this indigenous Armenian American parish be the first American - born Armenian priest, Fr. Dajad Davidian.

There was a time when our primary concern was coming together and building an Armenian church community and facilities. Now that after 25 years we have a vibrant community and beautiful physical facilities, what do we do for an encore?

How can people, who have come from all over the world (Dikranagerd, Kharpert, Beirut, Istanbul, New York, Pennsylvania), who speak different languages, who hold different values, who may be doctors or photoengravers or merchants, who may have married an Armenian or a non-Armenian, who attended a Baptist or Congregational or Lutheran or Methodist Church or a particular Armenian parish in their childhood, come together and meld into a cohesive Armenian community? And how can all of these people come to know and share a common and genuine Armenian Orthodox parish life?


The only two answers I know are tolerance and adaptation. St. Paul urges us to practice tolerance when he invites us to live according to the fruits of the Spirit, "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control" (Galatians 5:22) in our parish relationships. These fruits of the Holy Spirit will promote tolerance and love toward each other no matter where we come from or what our background is.

The second way to accomplish a cohesive Armenian community is to create new vessels of expression and worship and communication. Life imposes imperatives on us; adapt or perish. Our language of communication is English, 85% of our marriages are an Armenian with a non-Armenian, and we live in a transient society. Under these circumstances our chief concern should be to keep those who do not speak Armenian in the community and make the non-Armenian spouse feel a part of the community. Otherwise we will lose the whole family and our church community will disintegrate.

Adaptation may sound radical, but it is much less radical than closing our churches. Adaptation may mean not being afraid of the English language in our worship, or abbreviating our Badarak, or not requiring that we do things the way we always did them. It's a false assumption to believe that the Armenian Church has been an unchanging and rigid institution since the time of St. Gregory. The reason for our continued survival as a people through the centuries, has been our ability to adapt to the various situations in which we have found ourselves. The main issue is to survive as an Armenian Church community, the main issue is to be an organic part of the world-wide Armenian Church, whose Mother See is Holy Etchmiadzin, under the leadership of His Holiness Vasken I, Supreme Patriarch and Catholicos of All Armenians.

We pray for all those who helped our parish achieve this 25th anniversary milestone. May God lead us with the creative spirit of our forebears to keep alive our church community that we may reach our 50th anniversary.

Then And Now

For eight years following the organization of an Armenian community in northern New Jersey, the newly formed parish was called "The Armenian Church of Bergen County." Then in 1965 upon the construction of a new imposing church, it was consecrated by the Primate of the Diocese of the Armenian Church of America and named St. Thomas Armenian Church.

This then is the story of St. Thomas Armenian Church. It is not intended to serve as a detailed history, but only as a reminder of the events and people who have made the St. Thomas Church dear to our hearts these past 25 years.

We are now in our "young adulthood." Children who were baptized in our "new" church then, are now being married and having their own children christened in the same church where they received their first sacraments. We have developed into a St. Thomas Family.

Every history must start with an, "...In the beginning," and in order to start the St. Thomas story we must go back to the mid-1950s, when all the pieces to the mosaic began to come together.

The following is reprinted from the Consecration Book of 1965:

The seed was germinated by our own Haig Markarian of Bergen County who repeatedly carried the message: "The church is a must," to everyone he met and everywhere he went. By constant diligence and word-of-mouth campaigning, he eventually managed to gather his friends to join in an initial meeting. This group, consisting of Jack Charshafian, Haig Tashjian, Stephen Ananian, Richard Turnamian, Charles Shakarjian, and the late Albert Tfank, decided that Bergen County, which consisted of over 1.000 Armenian families, was in need of an Armenian Church. They formed a committee and

sent invitations to their friends to attend a dinner in April of 1957 at the Swiss Chalet in Ramsey, NJ, and to discuss the possibilities of an Armenian Church. Eighty couples attended. Jack Charshafian presided over the meeting and Haig Markarian explained his idea of building a church to continue Armenian heritage and culture in our children by keeping them together through a common purpose. Everyone was enthusiastic and filled out forms listing their names, addresses and their children's names and ages. A Mr. and Mrs. Club was formed with Vahan Najarian as chairman. The purpose of

the club was twofold, to encourage more Armenians to join and for the purpose of raising funds. A Board of Trustees was selected to organize a parish and to discuss a site for the church. The trustees were Jack Charshafian, Chairman; Armen Bogossian, Treasurer; Peter Daghlian, Secretary; Dr. Gerard Balakian, Anoosh Poosikian, Haig Tashjian, Malcolm Topalian, Richard Turnamian, Vahan Najarian, Stephen Ananian, and Haig Markarian.

Shortly following these events, this new group was assigned a young and magnetic Deacon-In-Charge, who in 1960 was ordained Reverend Father Dajad Davidian and became the first pastor of our parish. It was also during 1960 that His Holiness Vasken I, Catholicos of All Armenians, was visiting the Armenian communities in the United States, and we were most fortunate to have His Holiness bless, on July 24, the nearly eight acres of church grounds we had been able to acquire in Tenafly in 1958 through the efforts of Charles Shakarjian.

By 1961, an attractive multi-purpose auditorium had been erected with Antranig Ouzoonian as Chairman of the Building Committee, and on January 29 of that year, a ribbon-cutting ceremony and "Antasdan" services signaled the formal opening.

After two years as our pastor, Father Dajad was reassigned by the Primate as an instructor at the newly founded St. Nersess Armenian Seminary in Evanston, Illinois. The Primate then appointed the Reverend Father Arnak Kasparian, who had served as pastor of the St. John's parish in Detroit for eleven years, to assume the duties as pastor of the St. Thomas Church.

A beautiful parsonage was built in 1963 — an accomplishment for which we were greatly indebted to John Karanfilian, who donated his efforts as builder.

As our flock grew, the need to begin construction on the church became apparent. A Building Committee was organized in 1963, with Edward Bashian and Jack Charshafian serving as General Co-Chairmen. Though Jack Charshafian was unfortunately called away to head a business project in California, Mr. Bashian capably carried on as chairman of this huge undertaking with the assistance of the other members of the committee.

On Sunday, May 23, 1964, the Primate, Archbishop Sion Manoogian, blessed the cornerstone and foundations, with the participation of a number of clergy and the Godfathers of the 16 foundation stones.

Construction progressed rapidly, and we were able to observe our church taking form.

Finally, during the weekend of April 3-4, 1965, the dream was fully realized, when Archbishop Sion Manoogian consecrated St. Thomas Armenian Church. Haig Tashjian was the Godfather of the new church. A Consecration Banquet at the Tammy Brook Country Club in Cresskill, NJ, attended by more than 700 people, concluded the activities of that memorable period.

Thus, 75 years following the consecration of the first Armenian Church in the United States in Worcester, Mass., the St. Thomas Church was consecrated with the same pageantry of the ancient rituals of the Armenian Apostolic Orthodox Church.

By 1979, the need for more classrooms and social space generated an effort to secure approval of a third stage of construction. However, a

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consensus did not develop until 1983, when a concept for expansion of the existing structure emerged from the various proposals. The Building Committee, chaired by Nazar Nazarian, commenced detailed planning with architect Edward Luders. At several fund-raising receptions, sufficient pledges were secured to permit finalization of plans and to contract for construction. Groundbreaking took place on Sunday, December 2, 1984, with Archbishop Tiran Nersoyan officiating, after a festive dinner the previous evening. Actual construction began in March of 1985. Who will forget the dust of breakthrough and construction while we tried to carry on with our regular activities. All this came to a glorious conclusion on March 22, 1986, with a Gala Expansion Banquet and ribbon-cutting celebration with the Primate, Archbishop Torkom Manoogian, presiding. Dedicated were the Rupen and Leon Saddler Hall, the Mekhjian Atrium, the Topjian Kitchen Wing, the Kirikian Armenian School, new classrooms, a youth room, and other auxiliary areas. The entire church complex was now air conditioned, a new heating system installed, the entrance fover enlarged, and many other renovations effected.

Another innovation at St. Thomas was the appointment in September, 1987, of Louise Kalemkerian, a graduate of St. Nersess Armenian Seminary, as Pastoral Assistant. She has worked closely with Der Arnak to expand the pastoral outreach of St. Thomas.

Ever since its inception, the St. Thomas parish has been noted for its enterprising nature and the variety of projects upon which it has embarked.

One of the highlights took place the year after the consecration of our church, when in May of 1966, the Annual Diocesan Assembly was held in our complex. In 1991, we will again host this annual assembly as the





Armenian Church enters its second century in the United States.

A number of our members have served on regional Diocesan event committees, capably representing St. Thomas.

Over the years, our parish has marked the significant anniversaries of Father Arnak's ordination to the priesthood with special observances. The most recent was the celebration of his 40th anniversary which was commemorated with a splendid banquet on October 8, 1988, and contributions were received for a

Father Arnak and Violet Kasparian Library in our complex, currently in the planning stages.

Our parish has been fortunate to have many dedicated families who through the years have planned and participated in numerous events.

Many of these events have been the activities of our organized groups, like the Women's Guild, the Men's Club, Avak Society, ACYOA Juniorand Seniors, Choir, Armenian School, Sunday School, the Sevan Dance Group, and the Couples Club.

We have sponsored everything from











art auctions, fashion shows, rug sales, military bridge, concerts, bake sales, dinners and dances, to the St. Thomas Chorus, Instructed Divine Liturgy, Armenian history and culture lectures, adult language classes, Bible study groups, spiritual renewal programs, and much, much more.

Ecumenically, our pastor and parish have been involved in dialogue with the other religious institutions in Tenafly and neighboring communities. Women from our parish participate in the regional Church Women United activities. Each year our parish is

represented in a Good Friday vigil and walk with other Christian communities in Tenafly.

New endeavors have joined our traditional annual affairs such as the Palm Sunday Anniversary Dinner, December 24 Christmas Eve Services, the Memorial Day Picnic, the Bazaar, and the Cotillion.

The youngsters of our parish have participated in the Armenian Churches Sports Association with both girls' and boys' teams in basketball and track and field. For the last few years, our ACYOA Juniors have co-sponsored a Regional

Sports Weekend with the St. Leon ACYOA Juniors.

In times of disaster the St. Thomas community has raised funds for relief assistance. We responded to the victims of earthquakes and hurricanes in Mexico City, Ecuador, San Francisco, and South Carolina, and to the needs of those in Bangladesh, Ethiopia, and Lebanon. The devastating earthquake in Armenia in 1988 deeply affected us all. Local collections for earthquake relief were coordinated through our church office, and many contributions were received from parishioners as well as from residents and other religious institutions in our area. Countless members of our parish served as volunteers during the Armenian Earthquake Relief effort. Families from our community opened their homes to serve as hosts to the victims after their release from the hospitals.

We are cognizant of the less fortunate in this world and try to provide assistance whenever we can. We now have a Good Samaritan fund for helping those in need of immediate assistance. Beginning in 1989, with the cooperation of our church organizations, each month a meal is provided to a men's homeless shelter in Paterson. Food baskets and clothing are donated during the holiday season. Each October for several years, a group of youngsters and adults have participated in a ten-mile walk and have raised thousands of dollars through pledges to help the hungry.

At times, our enormous financial responsibilities have seemed overwhelming, but through the cooperative efforts and generosity of many, they have always been met. We owe appreciation not only to our leaders, but also to the many faithful parishioners and friends of St. Thomas, who have provided the support so essential to our existence. The parish is a blessing for which we are thankful.

Parish Council

Our first Parish Council set a lofty precedent back in 1958. Led by Jack Charshafian, their dynamic Chairman, they achieved levels of accomplishment in establishing the church that have been a constant inspiration to their successors.

Elected by the membership, Parish Council members are the lay administrators of our church. Aside from overseeing church operations and bearing the responsibility of seeing that all our financial obligations are met, our Parish Councils have brought to fruition many projects and programs.

We have witnessed the continual enhancement of our building complex and grounds, as well as increased efficiency in operations. The Parish Councils have fulfilled their duties faithfully. Furthermore, they have actively encouraged all church organizations in their endeavors.

We owe a special debt of gratitude to our Parish Council Chairmen. They must be commended for the tremendous amount of time and effort they have unselfishly devoted to our church.


Building Committees

The parishioners of St. Thomas have available for their use physical facilities that meet their need for a place to hold religious, educational, and social activities. To fulfill this need, the parish has turned to three Building Committees. Each has responded with a fund raising, planning, and construction effort that has culminated in our current complex of sanctuary, social halls, meeting rooms, and classrooms.

After the acquisition of our property, their first mandate was to build a structure to house the embryonic, but rapidly growing parish. The second was to build a sanctuary to facilitate the worship of God and conduct the sacraments of the Armenian Church. The third mandate was to expand and enhance our parish activities with more and better classrooms, social space, and support facilities.

The Building Committees have had many participants during each period of active pursuit of these mandates. Invariably, there were two components of each committee: a fund-raising/financial group, and an architectural or technical group. It is not possible to enumerate all those who have participated, but key members are listed here.

All parishioners are deeply indebted to the Building Committees who labored untold hours to make our church complex a beautiful reality.

Church School and Religious Education

The Church School is the foundation upon which our parish was built when the initial organization took place, and it has been an indispensable part of the church ever since. Staffed by dedicated volunteer teachers, adults and Church School graduates, the Church School stands out as one of the exemplary schools of the Diocese.

Classes meet every Sunday morning. The WE BELIEVE series curriculum texts, produced by the Diocese in 1987, are in use in every class. These colorful new textbooks, written especially to convey the faith and teachings of the Armenian Church, are a vast improvement over the non-Armenian curricular materials previously in use.

The students are divided into 12 classes, Pre-Kindergarten to 10th grade, and enjoy individual classrooms, made possible by the expansion project of 1986. During the 11th grade, the students participate in a year of service to the parish, either as assistant teachers, choir members or altar servers. Graduation takes place at the end of 11th grade.

An integral part of the Church School program is attendance at Divine Liturgy every Sunday, for about 45 minutes, and regular reception of Holy Communion. Assembly programs are conducted on a fixed schedule by Yeretzgin Violet. Students of the 8-11th grades participate in the reading of the Scriptures at Armenian Christmas Eve and Easter Eve services.

Through the years the Church School has been supported by active Parents' Committees, who have helped with social activities: the Christmas dinner, Easter communion breakfast, pot luck supper and graduation reception.

Service projects of the Church School include an annual visitation to

the Emerson Home for the Aged, the purchase of Christmas gifts for needy families, "Trick or Treat" for UNICEF, and collection of non-perishable foodstuffs for the Center for Food Action.

The Church School students have participated in various educational programs and activities outside the classroom, including retreats, discussion groups, visitations to other churches, and the St. Nersess summer religious study programs.

Parish educational activities for adults have also taken place on a regular basis. Both day-time and evening Bible Studies, local "in-home" study groups, discussion groups about contemporary issues, Instructed Liturgies, day-long programs, films and discussions, special parenting programs, as well as panels and lectures have been conducted. These programs have attracted both St.

Thomas parishioners as well as friends from neighboring parishes.

The Nareg Prayer Group, organized in May, 1986, meets monthly to read Scripture and pray together for people and concerns brought to its attention.

Kirikian Armenian School

The Armenian language is an integral part of every Armenian Church, and since 1961 the St. Thomas Church has provided its youngsters with Saturday morning classes to teach the basics of the Armenian language and culture and to instill pride and knowledge of their heritage.

In 1986, as the result of a generous donation by Garbis and Alice Kirikian to our church during its expansion drive and their continued support of the Armenian School, the school was named the Kirikian Armenian School of St. Thomas Armenian Church. Our school has been fortunate to have assistance from benefactors over the years.

In addition to the language, the children learn Armenian songs and dances and perform on special occasions. Annually, the school sponsors an Armenian Christmas dinner and its year-end Hantess and Graduation. The school observes Armenian traditional celebrations, has holiday parties, and participates in various parish and Diocesan events. During the last four summers, the school has sponsored a two-week "Summer Wonderland" program. In 1989, the school published an Armenian cookbook, the initial printing of which was sold out.

An enthusiastic Mothers' Committee

supports the school's efforts with social and fund-raising activities. The Armenian School has consistently been financially self-sufficient in its operation.

A standing executive committee supervises the operation of Kirikian Armenian School. Its current members, who have served for a number of years, are Martha Saraydarian, Chairman; Artemis Arslanian, Marion Babigian, Ani Capan, Sam Demirjian, Mary Ann Saraydarian, and Seta Yavru-Sakuk.

A recent important innovation in our Armenian School was establishing separate classes in two of the grades — one for English-speaking students and another for bi-lingual students, which benefitted both groups. In addition to the regular curriculum, the English-speaking classes have concentrated conversation lessons as well.

Ani Capan has been the Director of the Kirikian Armenian School since 1986, ably assisted by a staff of 15 teachers. Sylva Der Stepanian, Director of the Diocesan Armenian Language Laboratory, was Director of our Armenian School from 1971-86. Previous directors include Hagop Kasparian, Rose Hatchadourian, and Queenie Tashjian.

Appreciation is due to all who have helped Kirikian Armenian School flourish!

CHOIR

Through the years many parishioners have participated as members of the St. Thomas Church Choir and have raised their voices in praising the Lord by singing the sacred hymns of the Armenian Church, and enhancing our worship services.

From 1960-62, Bedros Norehad served as our choirmaster, and was succeeded by our present faithful choirmaster, Edward Daghlian. Krikor Pidejian was interim choirmaster during the year 1966. Our church organist from 1960-63 was Carol Shabazian, and Susan Shamamian has served our parish as our organist with sincere devotion since then.

Over the years, many men have served as Deacons and Altar Servers. During the last decade St. Thomas has been fortunate to have many American-born young men serve at the altar.

At the present, Deacon Joseph Kalemkerian, Sub-Deacon Armen Basmajian and altar servers Levon Altiparmakian, Gregory Doudoukjian, and Stephen Mekenian form the nucleus of the altar staff which is augmented from time to time by former servers and visitors. For the past few years various seminarians from the St. Nersess Armenian Seminary have been assigned to serve in our parish.



The St. Thomas Chapter of the Armenian Church Youth Organization of America, the official youth organization of our Diocese, was chartered in 1959. The Chapter has had both Senior and Junior Groups. While the Juniors—our teenagers—have remained quite active throughout the years, the Seniors have not been as consistent, perhaps due in large

measure to the numbers of our young people who go away to college. For a few years recently, our Seniors were part of a Northern New Jersey ACYOA Chapter—four parishes together. In 1989, they reorganized into parish chapters once again, and our ACYOA Seniors are striving to generate increased involvement in the group by the youth of our church.

Both the Seniors and Juniors have had picnics, parties, progressive dinners, retreats, lectures, discussion sessions, theater and sports event outings, and sports activities themselves. They have participated in our Bazaar, caroled at the Emerson Home, and helped with projects for the Armenian earthquake victims. They have sponsored dances, variety shows, car washes and bake sales, as well as regional conferences.

The Juniors have traditionally led our American Christmas Eve Services, served at our Anniversary Dinners, and held a number of Mother's Day Dinners. Regional Sports Weekends have been an important part of their program, both attending and sponsoring them.

The Seniors have participated in National Assemblies and Sports Weekends, basketball and volleyball tournaments, regional dances, seminars, and other events and programs for their age group.

Many parents and other parishioners have served as advisors to our ACYOA Juniors over the years, providing guidance and support which has been vital to their success. The current advisor for a number of years has been Douglas Martaian, himself an ACYOA Senior, who has devoted considerable time and energy to assisting our youth.



Thomas Doubter to Believer

So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he (Thomas) said to them, "Unless I see in his hands the print of the nails, and place my finger in the mark of the nails, and place my hand in his side, I will not believe."

John 20:25

Thomas was one of the 12 Apostles who followed Our Lord and learned from Him. Thomas is sometimes referred to as the twin and some people think that he might have been Thaddeus' twin brother. Like all the apostles, Thomas loved Jesus and tried to do what Jesus wanted him to do. But just like us, he sometimes had trouble believing. When Jesus appeared to some of His Apostles after the Resurrection, Thomas was not with them and missed seeing Our Lord. When the others told him they had been with Jesus, Thomas said he would not believe it until he saw Jesus himself and touched Him. Shortly after, Jesus did appear again and told Thomas to come and touch Him. Jesus said to Thomas, "Stop your doubting, and believe!" Thomas said, "My Lord and

God." Thomas changed from a doubter to a believer.

After Pentecost the Apostles scattered to go on their different missions. Thomas, who was now very strong in his belief in Jesus, travelled to Persia and India, starting many Christian communities along the way. He was martyred in India but never again doubted Our Lord. 

To commune with the past through the life-giving bread and wine ...


