




"We Had A Dream"

A Brief 25-Year History of the Holy Trinity Armenian Apostolic Church of Greater Boston




October 26, 1986, marks the joyous celebration of the 25th Anniversary of the consecration

of the Holy Trinity Armenian Apostolic Church of Greater Boston. The church's history is a distinguished and full one... rich in heritage and tradition, yet bold in innovation and impact. As we rejoice in the celebration of this milestone, it is fitting to reacquaint ourselves with the beginnings of the church and to recognize and honor those characteristics that have made it, over the years, especially important in the greater Boston community and the Diocese as a whole.

The Early Days



When Armenians began to settle in the Boston area in the 1880s, they were for many years without their own church. Services were held in American churches and the Sacraments were administered in homes and other places.

On December 21, 1921, the first Armenian church in Boston was purchased. A former public library owned by the Episcopalians, the building at 397 Shawmut Avenue, Boston, underwent major renovations to approximate the atmosphere of an Armenian church. It was consecrated on November 11, 1923, Armistice Day, by the then Primate, Archbishop Tirayr Ter-Hovhannessian and Bishop Papken Gulesserian. The church was named the "Armenian Holy Trinity Church" and its first pastor was the Very Reverend Father Shahe Kasparian, through whose efforts the purchase of the church was facilitated.

The church on Shawmut Avenue administered to the spiritual needs of Boston-area Armenians for 38 years, during which time the following Reverend Fathers served: Shahe Kasparian; Khoren Lazarian; Haroutune Toumayan; and Papken Maksoudian. While each pastor left a personal legacy to the church and its parishioners, it is Father Maksoudian, who assumed the pastorate of the church in 1952, who led the effort to build a new church. Father Maksoudian's pastorate at the Armenian Holy Trinity Church was distinguished by profuse activity that encompassed spiritual, educational, and administrative achievements. It culminated in the erection of the new church on Brattle Street in Cambridge in 1961. It was Father Maksoudian's conviction that greater-Boston area Armenians needed a church that was more conveniently located to its parishioners and, importantly, was constructed in the style of traditional Armenian architecture.

Development of the New Church

The church's present site, on the corner of historic Brattle Street and Sparks Street in Cambridge, was acquired in December of 1954. At the time, the site consisted of two buildings on two acres of land.

Once the site had been found, Father Maksoudian consulted with Mrs. Armenouhie (Irene) Kolligian, Mr. and Mrs. Koren Kolligian, General Sarkis Zartarian, Mr. Humayag Habeshian, and Mr. Michael Kolligian. Mrs. Armenouhie Kolligian generously made the down payment. On December 12, 1954, at the Annual Assembly, the membership of the church unanimously voted to approve the purchase. The property was legally transferred to the name of the church on December 31 of that same year, and through current church funds and sizable contributions of some 20-22 individuals, papers were passed.

Upon acquisition of the land, the Parish Council designated a Building Committee. One of the Committee's first tasks was to invite Mr. Zaven Baikar to serve as the architect for the new building.

Father Maksoudian headed the fund raising campaign for the new church, assisted by a committee of devoted and hard-working members. There was a warm outpouring of moral and financial support from a large number of parishioners. From 1955 to 1959, church members are reported to have contributed more than \$300,000 towards the new church. Their financial commitment to the new church assisted the church in successfully securing a \$300,000 loan to help fund the construction. On November 1, 1959, in the presence of a multitude of faithful parishioners and friends, Fathe rMaksoudian blessed the site of the new church and the Cultural Hall and soon the construction activities commenced.

The cornerstones of the new church were blessed by the then Primate, His Grace Archbishop Sion Manoogian, on December 20, 1959. On that day, a stainless steel box containing various sacred ecclesiastical articles and memorabilia was buried beneath the altar. His Holiness Vazken I, Catholicos of All Armenians, visited the parish in June of 1960, when the steel framework of the church had just been completed.

The Building of the Church

On September 17, 1961 the day of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, the church was consecrated in a solemn ceremony and the first Divine Liturgy in the new church was performed by the then Primate, Archbishop Sion Manoogian. The church overflowed with people, who came to worship, to celebrate, and to give thanks. Mr. Nishan Semonian served as godfather of the church and 16 others served as godfathers for the consecrated crosses of the pillars.

On November 13, 1961, the grand opening of the Cultural Hall took place, again in the presence of the Archbishop Sion Manoogian.

From the beginning, the church on Brattle Street has been a source of spiritual inspiration and pride to all its parishioners. When his Holiness Vazken I, Catholicos of All Armenians, returned to the church several years after its completion, he, too, was most moved by it and he stated, "Among all the churches I have visited, I am most fond of yours. The altar is magnificent. From Etchmiadzin I shall send a beautiful picture of the Holy Mother of God to be used on your altar. That will be my gift to the church."

Over the years, the church has drawn a number of Armenian and non-Armenian visitors, theological and university students, and government and political leaders to the weekly church

services. They have been impressed not only by the cathedral-like Armenian style architecture and the interior grandeur of the church edifice, but also by the beautiful music and the solemn ceremony celebrating the Divine Liturgy. Surely, each passing year has served only to further enhance the grace, dignity, and beauty of the church.

Father Maksoudian served for 13 years as pastor of the new church, retiring as full-time pastor in 1974. Upon the request of the Annual Assembly, he has remained within the service of the church as Pastor Emeritus. Following Father Maksoudian as pastor of the church was Very Reverend Father Yeghishe Gizirian. In 1965, Very Reverend Father Oshagan Minassian came to the church as director of the church choir, and he, too, remains within the service of the church today.

The Recent Life and Activity of the Church

On January 3, 1977, Reverend Father Mampre A. Kouzouian assumed the pastorate of the Holy Trinity Church after having served as Canon Sacrist of St. Vartan Cathedral in New York and Director of the Ecumenical Relations of the Diocese of the Armenian Church. Since that day, the Holy Trinity Church as been a very active parish, continuing its past vitality.

Since 1977, the attendance of the Church has been increased, the budget of the church has been quadrupled, the annual income has multiplied, the Trust Fund has risen from \$14,000 to \$800,000, the number of employees at the church has doubled, and the Altar Servers of the Church have been young college students and graduates.

In the meantime, the Church has reached out to the elderly, the sick, and in general to its

parishioners and beyond. The programs and new projects undertaken by the Church have set an example to other parishes in the Diocese.



In recent years, two ordinations to the priesthood have taken place in the church. Ordained in 1984 was Richard Abdalian. In 1986, Krikor Maksoudian, son of Father Papken Maksoudian, was ordained.

Father Kouzouian emphasizes that the church's primary mission is and always will be a "divine" one. He explains, "Our church's mission is to work for the salvation of the souls of its flock, to preach the gospel and to propagate the work of Christ, and to work for the Kingdom of God and to lead its people to Him."

"I also realize the unique and important role that our church in Cambridge, a highly respected intellectual and cultural center, offers in influencing a greater respect, understanding, and appreciation of the Armenian Church," Father Kouzouian has stated. "We can also encourage the realization that Armenians have and are continuing to contribute to the world civilization. Our churches serve as the depository of the Armenian culture and the identity of its people."

During the past 10 years, the Holy Trinity Armenian Church of Greater Boston has indeed been working to meet its mission to propagate the life and teachings of Christ and to preserve the Armenian identity and culture. It is work that has distinguished the church as an especially active parish. The following is a brief representation of the life and activity of the church as it is today.

Since its inception, the Sunday School has taught the Christian faith to the children of the parish according to the experience and the faith of the Armenian people. It has prepared them to be good Christians, good citizens, and to be faithful to the faith of their forefathers. There have been numerous devoted parishioners serving on the Sunday School teaching staff over the years. Many are themselves graduates of the school.


Armenians and non-Armenians alike have been drawn to the Celebrate series, which began in 1977 with an organ recital in the sanctuary by the renowned Berj Zamgochian. This led to what is now an annual concert. The concert series has featured many distinguished Armenian performers, among them Lili Chookasian, Ida and Ani Kavafian, Lucine Amara, and the Empire Brass Quintet. This concert series has grown to an annual October series of various cultural events, Celebrate, which is designed to introduce different aspects of Armenian culture and to foster an increasing appreciation of the Armenian heritage. Many of the series' events have captured the interest of the local media, including the Boston Globe. The church's Celebrate series has served as a model for other churches in the Diocese.

The church has also influenced public awareness of the 1915 Genocide of the Armenian people. To commemorate this national tragedy, the church has invited such distinguished public leaders as Governor Michael Dukakis, Senator Paul Tsongas, Speaker of the House George Keverian, Congressman Thomas P. (Tip) O'Neill, Speaker of the U.S. House, and others to join the church in its traditional April 24 observance. On the 70th Anniversary of the Genocide, in 1985, an especially dramatic and solemn series of events were held at the church, culminating in an evening service at which time Cardinal Bernard Law addressed the overflowing congregation of Armenians and non-Armenians. These observances have also drawn the attention of the media, which has been important in the church's efforts to assure that the past — the past of the Armenian civilization — is known by many and remembered.

Several years back, the church sponsored a series of eight programs and lectures entitled, "Introduction to the Armenian Church." It presented such topics as "Vestments, Utensils and Liturgical Books," "Iconography and the Architecture of the Armenian Church," and "The Armenian Church and the Ecumenical Movement." These lectures served to educate participants on the richness and meaning of the Armenian spiritual heritage.

The church has also worked to promote harmony and love among its parishioners, to encourage them to reach out to the hungry, the sick, and the elderly. The youth of the church has been especially active in this area, through such activities as the Sunday School's visits to the Armenian elderly at the Armenian Nursing Home in Jamaica Plain and the 20-mile Walk for Hunger, in which ACYOA members have walked tirelessly to raise money to feed the hungry of Massachusetts. In addition, the church has been known to welcome Armenian immigrants who have come to this country knowing no one, having nothing. Through the provision of shelter and clothing, the parish has embraced these new friends and helped them. When Father Kouzouian says that parishioners must "take the message of Christ and help others," this is what he means.

Like many churches, the Holy Trinity Armenian Apostolic Church of Greater Boston is alive and well with activity during every season, virtually every day, of the year. On any given




Scene from the Consecration

day, one might find the Erevan Choral Group, under the direction of Father Minassian, rehearsing in the Cultural Hall, the Bazaar Committee in Johnson Hall developing plans for a Christmas bazaar that will out-do all previous bazaar successes, an Armenian language class being conducted in the Sunday School, and the Parish Council discussing the business of the church in the Parish House.

No matter what age one might be, the church offers everyone an outlet for participation and involvement, whether it be through the ACYOA Jrs. or Srs., the Trinity Men's Union, the Couples Club, the Women's Guild or the Senior Women's Guild, the Choir, the Bazaar, the Cotillion, the Thousand Club, the Oriental Rug Sales, the Rummage Sales, the Sunday School, the Armenian School, Stewardship, Celebrate, the Trust Fund, the HyeTech Society or even the Parish Council and the Diocesan Assembly. Each organization exists to enrich the lives of the church's parishioners and to further the mission of the church in some important capacity.

Assuring the present and future stability of the church have been two important programs — Stewardship and the Trust Fund. Both have been given impressive support by members of the parish. Stewardship began in 1981 to provide an opportunity for a systematic giving vehicle for the parishioners. Gifts to the Stewardship Program are used towards the current operating expenses of the church and thus provide the means for the parish to meet its financial needs. Since it began, the Stewardship Program has grown from \$25,000 in its first year to \$100,000 today. The Stewardship Program of the Holy Trinity Armenian Church of Greater Boston has been recognized as the most successful stewardship program in the Diocese. The Trust Fund has been important, too, for it is an endowed fund providing for the future of the church. From the time it was established in 1975, through the efforts of Dr. Michael Kolligian, the Trust Fund has grown from \$14,000 to more than \$800,000. The generous contributions of the faithful of the parish mean a great deal to the church, for they help to enable the church to continue its work and its mission . . . today and tomorrow.

The Pastor and the Parish Council have worked devotedly and prudently over the years to administer to the needs of the parish according to the by-laws of the Diocese. Many parishioners have been elected to become Diocesan Delegates, representing the Holy Trinity Armenian Apostolic Church at the Annual Diocesan Assembly, the highest legislative body of the Diocese. A complete listing of Parish Council members and Diocesan Delegates over the church's 25-year history appears elsewhere in this booklet.

The Church Moves Ahead

The 25th Anniversary of the Consecration of the Holy Trinity Armenian Apostolic Church of Greater Boston truly is the celebration of a dream come true. It gives pause for appreciation of the important role the church has played in the lives of its parishioners and in the community as a whole. Surely, without the work of Father Maksoudian over the church's first 13 years and that of Father Kouzouian over the past 10 years — along with the cooperative effort of numerous church members and organizations — the quality of that which the church has accomplished would not have been possible.

"The youth is an indivisible part of the church," Father Kouzouian states. "They should have a strong impact on the community and be considered not only the future of the church but

also the very present of the Christian community."

The future of the church, however, is not alone in the hands of the youth. Everyone who cares about the church has something important of themselves to contribute.

The dream lives on and it belongs to all of the people of the Holy Trinity Armenian Apostolic Church of Greater Boston.
