CHOIR ASSOCIATION ASSEMBLY BANQUET SPEECH NOV. 6, 1994—ST. JAMES CHURCH, RICHMOND, VA

Dear Tbirs, Tbrouhies and Friends:

As we mark the end of this 48th annual Assembly of the Choir Association, it is worth reflecting for a moment on the great privilege we have been given, to serve on the altar of the Armenian Church.

Armenian audiences throughout the United States, Europe and the Middle East are equally delighted to listen to Anita's beautiful voice, and her memorable interpretations of our classic musical heritage. Like so many Armenian artists, Anita's early interest in music was nourished within the embrace of the Church. She served as a soloist in the choir of Bayside's Holy Martyrs church, as well as in the St. Vartan Cathedral choir. For all her accomplishments, Anita displays a charming humility, and points to her parents,

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
