It was a pleasure chatting with you this morning. As per our conversation, I am writing to make a formal request on behalf of Archbishop Khajag Barsamian, Primate of the Diocese of the Armenian Church of America (located on 34th Street and Second Avenue), to reserve the chapel of the UN Church Center for an event in early December.

As I mentioned, this year marks the 1700th anniversary of Armenia's conversion to Christianity, which distinguished Armenia as the world's first Christian nation. We've been holding celebratory events throughout the year (here in New York, in our local U.S. parishes, and in Armenia itself); the proposed event at the UN Church Center would be one of these.

We would like to reserve the space for **Thursday**, **December 6**, **2001**, preferably between one and two o'clock in the afternoon. The event itself is an hour-long program featuring a brief lecture, a few selections of Armenian sacred music, and a short video. We would need a piano or organ, podium, sound and projection equipment (including a screen); I am sure we could supply the latter, if need be.

If there is anything else we need to know or do—sign an agreement, pay a fee, provide security, etc.—please let me know. For your information, our NGO representative, Adrienne Alexanian, will be helping to organize the event, and may contact you or the UN Church Center in the near future.

At your request, I have attached our Tax Exempt form, as well as a flyer advertising the original program (scheduled for November but postponed due to the re-arrangement of the UN schedule). I have also taken the liberty of attaching some brief information on the Armenian Church and our 1700th anniversary observance.

New York State and Local Sales and Use Tax Exempt Organization Certification

The vendor must collect the tax on a sale of taxable property or services unless the purchaser gives him a property completed exemption document within 90 days after delivery of the property sold or service rendered.

Form ST-119.1, Exempt Organization Certification, may be sed only when an exempt organization is the direct purchaser nd payer of record. Any bill, invoice or receipt given by the sndor must show the above organization as the purchaser. ayment must be from the funds of the exempt organization.

he exemption from New York State and local sales and use a does not extend to officers, members or employees of the ganization. Personal purchases made by such individuals are abject to sales tax. An organization's exemption does not dend to its subordinate or affiliated units. When making archases, subordinate units may not use the exemption amber assigned to the parent organization. Such misuse may suit in the revocation of the exemption granted.

ubstantial civil and/or criminal penalties will result from the isuse of this form. In addition, where a certification is received later than 90 days after the delivery of the property. It is services rendered, the burden of proof that the sale

was exempt will fall on both the seller and the purchaser.

Form ST-119.1, Exempt Organization Certification, must be giver to each vendor at the time of the first purchase from that vendor. A separate certification is not necessary for each subsequent purchase provided the exempt organization's name address, and certificate number appear on the sales slip or billing invoice. The certification is considered part of each orde given to the vendor and remains in force unless revoked.

Vendors must retain this Exempt Organization Certification for at least three years after the date of the last exempt sale substantiated by the certification.



THE 1700TH ANNIVERSARY OF ARMENIA'S CONVERSION TO CHRISTIANITY (AD 301-2001)

Armenians Around the World Mark Emergence of World's First Christian Nation with Yearlong Celebration




EXACTLY 1700 YEARS AGO—in A,D. 301—the remote kingdom of Armenia took a remarkable and historic step. The pagan king of Armenia, Tiridates III, was baptized as a Christian—and proclaimed that henceforth Christianity would be the official religion of his realm. He took this remarkable course out of gratitude to a holy man named St. Gregory the Illuminator, who through the power of God had healed the king of an incurable affliction. St. Gregory went on to become the patron saint of Armenia, and established the line of supreme patriarchs of the Armenian Church—a line which continues unbroken to this day.

Through this sequence of events, Armenia became the *world's* first Christian nation—anticipating the Roman Emperor Constantine's "Edict of Milan" by more than a dozen years. Needless to say, this distinction has been a great source of pride for the world's 7 million Armenian Christians, and an inspiration to them in times of crisis.

This 1700th anniversary year is the occasion for major celebrations in the free Republic of Armenia and in diaspora communities across the globe. Here in the United States, the New York-based Eastern Diocese of the Armenian Church of America is in the midst of a yearlong observance which will reach its highpoint in late May, with events planned for New York City and Washington, D.C.

In the eastern U.S., the highpoint of a yearlong series of festivities will occur in New York City during Memorial Day Weekend, May 26 through 28. His Holiness Karekin II, pontiff of the worldwide Armenian Church, will travel from Armenia to preside over the entire weekend—which is expected to be one of the largest gatherings of Armenian Americans in history. Much of the celebration will take place in New York's Central Park, which will be the scene of an outdoor musical event and a Youth Walkathon to benefit Armenia's orphans (on Saturday, May 26) as well as an outdoor celebration of the Armenia Divine Liturgy by His Holiness (on Sunday, May 27); a banquet at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel will be held on Sunday evening.

(b) THE ARMENIAN CHURCH: Origins & Present Development



THE ARMENIAN CHURCH IS AN INDEPENDENT Christian church, also known as Armenian Apostolic Orthodox Church. Its origins date back to the earliest period of the Christian religion. In the middle of the first century, two of Jesus Christ's original apostles, Saints Thaddeus and Bartholomew, introduced Christianity to Armenia. Repeated persecutions failed to stem the growth of the new faith, and Christianity was declared the state religion of Armenia in A.D. 301. Armenia thus became the first nation to adopt Christianity as a state religion—largely due to the efforts of St. Gregory the Illuminator, who built the Mother Church at Etchmiadzin

in A.D. 303, and became the church's first catholicos (supreme patriarch).

Today, Holy Etchmiadzin (pictured above; the name refers to both the cathedral as well as its surrounding city, which lies near Yerevan, the modern capital of the Republic of Armenia) remains the central spiritual authority for 7 million Armenian Christians living in Armenia and in diaspora communities around the globe. Overt expressions of the church's activity in Armenia itself were severely restricted during that country's Soviet period. However, since the demise of the U.S.S.R., the new independent Republic of Armenia has experienced a vigorous revival of religious sentiment, and the Church has resumed its traditional public role as the "national faith" of the Armenian people.

About one million Armenians live in North America. The Armenian Church has two dioceses in the U.S: the Eastern Diocese (est. 1898) has jurisdiction over most of the United States. The Western Diocese, consisting of California, Washington, Nevada and Arizona, was constituted in 1928. A third diocese governs all of Canada.

The Eastern Diocese presently governs over 60 organized and mission parishes. Its chief bishop (or primate) is His Eminence Archbishop Khajag Barsamian, who presides over New York City's St. Vartan Armenian Cathedral. Major centers of Armenian population in the U.S. include the greater New York area; Boston and Worcester, MA; Detroit, MI; Philadelphia, PA; Los Angeles, CA; and Fresno, CA. Substantial and expanding communities exist in Wisconsin, Texas, and Florida.
