<u>LENT</u>

For the Armenian Church, Lent began this year on Monday, February 14. During this 40 days, the veil of the Altar is covered in black and the singing of the Liturgy is more somber and recitative. When you attend Church Service, please join the Choir in reciting the Choir's portion of the Liturgy. We urge our parishioners to devote a certain time each day to read the Bible with their families.

HOW TO OBSERVE LENT

All spiritual leaders and prophets at the dawn of their ministry have had an unavoidable period of preparation, entering the seclusion of a desert or climbing to the heights of a mountain, away from the daily world, to reach self-appraisal and attain the knowledge of God and His truth. Christ, too, according to the Gospel tradition, had his 40-day period of seclusion and penitence, during which he overcame temptations of Satan, and then went to the river Jordan to be washed and cleansed.

Following the example of the Lord, Christian churches regarded the concept of penitence as a precondition for salvation, and assigned special days for that purpose. The Armenian church also appropriated a 40-day period of penitence, which falls during Lent, beginning February 14 this year. All the hymns, scripture readings and services held during Lent, invite the Armenians to repentance and to strive for a better Christian life.

Our church fathers wisely realized that so many of us were caught up in daily problems, anxiety, anger, greed, worry, all of which interfered with our spiritual life. There is, therefore, a way during Lent to allow ourselves a chance to renew our inner souls and bring our feelings, our deeds, and our behavior face to face with God. The purpose of penance is to cleanse our sinful minds and souls, and renew our inner world. Penance is the means to raise human beings from their sins and to try to become better Christians. Our main enemy which threatens our lives is the inside man. While external means remain helpless, the internal enemy turns to be predominant. Therefore, internal means are needed, such as penance and repentance, which have to be practiced to subdue that inner evil in us.

The Armenian Church has established an excellent pattern to follow. Each Sunday in Lent gives a different message, step by step, and completes the cycle through devotion and prayer, by reading lengthy passages from the Bible, and pondering, going into our inner selves and coming out again as a new person, seeing the Light and the Way and the Truth: CHRIST THE LORD.

In the Armenian Church, Lent heralds a period of abstention from meat and dairy products. Fasting was once looked on solely as a means of atonement and the "cleaning of one's mind of evil thought", today many regard it as a way of cleaning the body as well. Observing the "40 Days of Lent" may do us more good than we imagine.

On Sunday, February 6, 1994, The Very Rev. Fr. Haygazoun Najarian celebrated Divine Liturgy and over 65 faithful Armenians were in attendance for Hayr Soorp's first visit to Atlanta. After the church service, council members of the Atlanta Armenian Church served a delicious Armenian style chicken-kebab dinner to 60 parishioners and guests. Chairman, Simeon DiBoyan welcomed everyone and introduced The Very Rev. Fr. H. Najarian, who spoke of the meaning of St. Vartanantz Day, followed by a question and answer time. The topic was not only interesting but very informative for many of us but, especially for the large number of young adults who were present. Mr. DiBoyan continued the program by asking Karmen Kamciyan to sing - her vocal selection was enjoyed by all.
