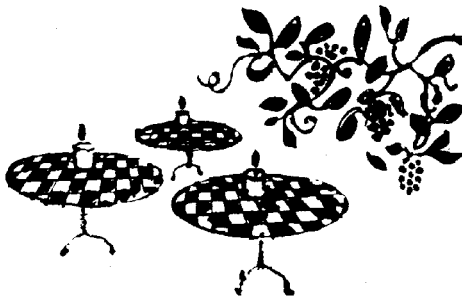

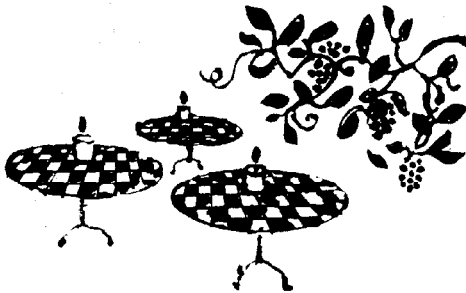

DIOCESE INTRODUCES SPECIAL MONTHLY SERIES OF "OPEN HOUSE" PROGRAMS, COMMENCING NOVEMBER 18

A special series of "Open House" programs has been introduced by the Diocese of the Armenian Church of America, commencing Friday, November 18 and ending Friday, January 27, 1989.

Dinner will be served from 6:30 P.M. to 9:00 P.M. The entertainment/educational programs, beginning at 8:00 P.M., include the following:

Lectures on Contemporary Armenian Issues and Their Impacts on Armenian-Americans. This will encompass presentations on vital religious, political, social and historical events.

The Delights of Armenian Cooking is another category, featuring classes and demonstrations conducted by culinary experts.

There will be Armenian Dance Instruction, with authentic folk dances taught by professionals.

Armenian Needlepoint classes will also be available, wherein one can learn the vanishing art of lacework from such historic centers as Marash and Aintab, taught by the recognized authority, Grace Oflazian.

Childrens programs are in the agenda as well as ping-pong and Tavloo games.

In addition, there will be a "Readers Club," a series of courses on the works of Armenian writers translated into English. These programs will be introduced by a different guest teacher each month.

The program dates are: November 18; December 2 and 16; and January 13 and 27, 1989.

CO-CHAIRMEN OF DIOCESAN FRIDAY "OPEN HOUSE" ENTHUSIASTIC ABOUT PROGRAM SERIES

Nancy Mouradian and Louise Dolbashian, Co-Chairmen of the recently-initiated Friday "Open House" programs at the Diocese of the Armenian Church of America, are enthusiastic about the series of events which they hope will generate wide community response among Armenians in the New York City/New Jersey metropolitan areas.

The first "Open House" took place at the Diocese on Friday, November 4. Others are scheduled for November 18, December 2 and 16, and January 13 and 27, 1989. Dinner is available from 6:30 p.m. to 9:00 p.m., and the entertainment/educational/cultural programs get under way at 8:00 p.m. The program highlights include lectures on contemporary Armenian issues and their impacts on the Armenian-American community; the delights of Armenian cooking; Armenian dance instruction; Armenian needlepoint; and children's programs. There will also be a "Readers' Club," a lively discussion course on Armenian literature.

The Co-Chairmen and the "Open House" Committee are involved in planning the various programs which they hope will attract large numbers of Armenians to the Church center. The members of the Committee are: Sue Boyajian, Aggie Ellian, Charles Garabedian, Angel Gaderikian, Shakeh Kadehjian, Haroutune Papazian, Anahid Pilyan, and Regina and Khajag Tchakerian.

"We believe these programs should serve as get-togethers for social interchange as well as being interesting for their entertainment and educational value," says Ms. Mouradian. Mrs. Dolbashian concurs, stating, "The objective is to bring the Armenian community

together in a warm, friendly and convivial atmosphere, where, if they wish, they can partake of various types of activities that enrich their Armenian knowledge and cultural identity."

Ms. Mouradian, an attractive businesswoman, was born in Brantford, Ontario, Canada. She has lived in the United States for over 20 years. A Manhattan resident, she is Executive Staff Assistant in the Corporate and Public Affairs Department of Exxon Corporation. Her parents -- who hailed from Mersin and Erzerum in Turkey -- were survivors of the Genocide. Over the years, she has been active in the "One World Festival," the April 24 Martyrs Day Commemorations, and many other Diocesan activities. Ms. Mouradian is a devotee of the theatre, opera and ballet and likes to swim and play tennis. She hopes that Armenians also bring their non-Armenian friends to the "Open House" programs.

"The Friday 'Open House' events will be excellent opportunities for non-Armenians to learn something about our culture, music, dancing, our foods and customs," she says. "In many ways, they will be rewarding educational experiences for all concerned."

Mrs. Dolbashian was born in Paris, France. Her husband, Sarkis, now retired, is also a noted jazz pianist. The Dolbashians were in the hotel business for many years, until they joined Mrs. Dolbashian's late brother, Melik, in the operation of the former Dardanelles Restaurant on University Place in Manhattan, from 1959 until Melik's death in 1976. The Dolbashians are the proud parents of two sons, Edward and John, both married. Edward, a winner of the Diocesan Pro Musica competitions, conducts the Orchestra of the University of Missouri, and John is an impresario for ICM, which represents popular and classical musical artists. A recognized culinary expert, Mrs. Dolbashian has been written up in numerous newspapers, magazines, and gourmet journals. Obviously, her particular interests in the "Open House" programs are those devoted to cooking preparation and demonstration, in which she intends to take an active role.

"Like Nancy, I am enthusiastic about all of the programs," she says. "We're looking forward to an exciting series of events that will generate widespread public participation, by non-Armenians and Armenians alike."

ARSEN G. ANOOSHIAN, NOTED FOLK DANCE DIRECTOR, WILL TEACH ARMENIAN DANCES AT DIOCESAN "OPEN HOUSE" PROGRAMS

Arsen G. Anooshian, the noted folk dance director, will conduct Armenian folk dance sessions at the Friday "Open House" programs sponsored by the Diocese of the Armenian Church of America. The programs are scheduled for November 18, December 2 and 16, and January 13 and 27, 1989.

Mr. Anooshian, a New Yorker, is one of the few original members of the Armenian Folk Dance Society, which is dedicated to the preservation and perpetuation of traditional Armenian village dances. The Society has been in existence for over five decades and Mr. Anooshian has retained almost all of the group's impressive repertoire of dances, representing the historic Armenian provinces of eastern Anatolia.

Over the years, Mr. Anooshian has been active in many Diocesan programs, teaching dancing at activities sponsored by the Armenian Language Lab and Resource Center (ALLARC). He explains that through the centuries there has been a great deal of cultural interchange between the peoples of the Caucasus and the Middle East; therefore, many steps and movements in Armenian dancing are similar to those of neighboring peoples. He notes specifically that the raised arm movements by women now seen in many Armenian dance troupes are of Georgian origin; and that dances which many believe to be of Turkish origin are, in reality, Armenian.

In the "Open House" programs, Mr. Anooshian will concentrate particularly on the teaching of such popular Armenian folk dances as "Tamzara" and "Patouri."

At the "Open House" events dinner will be served from 6:30 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. In addition to dance instruction, the entertainment/educational programs, beginning at 8:00 p.m. include the following: lectures on contemporary Armenian issues and their impacts on Armenian-Americans; the delights of Armenian cooking; Armenian needlepoint classes; and children's programs as well as ping-pong and Tavloo games. In addition, there will be a "Readers' Club," a series of courses on the works of Armenian writers translated into English. These programs will be introduced by a different guest teacher each month.

Mi chiamano Mimi

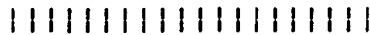

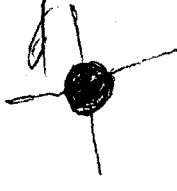

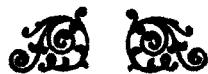

WASHINGTON — Stephen S. Trott, Assistant Attorney General for the criminal division of the Justice Department, cited the suppression of Armenian terrorism as a victory for the F.B.I., in a recent statement.

Since a series of attacks on Turkish diplomats in 1981-82, arrests have ended the incidents, and none were recorded in 1983-84, Trott said.

"They have stopped the Armenian terrorists cold," he said.
