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# DIOCESAN INTERN PROGRAM "AN EDUCATIONAL AS WELL AS MOVING EXPERIENCE" FOR PARTICIPANTS; ARMENIAN FAMILY ATMOSPHERE CITED

The five young Armenians who participated in this year's Summer Intern Program at the Diocese of the Armenian Church of America cited it as a "not only educational but moving experience; it was like being with your own family."

The Intern Program, in its third year, gives Armenian young people an opportunity to serve the Church, to be an integral part of Diocesan activities and gain first-hand knowledge and experience about the Church's operations and objectives.

The 1988 Interns were Rachel Abrahamian, Sekita Ekrek, Lara George, Charles Goorhigian and Noyem Zeroogian.

In a tearful, but joyful, farewell luncheon on August 5, the Interns talked about their month-long tenure, openly expressing their feelings and emotions. It was obvious the experience was educational and also spiritually and emotionally rewarding. As one Intern said, "We felt as if we were with our own family. The Diocese was our home away from home, where we learned so much about being Armenians and good Christians."

Rachel, 19, worked in the Armenian Language Lab and Resource Center (ALLARC), where she translated into English the "Zarteer," a children's book on Armenian history. A member of the

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Armenian Church of the Holy Resurrection, New Britain, Conn., she is a sophomore at the University of Connecticut, majoring in business administration. She is also a member of the ACYOA Seniors and has been a Sunday School teacher for a year.

"At the Diocese, I increased my knowledge of the Armenian language and the history of our forefathers," she said. "It was a truly educational experience in every way. I feel a great sense of accomplishment, and it gives me great pleasure to know that my hard work and effort will be rewarding and beneficial to all Armenian children."

Sekita, 22, is seeking a career in advertising. She is a member of St. Mary Armenian Church, Washington, D.C. She graduated in May from George Washington University with a B.B.A. in Marketing and a minor in French. She worked with the ACYOA Seniors at the Diocese.

"I was responsible for putting together the Summer issue of the 'ACYOA Youth Forum,' a quarterly newsletter," she said. "It gave me great pleasure. My duties involved compiling story ideas, writing and editing, layout and design. The practical experience I gained enhanced the value of my internship. I believe the Intern Program is invaluable for any young Armenian interested in his or her Church and heritage."

Lara, 19, who hails from Annandale, Va., where she is a member of St. Mary Armenian Church of Washington, D.C., worked in the Diocesan accounting office. She attends Virginia Polytechnic Institute. While Lara gained from the Diocese, she also contributed to its operations: "This past month as an Intern was very challenging as well as rewarding to me. This Fall I will be returning to Virginia Tech, to possibly pursue a degree in accounting. Through the internship, I gained a better understanding of what the accounting profession entails."

Charles, 24, a member of the Armenian Church of the Holy Ascension, Trumbull, Conn., received a B.A. Degree in Middle Eastern Studies from the University of Connecticut and recently

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completed an M.A. in political science at the same institution. He worked in the public relations department at the Diocese, completing a catalogue for the St. Vartan Bookstore. This, he said, gave him new insights into the vast wealth of materials the Diocese has on religion and Armenian language, literature, poetry, history, music, art and culture. He noted that the staff were, "All so active and involved. It isn't a question of quantity -- because they are relatively few in number -- but quality." They are all top-flight people." He had special words of praise for His Eminence Archbishop Torkom Manoogian, Primate of the Diocese: "Serpazan Hayr has tremendous drive and energy. He moves about like a man of 30. He is a real inspiration."

Noyem, 20, a member of St. Mark Armenian Church, Springfield, Mass., is studying Communications at the University of Massachusetts. She worked with the ACYOA Seniors at the Diocese, developing brochures and other promotional materials.

"The experience was a challenge," she said, "because I had to learn to use my creative abilities to the fullest."

The Interns began their tenure at the Diocese in mid-July. They received travel expenses, lodging and meals. At the Diocese they also had the opportunity to take part in many of the activities in the annual "Teacher's College" and the "The Armenian and His Culture/The Ayvasian-Bedrosian American Studies Program." It was exciting and eye-opening for them all.

Perhaps Charles summed up the month at the Diocese for all of the Interns when he stated: "The various lectures and courses on religion and Armenian language, history and culture were really fantastic. There was so much to learn. Serpazan Hayr's presentation on Gomidas was superb, and the professional lecturers and educators were outstanding in every way. I think we all learned a great deal. Personally, for me, it was a really enlightening experience and one I will never forget."

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

### **1991 DIOCESAN SUMMER RESEARCH INTERNSHIP**

The annual Diocesan Summer Internship, for undergraduate or graduate students who are at least 21 years of age will be offered this summer, at the Diocese of the Armenian Church of America in New York City.

This program will be held from June 16-July 27, 1991. Students will work in one of the following Diocesan departments: the Department of Religious Education, the Armenian Church Youth Organization of America, the Krikor and Clara Zohrab Information Center, the Armenian Language Lab and Resource Center and the Department of Public Relations. Each intern will work on a specific project-which will culminate in a research paper at the end of the internship.
